The immersive, family-friendly trail features special effects, live actors and music as well as a host of festive props.


A spokesman for Fresh Air Events said: "We were delighted to welcome families and staff from EACH to our event and see so many happy, smiling faces.

NEWS FROM ALDE VALLEY ACADEMY

Headteacher Message

We have had a superb autumn term at Alde Valley Academy and the school continues to grow from strength to strength. Our Covid precautions have hampered some aspects of school life but our 'new normal' has seen students adopt the wearing of masks in communal areas of the school as second nature.

September started with a 'bang' with a successful Presentation Evening at Snape Maltings Concert Hall where we were able to celebrate with our fantastic students and their parents and families. We are extremely grateful to all of the local and international businesses whose generosity made the evening possible. Planning for next year's event on 27 April 2022 has already started and again we are asking for anyone who is in a position to sponsor the event to get in contact with us at school.

October saw our most successful Open Evening yet which coincided with the opening of our new Library. A record number of parents attended the evening which has translated into the largest cohort of students applying for a place at Alde Valley Academy in the school's history. This will be the third 'record-breaking' year in terms of student numbers and marks a 66% growth in student numbers over the past 5 years. Alde Valley Academy remains the fastest growing school in Suffolk.

I can personally reassure parents that despite our rapid growth, we will honour our promise to maintain small class sizes. Our current average class size across the school is 24 students and just 18 at Key Stage 4. We are also planning our expansion of teaching rooms and resources.

We have had a huge range of extra opportunities that our students this term. They have included our Art Exhibition at the George Farnham Gallery, the vast array of sports fixtures, the opportunity to be part of our school production 'Aladdin', our Music enrichment at Pro-Corda, our involvement in Net-Zero Leiston with EDF and our success at the 'Greenest County Awards' where we won the award for 'Greenest School in Suffolk' amongst many others.

As part of personal development at Alde Valley Academy students are taught PSHE. In addition to the timetabled lessons, students in Year 8 watched a performance by Solomon Theatre Company and participated in a workshop with the cast. This looked at healthy relationships, the effects of alcohol and drugs and mental health. Year 10 have had their first Key Stage 4 PSHE curriculum day which gave students the opportunity to

learn basic first aid, including CPR, the importance of self-screening, and guidance on how to keep safe when they are amongst the public within a community setting. Students were engaged throughout and learnt valuable aspects of leading a safe and healthy lifestyle.

These opportunities add to the high-quality lessons that our students receive on a daily basis by a team of highly qualified, motivated and experienced staff who go the extra mile to make Alde Valley Academy the 'School of Choice'.

Food Bank Project

To coincide with Harvest Festival, Alde Valley Academy launched a food bank collection in school following last year's outstanding contribution.

It was discussed during tutorial time how, unfortunately, many families are struggling with purchasing day to day food. Waveney Food Bank has seen a 450% increase in supplying emergency food supplies to people in crisis compared to the last 4 years. 1 in 5 people of the UK population now live below the poverty line.

Waveney Food Bank work in conjunction with The Trussell Trust to combat poverty and hunger. It was also discussed what could cause a person to find themselves in this situation such as redundancy, illness, domestic violence and how the pandemic has contributed to some of these factors.

Miss Whatling, PE Teacher, launched a house challenge within the school that was different to the normal sporting competitions, where points would be allocated on the house who donated the most food items.



Miss Whatling, commented, "Thank you to all the parent and student contributions; it will make an invaluable difference to local families."

The food collection was a huge success and generated even more food donation than previous years.

New Library

We are pleased and proud to showcase the new library which is literally at the physical heart of the school and embedded in the heart of school values.

Albert Einstein famously said, "The only thing that you absolutely have to know, is the location of the library."

The English department recognises the importance of literacy, which is key to the enrichment and progress of all students of every capability in every subject in the curriculum. Even reading for a mere 5 minutes a day will give a student access to the riches of over 200,000 words which will unlock their understanding; 20 minutes per day unfolds access to nearly 2 million!

As such, reading is an integral part of the school day with students exploring a class novel with their tutor, reading independently or as part of a timetabled lesson where students can read in the peaceful environment of their new library. Showcasing the magic and excitement of the 'worlds' a student can become immersed in, the stairwell and entrance to the library present stunning artwork from the covers of classic novels as if each student meets characters and becomes drawn into their experiences step by step.







