HALESWORTH DEMENTIA CARERS' FUND

Celebrating its 10th anniversary.

The HDCF was established in 2014 and set out to provide respite care for those families where someone has dementia. Over the last 10 years the Fund has worked closely with Prestige and First Choice to put staff in to support those families, and in that time the Fund has provided a staggering 35,631 hours of respite care, at a cost of £267,220, and from just 2 people the Fund now has a board of 10 Trustees who meet monthly. The Board of Trustees is also supported by our Patron, Paddy Cox, who is also our Carers Representative.

HDCF has also worked closely with other charities, and special thanks go to the Halesworth Volunteer Centre and their wonderful volunteer drivers who take many people to our groups. We would also like to thank the Pear Tree Centre for the use of their premises and many referrals.

Putting staff into homes is not the only way the Fund can support families. The Fund is able to provide activity sessions for dementia sufferers and their loved ones. These sessions are a wonderful way to help and support those families, and we are grateful to the facilitators, Sophie Wood, Jo Knight, Helen Hayes, Toni Miller and Vicky Hutchinson

Seated Movement to Music: This session takes place every Monday at Holton Village, from 11.00 to 12.15, followed by tea or coffee.

MAY IS FOR SWIFTS

Have you spotted your first swift this year? Keep your eyes on the skies – here's hoping these amazing, joyous birds will once again be racing over the Halesworth Thoroughfare, around the market square and up and down Chediston Street, where they return to make their nests under the old roof tiles. You will hear them 'screaming' as they bomb through the skies in little groups.

They arrive in the UK from Africa every year to raise their young here, then leave these shores and head south again by late July or early August. We must cherish them for the three months they are with us. All the more so since they are now on the Red List of endangered birds, their numbers dropping dramatically. The reasons for this, as far as we know, are declining insect numbers and serious loss of nest sites.

Traditionally swifts nest in roof spaces of older properties, where they can squeeze through small gaps to find their place. However, with so much modernisation and new home building going on, too many swifts are returning to find last year's nesting site blocked up, no longer there for them.

If you live in a modern property with a sealed roof, you can get specially

designed swift nest boxes put up (see below) - that's if you do not already have inbuilt swift nesting bricks, which we'd love all new houses to come with!

Wild birds and the law

If you are having work done to your roof, please be aware that nesting birds are protected by law. It is illegal to 'intentionally take, damage or destroy a wild bird's nest while it's being used or built; intentionally take or destroy a wild bird's egg'. So, builders, scaffolders and homeowners please be aware and vigilant, there may be swifts nesting under the tiles you are planning to re-

place. Do not get a criminal record!!!

If you are one of the lucky people who does have swifts nesting with you, rejoice! How about celebrating with one of these lovely tiles on your house, artistically created especially for us by Smoke and Fire of Darsham. We have two versions, one for homes with nesting swifts, and one for homes where you wish to share your love and support for them. The tiles



are new this year, cost £15 each and can be ordered by emailing edithsummerhayes@btinternet.com.

Halesworth has a little group of enthusiasts, Halesworth Swifts. Email: halesworthswifts@gmail.com if you are interested in having a swift nest box put up (for a donation) and someone will come out to assess the site. If you would like to be involved with the group, or if you know where swifts are nesting, please do share that too.



HALESWORTH SPORTS' HONOURS BOARDS RETURN

From 1958, Halesworth Modern School decided to keep a record of all their students' sports achievements in the form of sports honours boards. The two teachers responsible for the setting up of these were myself, Neil Howell (Head of physical education) and the late Mark Saunders (Head of woodwork and metalwork). I was responsible for all the records and information whilst Mark took charge of the presentation and the writing on the boards.

From 1971-72, many changes took place in the field of education. One of the more controversial issues was the removal of the sports Honours boards. Many ex-students pointed out that the boards contained a history of the school and it was sacrilege to remove them. What happened to them? Were they destroyed during the removal? Why did they go missing? Where did they go?

The Halesworth Museum fortunately took charge of them when the school was demolished. They initially placed them in storage, then in time, moved them to a larger site. The boards took up an enormous area because of their size. The good news is they are safe and intact. The Museum relocated them to the newest part of the building at the railway station and they are now on display for all to see, alongside many trophies, shields and memorabilia from the Modern and Middle schools.

Categories on the boards are as follows:

- 1. Students who have represented themselves, their school and their area in a) Football b) Swimming c) Cross Country d) Cricket e) Netball
- 2. Athletics champions a) Boys Senior b) Girls Senior c) Boys Junior d) Girls Junior 3. The record holders for all boys and girls Athletics events including Junior Hockey and Road races.

There is more detailed information about all the sports achievements between the years 1958 to 1981 in my autobiography - Take Your Marks. I have written specific chapters relating to all categories of sports achievements. When writing my autobiography, I used four main sources: 1) The Sports Honours Boards 2) Press Reports 3) my own personal records 4) My memory.


There were so many facts and figures that

it was difficult to select what to include in my book and what to leave out. I could have written another book and filled that with more achievements of just as much importance.

Having been a PE teacher for over 35 years I believe that it is imperative to keep the history of competition alive. Unfortunately, over the last few years competition has been rather watered down and seen as not appropriate. However, surely life is competitive?

During my time as a teacher the students thrived on competition in the form of Houses; these were Stuart - Red, Tudor -Green, York - Blue and Windsor - Yellow. At the end of the year there were trophies for the highest points earned during that year both in sport and academia. This was seen as healthy competition and an achievement for the pupils.

Upon opening said ticket I discovered I was being fined £50 for parking a few inches over another parking space with my rear wheel. Bearing in mind my vehicle was a large van, there was a row of cars in parking spaces behind me, making it difficult to manoeuvre and the fact that I didn't want to alarm the queue of

people at the pay station directly on my left by getting too close, to say I was surprised would be an understatement.

