



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SAXMUNDHAM TOWN COUNCIL

Town Council Registers as an Interested Party to Sea Link
The registration window for the Sea Link project closed last
month. Saxmundham Town Council registered as an Interested
Party and submitted a Relevant Representation **strongly opposing** the proposed siting of the Sea Link converter station
on the outskirts of the town.

The Relevant Representation also highlighted the Town Council's key concerns as follows:

- Proximity of the converter station to a rural market town.
- Detrimental visual and landscape impacts.
- Traffic disruption during construction.
- Noise and disturbance during construction and operation.
- Socio-economic and wellbeing impacts to residents.
- Reputational damage to the town.
- Biodiversity and environmental degradation.
- Cumulative impact of multiple projects.
- Insufficient mitigation and community benefits.

What Happens Next?

The Examining Authority will review all Relevant Representations submitted by Parish, Town, District and County Councils, local organisations, and members of the public. All Interested Parties will be invited to a preliminary meeting to look at how the examination will take place, what needs to be considered, and how this affects the examination timetable. The Examination will then formally begin.

The Examining Authority will intensely scrutinise the proposals, asking for written representations from National Grid and Interested Parties, and by holding public hearings. The Town Council will take part in all these steps.

When the Examination has concluded, the Planning Inspectorate will write a report on their findings, including a recommendation regarding whether or not to grant a Development Consent Order for the project. This report will be considered by the Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero who has the final say on whether to grant or refuse development consent.

Once a decision has been made, anybody can legally challenge the Secretary of State's decision. If a challenge is made, the High Court will decide if there are grounds for the decision to be judicially reviewed.

From the submission of a development consent application to the final decision by the Secretary of State, the entire process typically takes around 18 months. Based on current timelines, a decision on the Sea Link proposal can therefore be expected around September 2026.

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group (a community-led group supported by the Town Council) has been working on modifications to the existing Neighbourhood Plan.

These modifications extend the current policies to cover the proposed South Saxmundham Garden Neighbourhood. Importantly, if East Suffolk Council grants planning permission for the development site it has allocated, the modified Plan will help influence the design, infrastructure, and sustainability of the new neighbourhood.

It will also ensure that the town secures a greater share of Community Infrastructure Levy funding from developers. In addition, the modified Plan introduces measures to help mitigate the impact on Saxmundham in the unwelcome event that the Sea Link and Lion Link converter stations are approved.

The Town Council is conducting a community consultation on the modified Neighbourhood Plan until 15th August 2025. Share your views by visiting www.saxmundham.org/communityconsultations. Copies of the modified Plan and consultation response forms are available at Saxmundham Library or at the Town House, opposite the train station.

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group will consider all written and online responses and make any necessary amendments to the modified Plan. It will then be submitted to the District Council to ensure it meets the legal requirements and will be published for further community consultation. An independent examination will follow.

SAXMUNDHAM PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

This month we would like to tell you about all of the STEAM activities happening in our school. This stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths.

Starting with the Arts...We are very excited to tell you about a project that Hawthorn class has been working on all year. Our Year 5 pupils had the unusual and exceptional opportunity to work with The Long Shop Museum and members of the London Sinfonia to create, rehearse and perform original songs, ending in a live performance at Snape Maltings.

This experience has had a significant impact on the children, not least, increased self-esteem, teamwork and creativity. One of our pupils said they felt "happy, excited and really proud" not just of themselves, but of their classmates as well.

Working alongside professional musicians has given our pupils a rare, and inspiring, insight into the world of music-making at the highest level. Children will have developed not only their musical skills but also the confidence to perform in front of a large audience; a milestone achievement for children of this age. They also learnt a huge amount about our local heritage and industry. We would like to say a big thank you to the Leiston Long Shop Museum and Orchestras Live for selecting us for the project.

Pupils in year six have also been involved in a long-term project, but this one had a focus on science, technology and engineering.