Moreover, Alde Valley Academy have forged a partnership with Leiston library, allowing every child to be issued with a library card, extending the links between the school and the wider community.

They hope to be able to fundraise to continually diversify and enrich their own stock of books, both fiction and nonfiction.

They are very grateful to have received a £500 donation from EDF Energy committee. Niki Rousseau, EDF Energy, commented "EDF is pleased to be supporting Alde Valley Academy with their project, and would like to wish them every success with their fundraising."

Personal, Social, Health Education Event

PSHE is a really important part of a student's curriculum at Alde Valley Academy and for Key Stage 4 students this is delivered through PSHE days.

We support students to ensure they are suitably prepared to live a safe and healthy life. Our PSHE sessions incorporate the Relationships and Sex Education curriculum as well as additional topics we feel will prepare students to become responsible 21st century citizens.

Year 10 students enjoyed a morning off timetable to participate in a carousel of PSHE activities including the theme of Health and Prevention which incorporated; first aid, keeping safe when out, and health self-examination and screening.

During the keeping safe activities strategies were discussed about how students can avoid getting themselves into tricky situations and how to respond if they did. They were also taught practical techniques on how to free themselves if held or grabbed. This session was delivered by Mark and Jayne Lewis from Kok Sool Won who teach people martial arts in a safe and friendly environment. This activity proved to be most popular. Students remarked that it was not only enjoyable but an important life skill. Year 10 students Tommy and Dylan, stated, "We'll feel safer when we go out because we know how to protect ourselves."

In the first aid session, pupils were required to practise CPR on a CPR manikin, learning how to resuscitate any person in trouble. Furthermore, students discovered how to use a defibrillator; especially notable, after the successful fundraising and purchasing of 4 defibrillators at Alde Valley Academy: 2 for the school premises and 2 for the local community.

During the self-examination sessions students learnt about breast and testicular cancer. We emphasised the importance of self-examination to ensure early detection.

Even when discussing the more challenging topic of self-examination, Mr Spink, Geography Teacher, said "the students had a high level of maturity which made me feel very proud."

Following on from the day students and staff will reflect and feedback to ensure all PSHE curriculum days are tailored to our students at Alde Valley Academy. These happen termly for Key Stage 4.

Miss Moore, Assistant Head, commented "The Year 10 students engaged amazingly well with their PSHE day. It was something a little different for them and we know

they have taken some valuable lessons away from the day. We were again incredibly proud of our students. Many thanks to Miss Whatling for organising the day of activities."

'THERMOPYLAE' & THE COMPOSITE SHIP ERA

TALK BY CAPTAIN PETER H KING FNI AT WOODBRIDGE CRUISING CLUB

For years, the clipper ship era has been the subject of romance, epitomised by the *Cutty Sark* preserved at Greenwich. Yet in 1879, the Sydney Morning Herald eulogised about another great clipper, seldom remembered today:

The fastest and handsomest ship in the world is now lying at the Circular Quay loading for London, and those who take pleasure in seeing a rare specimen of naval architecture should avail themselves of the opportunity of doing so. Of course, we allude to the **Thermopylæ**, the celebrated Aberdeen clipper. The **Thermopylæ** has all the appearance of a yacht, and yet she carries a good cargo, is a beautiful sea boat, and stands up to her canvas well.

Commissioned in 1868 by Aberdeen shipowner Geo. Thompson Jnr., an owner recognised in his time for excellence of operation on the Australian and China trades, Thompson undoubtedly intended to stamp his authority on the China Tea Trade with a ship which would immediately be recognised as best

in class - Thermopylæ. On her maiden voyage to China via Australia Thermopylæ, under the command of Captain Robert 'Pile-on' Kemball established records on each of three legs. She consistently achieved fast passages on the China tea trade before in 1881 being displaced by steam, when she joined other China clippers on the Australian homewards wool trade until again displaced by steam in 1890. She was then sold to Canadian owners, to be used on the trans-Pacific rice trade from South East Asia to British Colombia, with return cargoes of timber, flour and coal.