Nobody I have spoken to since has heard of such a thing so I thought I had better warn you before you possibly meet the same fate. Presumably if someone else has parked over the lines, forcing you to, you may receive a fine through no fault of your own.

Needless to say I immediately appealed but received what I suspect is an automatic 'not upheld' reply, bearing in mind none of the points I had made were addressed. There is the opportunity to appeal a second time but you

are encouraged not to do so as, if it is rejected once again (which I suspect it would be) you pay the full £50 rather than the £25 you can pay by coughing up immediately.

I'm not sure if this is a new 'parking crime' but this sort of heavy-handedness doesn't encourage 'shopping local' and I would have thought there must be better ways of boosting the council coffers – particularly in these times when we are all struggling with the cost of living.

Back to school!

If you would like to jog your memory of the old Halesworth Middle School and Secondary Modern School, Halesworth & District Museum is the place to go. Photos, sports cups, school magazines and a national award for choral singing are just some of the memorabilia in a brand-new display featuring the town's former schools. Even if you hated your old uniform, you might be tempted to have another look at those old school ties, jumpers etc. There is also a chance to pick up the Middle School bell and give it a ring for old times' sake.

From 1923 to 1958, Halesworth children aged 5 - 15 attended the Halesworth Area School, at the site which is now


Edgar Sewter Primary School. Those who passed the 11-plus exam had the opportunity to continue their education at Bungay or Beccles, and the rest left school and generally entered the work force.

In 1958, Halesworth Secondary Modern School opened its doors to 11–15-years-olds, on a site facing the Norwich Road. The former Halesworth Area School became Edgar Sewter Primary School, for children aged 5 - 11. As before, those who passed the 11-plus could go on to Bungay or Beccles.

In the 1970s, Suffolk introduced a threetier system of education. In Halesworth, this meant children left Edgar Sewter Primary School at age 9 and moved to Halesworth Middle School - on the premises of the former Secondary Modern. At age 13, they transferred to high school in Bungay or Beccles without sitting an 11-plus exam.

Then in 2010, Suffolk reverted to a twotier system. Edgar Sewter incorporated two extra year groups, so children could stay until they were 11, then their education moved out of Halesworth when they transferred to high school. Halesworth Middle School closed in 2012.

So, whether you were a schoolchild, a parent or indeed both during these years of educational change, why not come and jog your memories at the Museum?

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HALESWORTH TO SOUTHWOLD NARROW GAUGE RAILWAY SOCIETY CIO

Dedicated to re-creating the Blyth Valley's lost railway

HSNGR have experienced a number of milestones in the last few weeks. Firstly, and most importantly, we have succeeded, after almost five years of trying and four applications, in becoming a Registered Charity. Not only is this a step up from our previous status as a Society, but it will allow us to apply to receive Gift Aid on donations, and it may well open up the possibility of Grant Aid. At our Annual General Meeting, Charity Trustees will be voted in by the Membership.

At Blythburgh Station we spent a week

putting in the sidings to form the goods yard. This has taken many months to prepare for, as each rail and each sleeper has to be modified to our unusual threefoot gauge. But despite indifferent weather, the entire job was done, and the station now looks a lot more like it did in 1879. The new track is entirely levelled into the car park surface, as was always done in such yards in the nineteenth

century, so the footpath can be used as before, and staff and visitors can park to attend our regular events. More rolling stock is being built and modified so that demonstrations of typical shunting can be held from time to time.

Not content with that, our battery electric locomotive now has working air brakes, and is being tested ready for delivery. And the Channel Tunnel RFS locomotive has been tested on our track in Wenhaston, with its own brakes and safety systems working - so that is also close to normal use. And as "icing on the cake", engineer Jamie's replica MOY Cleminson coal wagon underframe has been made up with its flexible sub-

frames and has negotiated the sharp curves on the test track. No such Cleminson's Patent wagon or coach has been built for over 100 years.

On Saturday May 13th, in St Mary's Church in Halesworth, we hold our first Halesworth Day, to celebrate our first five years of existence. Halesworth community organisations have been invited to celebrate with us. The event is between 10.30 and 16.00, with the closeby White Swan public house very kindly offering facilities for our visitors.



1953 FLOODS REMEMBERED

Described as one of the worst peacetime disasters in the UK, the 1953 floods that battered coastal towns throughout Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex, is featured in a new film being shown at **Leiston Film Theatre** that shows how it devastated the East of England.

Entitled A Surge of Memories, the film features accounts from survivors, memories of those who witnessed the floods, stories captured from those who are no longer with us and reflections of family members affected by the floods.

The film has been made to commemorate the storm surge's 70th anniversary and has been created by the Coastal Partnership East, comprising of East Suffolk Council, North Norfolk District Council, in partnership with the Anglian Regional Flood and Coastal Committee.

It is estimated that around 307 people died in England during the evening of January 31 to February 1, 1953, including 41 in Felixstowe and five in Southwold. It was the worst storm surge disaster for 60 years.

The film also reflects on the 2013 East Coast tidal surge and considers future challenges.

Closer to home, Aldeburgh was also severely affected by the devastating tidal surge and the screening at Leiston Film Theatre will be preceded by an exclusive set of images on screen, of the 1953 Aldeburgh floods.

A Surge of Memories will be screened at Leiston Film Theatre on Sunday 21st May, with separate screenings at 3.00pm and 5.30pm. Tickets are priced £8.50 for adults, £7.50 for concessions and £6.50 for members of the Leiston Film Theatre Support Club. Tickets are