For the most recent activity day, they used computers to programme a range of LED lights. This included getting them to work just like traffic lights. It's really exciting to be able to work with expert visitors on these days and it can really open the children's eyes to different possible careers.

Pupils in years three and four were visited by the Malin group, who specialise in marine engineering. The children learnt about what is needed for structural strength, design and balance within the industry.

Pupils tried to balance a 'barge' carefully in a tank of water.

They then used different sized weights to mimic a brand new ship on a barge in the ocean. It was a challenging activity, but with some logical thinking some of our pupils managed it!

The children also created towers using mini marshmallows and cocktail sticks, learning how to make a rigid structure that could withstand an earthquake.

It was a fantastic day and a lot was learnt about the world of engineering.

On Thursday 22nd May we were delighted to welcome back our friend Jim Cecil to show us his old films of local interest. They were based in Blaxhall and were about writer George Ewart Evans.

George became very interested in recording the stories and lives of many Blaxhall residents. The films featured lovely scenes of farming with Suffolk Punch horses and included scenes featuring Roger Clarke, a farrier and farmer, famous for his work with the Suffolk Punch. Then we were tapping our feet to the many songs in the happy atmosphere of the famous Blaxhall Ship.

The stories and songs having been handed down through the generations.

George Ewart Evans was born in Wales in 1909 and became a schoolteacher. He was an author and folklorist, writing eleven books about farming in the 1940s to 1970s. One such book was 'Ask the fellow who cut the hay.'

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FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR...



As we finally reach summer, albeit after an exceptionally pleasant spring, thoughts turn to holidays and a well-deserved break from work. I am having a few days touring the north-east of England by railway. I thought this appropriate as we celebrate the 200th anniversary of the first passenger railway between Stockton and Darlington in September this year, and life has not taken me to Stockton before!

The railway is important to Saxmundham. It arrived here in 1859 completing the missing link between Woodbridge and Halesworth, and in 1860 was supplemented by a branch line via Leiston to Aldeburgh.

Sadly that closed in 1966, as did a short freight-only branch to Snape Maltings. The East Suffolk Line was saved from closure after the Beeching cuts and became the target of severe cost-cutting measures, including reducing much of the track from double to single line. With all the benefits that hindsight bring that is now regarded as a serious mistake. Following investment after privatisation in 1997 much good work has been achieved.

We now have very comfortable, reliable, modern rolling stock, and recently the track infrastructure has been upgraded with continuous welded track, which improves the quality of the journey and is so much quieter. I commend Network Rail for the work they have done, and, indeed, continue to do on the old branch line towards Leiston, so that huge quantities of rail-borne freight can reach the Sizewell C construction site.

Last month I wrote about various aspects of Sizewell C, but now I feel I need to say that the rail upgrading has been done because of that development. It must be right to bring in as many materials as possible to Sizewell by rail rather than increasing still further the volume of heavy lorries on our local road network. The downside is that most of the rail freight movements have to be done in the middle of the night to avoid compromising the important (nearly) hourly passenger services between Ipswich and Lowestoft. But I write as a resident who lives close to the railway line, and the new track has cut the train noise by, and here I unscientifically guess, ninety per cent and the vibration effect has all but disappeared. Even so, as the trains now pass through in the early hours of the morning they still wake me up.

And, alas, their volume is going to increase as the construction work proceeds apace, up to five trains in each direction at their peak. Yes, at this time of the year I have windows open, which I will not have as the colder months approach, but we still suffer some inconveniences as well as many benefits from our railway...

One of the reasons Saxmundham has always been more important locally than its size might suggest, is because of the presence of the railway and the fact that we act as a geographic hub for our surrounding communities. This was even more so when the A12 (then part of the Trunk Road network) passed right through the centre of the town, as it did right up until 1988. Today in many ways we still continue to be that 'hub', but for different reasons.