In 1896, her trading days over, *Thermopylæ* was sold to the Portuguese Navy for intended use as a sail training ship. Re-named *Pedro Nunes*, she was found to be in too advanced a state of deterioration for the intended conversion to take place, and the once proud ship was reduced to a coal hulk. In October 1907, her useful life expired, with a sense of occasion she was towed out to the mouth of the River Tagus and sunk by two torpedoes as the climax

of a Naval Regatta presided over by the Queen of Portugal.

Thermopylæ is often compared with Cutty Sark, a ship of similar dimensions commissioned a year later with the specific intention of out-pacing **Thermopylæ** on the China Tea Trade – and only once succeeded in eight years. Cutty Sark's competitive record on the subsequent Australian Wool Trade was superior, but throughout her trading career, Thermopylæ maintained her reputation for consistently fast passages, such that amongst seamen of her time she was generally regarded as the better ship.

But it is not in the over-romanticised racing clipper era that *Thermopylæ* should best be remembered. Her design and construction as a composite-built ship pose a number of questions, as does her interrelationship with Lloyds Register of Shipping and the casing of that Society's *Suggestions for the Construction and Classification of Composite-built Ships*.

Consideration of these aspects of her career reveal a number of conundrums not hitherto explored.

Captain Peter King retired from the merchant shipping industry a couple of years ago after 62+ years' continuous service in a wide range of maritime disciplines. In the 1980s, while serving as Managing Director of one of the Christian Salvesen group companies in Aberdeen, he developed an interest in the Geo, Thompson Jnr's Aberdeenbased shipping enterprise leading to his researching and publishing the first definitive history of that long-forgotten shipping entity,




the jewel in whose crown was the clipper *Thermopylæ*. A member of Council of the prestigious Society for Nautical Research, King has subsequently built upon material

garnered for 'The Aberdeen Line' and is currently writing and illustrating a monograph on the clipper **Thermopylæ**.

SOUTHWOLD RESIDENTS TO VOTE ON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN IN THE NEW YEAR

Residents in Southwold will be asked to decide whether a Neighbourhood Plan for the town should be used by East Suffolk Council for future planning applications.

The Southwold Neighbourhood Plan was developed by Southwold Town Council following extensive consultation with the local community and sets out its vision for development to 2036.

Following a 6-week public consultation earlier this year, an independent examination has now been completed which found the plan meets all legal requirements, subject to some amendments.

As a result, East Suffolk Council has concluded that the Plan should proceed to a referendum incorporating the recommended amendments suggested by the examiner. The referendum will take place on Thursday 3 February 2022 and will ask residents to vote on whether the Council should use the Neighbourhood Plan for Southwold to help determine planning applications in the neighbourhood area.

Cllr David Ritchie, East Suffolk's cabinet member for Planning and Coastal Management said: "Neighbourhood planning enables local communities to get directly involved with planning the areas in which they live and work, and I would encourage those living in Southwold to get involved and take part in the referendum next year."


Struggling with Debt?

Co-Founder Steve Koch said, "We are delighted that Click It Local has expanded to East Suffolk.



GROUND-BREAKING COVID-19 ANTIVIRAL TREATMENT TRIAL OPENS TO RECRUITMENT IN THE EAST OF ENGLAND

Local GPs and healthcare professionals have begun enrolling participants across the east of England to a first-of-its-kind clinical trial investigating the effectiveness of new oral antiviral treatments for COVID-19 - which can be safely taken at home.

The Platform Adaptive trial of NOvel antiviRals for eArly treatMent of covid-19 In the Community (PANORAMIC) trial will rapidly assess a range of purpose-designed antiviral treatments which could help clinically vulnerable people with COVID-19 in the community recover sooner, prevent the need for hospital admission and ease the burden on the NHS.

These new antiviral treatments are intended for use in the very early stages of infection, by people in the community with COVID-19 who are at higher risk of complications.

Local people can join the study if they are aged 50 and over, or between 18 to 49 years with underlying health conditions that make them clinically more vulnerable. All participants also need to have had a positive COVID-19 test and be within five days of the onset of symptoms.

To enable the benefit of each treatment to be compared against standard care - a total of 10,600 volunteers are needed to take part in each arm of the study. Half of the participants will be randomly allocated to receive the antiviral treatment plus standard care, while the other half will receive standard care alone.

The PANORAMIC study brings together GP practices, NHS 111, Test

and Trace, care homes, pharmacies and other NHS and social care service providers from the east of England and right across the UK - who will actively identify potential participants, invite them to take part and support their participation.

Taking part is easy. Local people who receive a positive PCR test for COVID-19 will be contacted by the trial team or a local healthcare professional, such as a GP or a research nurse, to consider enrolling in the study. Alternatively, anyone who meets the eligibility criteria can also sign-up to take part in the study directly through the trial website: www.panoramictrial.org

All participants take part from their own homes, without needing to visit a clinic or hospital. Participants randomised to the group that receives an antiviral treatment will have their medicines sent directly to their homes by courier. Participants will keep a daily diary for 28 days through the PANORAMIC website or receive a phone call from the trial team on days 7, 14 and 28 to speak about their symptoms and any NHS care they have needed.

PANORAMIC has been designed as a 'platform clinical trial', meaning it can rapidly evaluate several antiviral treatments, as and when they become available. The UK Antivirals Taskforce has selected all treatments to be tested. The first treatment to be investigated through the trial will be molnupiravir (brand name, Lagevrio) - a COVID antiviral pill - which has already been licensed by the MHRA.

The results from this highest priority national study will provide a clearer understanding on how antivirals work in the UK population - which has a high vaccination rate - enabling the NHS to better plan how to make COVID-19 antivirals available for those who would benefit from them the most.

Dr Rhiannon Nally, Principal Investigator for PANORAMIC and GP at Wansford and Kings Cliffe Practice, Ely, Cambs, said:

"The Research Team at Wansford is delighted to have been selected to host the Panoramic Study, helping people in our local community to take part in this vital research. It is only with their involvement that we can find new, more effective ways to help those with COVID-19, so if you have had symptoms for less than 5 days please do think about joining the PANORAMIC trial."

Dr Helen Macdonald, Chief Operating Officer for the NIHR Clinical Research Network Eastern, said:

"Our region welcomes the opening of this crucial study, particularly at a time when we face a further need for vigilance in the course of the pandemic. We will work side by side with our GPs and other NHS research teams to help run this important COVID-19 study. It is only through working together that we will make the breakthroughs we need, so thank you to all who join us."

Professor Nick Lemoine, Medical Director of the National Institute for Health Research Clinical Research Network (CRN) said:

"When taken in the earliest stages of infection, these groundbreaking, purpose-designed, COVID-19 antiviral treatments hold the potential to greatly improve outcomes for patients most at risk from the disease. As orally-administered treatments,

designed to be taken at home soon after the onset of symptoms, the drugs work by disrupting and preventing the virus from multiplying inside the body.

"Earlier trials have shown these new antivirals to be safe and effective in treating COVID-19. However more data is needed on how well they work in populations that are largely vaccinated - as we have in the UK. The PANORAMIC trial will rapidly generate the additional evidence needed for the NHS to roll-out this exciting new-generation of COVID-19 treatments, as quickly and safely as possible. But to do that, we need your help.

"If you have a PCR-confirmed COVID-19 test, are within 5 days of symptom onset - and meet the study eligibility criteria - we urge you to volunteer for this pivotal study. Participants take part from the comfort of their own homes and there is no need to visit a clinic or hospital. Visit the PANORAMIC website to sign up, or speak to your GP or healthcare professional about taking part."

The trial's Chief Investigator, Professor Chris Butler, Professor of Primary Care in the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences, said:

"It is early on in the illness, when people are still being cared for in the community, that treatments for COVID-19 could have their greatest benefit. So far, a lot of the research has focussed on finding out if well-known drugs can be repurposed to treat COVID-19. This new trial will test whether exciting, new antiviral treatments that are more specific to COVID-19 help people in the community recover faster and reduce the need for treatment in hospital.

"All community health and social care providers in the East of England will be able to link people with the trial. Everyone who is eligible in the area and the UK as a whole will be able to join PANORAMIC, and many will be able to do so from their own homes by participating online with support from their GPs and study team, with medicines sent directly to them at home.

"It's vital that as many people as possible who are at higher risk from complications of COVID-19 join the trial so we can rapidly learn if exciting new treatments really do help people get better quicker and reduce pressures on the NHS. We are grateful to people in the East of England who are participating in the trial, as they will be helping health services rapidly get evidence-based treatments out to those sick with COVID and who are at greatest risk of complications."

The NIHR is partnering with the University of Oxford, several other UK universities, GPs and the NHS to help deliver this national priority trial at pace and scale across the United Kingdom.

PANORAMIC is funded by the National Institute for Health Research, led by Oxford University's Primary Care Clinical Trials Unit, while delivery of the trial is supported by the NIHR Clinical Research Network.







TRINITY PARK HOSTS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP CYCLING EVENT

Organisers of the UCI Masters Cyclo-Cross World Championships have celebrated the event's huge success at Trinity Park.

Hundreds of international riders turned out to take on the obstacles, bridges, muddy descents and gruelling inclines of a purpose-built circuit.

The East Suffolk Council sponsored event was supported by the world governing body for sports cycling, the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI), and hosted by the Eastern Cyclo-Cross Association alongside Trinity Park Events.

On Friday and Saturday, the field was open to riders aged over 35 who no longer race as part of an elite professional team, with open races for riders of all ages taking place alongside a Special Olympics Cyclo-Cross event on the Sunday.

East Suffolk Council's Cabinet Member

for Communities, Leisure and Tourism, Councillor Letitia Smith, attended the event and presented medals to Saturday's winners.

Ahead of the event, ClIr Smith said she was delighted to welcome spectators and participants on behalf of East Suffolk Council, adding: "As a local authority, we have a rich history of supporting major cycling events, which not only draw economy boosting crowds, but hopefully encourage more people to realise the many

Following the weekend's racing, organisers thanked spectators, riders and helpers for making a huge success of the event, which was staged following a two-year forced hiatus due to Covid-19.











CALLING ALL BRIDGE PLAYERS



There are a number of clubs in and around the Southwold area, playing variously on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. All players are welcome irrespective of ability, either to become full or temporary members (as visitors to the area). We'll be including a new bridge question each month in the Organ.

Just to whet your appetite, here's the January teaser for all you bridge enthusiasts - see if you can work out the order of play to make contract before you cross check with the answer below:

A Southern Belle Plays Bridge

Scarlett sat comfortably in the cane chair on the verandah gazing out on the soft evening sunset bathing the bayou in a warm orange glow. Will o' the wisps of oleander scented air barely rippled the Confederate flag atop the neighbouring Court House. The background clicking of cicadas and whistling from tree frogs blended with the doleful chants of the gangs wending their way through the miasmas of mist in the low-lying tobacco fields across the levee to their mean huts by the swollen earth-coloured river. "Six no trumps, I do declare", was her last contribution to the auction before her right-hand opponent, after some moments of consideration led the ten of spades. Scarlett leaned seductively over towards her partner, West, and softly whispered, "Sir, if I were to consider marriage it could only be to a good bridge player". So saying, she spread her hand on the green beige with a flourish.



Contract 6 no trumps by West, N lead 10.

How would a Potential Suitor Play the Hand?

There are 8 sure tricks outside clubs. Declarer needs to guarantee 4 club tricks even against a possible 5-0 club split. So, he should win with the Q♠ and take the safety play of leading the 2♣ towards the ♣JT4. If the clubs are 3-2 or 4-1 he will lose one trick to the Q. but that is all.

If North is void he will show out when you lead towards the \$JT4 – you play the T\$ and South plays:

- Q. You win the return, play the J. and then the 4. finessing against South's 9.
- Small 4. Play the J4. South must cover with Q4 or you have the 4 tricks you need. You win with K4 and return to dummy to play the 4*, finessing against South's 9*.

If South is void and North had played:

- 1) Q. There are 4 tricks AK, JT
- Small &. Then play the T& which will win as South is void. Return to hand and lead up to the &J4. If North plays small the J. will win and you have 4 tricks. If he plays the Q. you again have 4 tricks.

How had declarer played? Suffice it to say that he is still single and has now joined the Southwold Bridge Club. You don't have to be single to join and if you need one, we'll fit you up with a partner (but only for the session!) NEW TRADING COMPANY TO DELIVER KEY COUNCIL SERVICES

As part of its commitment to seek the best possible value for money for residents, businesses and all local stakeholders, East Suffolk Council is to create a Local Authority Trading Company (LATCo), enabling it to play a more direct and influential role in how important services are delivered.

The LATCo will operate as an 'arms-length' commercial business, separate to the Council and will be responsible for crucial services such as waste and recycling collection, grounds maintenance and street cleansing.

This means that East Suffolk Council will exercise its right not to renew the contract it holds with Norse for the provision of operational services, and therefore this contract will come to a natural end in July 2023.

Operational staff currently employed by East Suffolk Norse, will be legally entitled to transfer to the new organisation, on the same terms and conditions, through 'protection under law' TUPE legislation and the Council will be seeking as seamless a transition as possible.

Cllr Steve Gallant, Leader of East Suffolk Council said: "Our aim is to provide the best quality services possible with the resources available, always seeking to deliver improvement that benefits council taxpayers. Since our formation in 2019, East Suffolk Council has been clear about its progressive ambitions for the district and the way that it delivers the key services needed by our communities.

"As part of this approach, we undertake regular reviews of all partnerships to ensure that they are delivering the best value for East Suffolk. This new trading company will allow us closer control of key services so we can maximise our support for, and investment in, our communities and local economy. We will also explore the commercial potential of these particular services, so that we can deliver profit which will be invested straight back into our communities.

"And by keeping money closer to East Suffolk, this change will help deliver the council's strategic aims. For example, we believe that the new trading company will help East Suffolk deliver environmental changes - such as new fuels, vehicles and approaches to waste management - that support our environmental ambitions."

Cllr Gallant also thanked East Suffolk Norse for their service and sought to reassure existing operational staff about their roles in the new organisation. He said:

"East Suffolk Council is grateful to East Suffolk Norse for the delivery of really important services, and we look forward to a continued, excellent working relationship as the contract concludes.

"The decisions we have taken are not a reflection on the service provided by East Suffolk Norse but are based on wider ambitions and always seeking best possible value for money. However, it goes without saying that our operational teams are hugely experienced and, as the most important asset of the business, we want the transition to be really smooth and straightforward.

"We believe there are business growth opportunities, and we want to invest in the development of a sustainable business which will actually provide increased job security and opportunity.

The creation of the LATCo focusses on the transition of a 'core' bundle of services, however - where there is a rational and compelling case - other services may yet join. Where companies and other organisations such as town and parish councils have 'paid-for' service contracts in place, the Council will discuss transferring these services to the LATCo.

"This is very much a growth, not a cutting exercise in terms of service and we are seeking more efficient ways of working without sacrificing the quality that our customers, residents and communities have come to expect."

LOWESTOFT LEADS THE UK WITH NEW FLOOD DEFENCES

One of the largest mitre flood gates in the United Kingdom is to be installed as the final element of a project protecting thousands of homes from flooding.

A 40m mitre flood gate, the second largest in the UK, will be built in the entrance to Lake Lothing as part of the Lowestoft Flood Risk Management Project. The ambitious project will see the mitre flood gate be the first of such structure in the UK to be built without diverting the navigation channel.

The gate will form the tidal barrier element of the project and be built over a number of winter seasons to maintain access to the inner harbour. The 40m mitre flood gate will keep the width of the current navigation channel for vessels entering Lake Lothing. This

approach will allow Lowestoft to continue developing as a hub for offshore wind energy.

The detailed design phase of the mitre flood gate will begin next year and will provide a firm completion date for the project. Once complete, the gate, working in combination with tidal floodwalls, will provide valuable protection for people, homes and businesses for many years to come.

Cllr David Ritchie, East Suffolk
Council's cabinet member for
Planning and Coastal Management
said: "The Lowestoft Flood Risk
Management Project has always
been ambitious in its efforts to
protect the residents and businesses
of the town from the risk of flooding,
and this has been shown with the
development of the second largest
mitre flood gate in the UK."

Construction is currently underway on the first phase of tidal floodwalls on Hamilton Road and Waveney Road, with the second phase due to begin in the New Year around the Royal Norfolk and Suffolk Yacht Club and South Pier. The floodwalls are due for completion in spring 2023.

Temporary flood defences remain available to reduce the risk of flooding to Lowestoft until the project is complete. The temporary defences will be used in conjunction with the tidal floodwalls once complete, to further reduce the flood risk.

When finished Lowestoft Flood Risk Management Project will protect more than 1,500 homes and 825 businesses.