The centre of geography of the town has markedly shifted in recent years. Probably for centuries it lay in the Market Place and High Street, but now it is that axis between our two supermarkets, who attract in food shoppers from a wide area. That is especially true of Waitrose, which undoubtedly has its own dedicated band of shoppers who like what it offers. That is fine because Tesco copes with those others who look for slightly lower prices – like myself! The important thing is that we do have the choice to make up our own minds where we shop.

Having been so positive about aspects of our town, I do have to express my concerns about the evident decline of the High Street. Recently it has attracted more beauty parlours and hairdressers, and H G Crisp, which used to underpin the retail offer in the area, is up for sale and both M R King's garage and The Store have recently closed down.

But at least we still have one bank left – and a post office too. I don't want this article to be remembered for me moaning as I remain positively hopeful about the town's future. The way to keep useful shops in the town is to use them. Enough said!

I have now lived in Saxmundham for over a third of a century. Yes, it has expanded and changed, but it is still a fine town in which to reside, with good services, and most things still can be found here. I am taking a risk in describing Saxmundham as an 'ordinary' town. That risk is because some may interpret that description as derogatory.

But in no way is it meant like that. We live close to Aldeburgh and Southwold, and neither of those places is 'ordinary'. We are, because people can more easily afford to live here in contrast to the very high property prices in those towns.

Our community is strong. People talk to one another, look out for one another and help one another. Thank goodness for that. I have always been happy to live here and, when my elected term of office comes to an end, I fully intend to continue living here in retirement, as Saxmundham is the right place for me – and I hope for you, too.


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
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ALDE VALLEY SUFFOLK FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

'The Garrett Family' - Fraser Hale

In this talk Fraser Hale will be taking us on an illustrated stroll through the lives of the Garrett family, from their roots in Woodbridge, through the early years of growth in Leiston, and then along two diverging boughs; the later Leiston branch, who were manufacturers of agricultural machinery, steam engines and trolleybuses, and the stout and fruitful Aldeburgh branch, who played a significant role in the town's development and were prominent figures in various fields.

Fraser came to the heritage sector after a 35 year career in engineering. As well as his engineering qualifications, he holds a BA (Hons) in History and was the curator at Woodbridge Tide Mill for five years.

He then joined the Long Shop Museum in Leiston as Operations Manager in late 2020. He graduated to Museum Director in early 2023.

The talk takes place on Monday 21st July at 2.30pm, in person at the Fromus Centre, Street Farm Road, Saxmundham, IP17 1AL (behind the library) and, for members only, on Zoom. The talk starts at 2.30pm. No need to book – just turn up — at £1 for members, £3 for visitors, including tea/coffee/biscuits.

YOXFAYRE RETURNS

Yoxford's Oxfayre, which flourished from the 1980s to the early noughties is returning this summer with a new name, Yoxfayre.

Taking place on Saturday 5th July, the event incorporates the Yoxford Flower Festival at St Peter's Church, which is also the venue for an evening concert. Bringing the community spirit back to the village there will be plenty of things for everybody to enjoy throughout the day including a dog show, flower show, silent auction, music, games, cakes, barbecue, ice cream van and old fashioned fun and games such as splat-a-rat and the stocks in Mulberry Park, run by the youth club.

A variety of stalls will include bric-a-brac and vintage clothing, books and plants and produce as well as a tombola and raffle.

Local professional musicians Alec Hone (organ) and Anna Noakes (flute) will be performing in the church throughout the day along with children from the school singing under the guidance of Yoxford resident, opera singer Katie Graham. A saxophone group will be performing in Mulberry Park.

No summer fair would be complete without tea and homemade cake, available in the church with a barbecue and Parravani ice cream van outside the village hall. Sing Out! Yoxford, a free concert by Yoxford's local community choir takes place in the church at 7.30pm.

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A year in the life of a deacon

What a year it has been. I was ordained a deacon last year, and this has been followed by my ordination as a priest just a few weeks ago. As I move into this next stage of my ministry journey it feels like a good time to reflect on the past year as a deacon here at SKC church.

This year has included many highlights for me. My first baptism took place only a couple of weeks after ordination, and it was a wonderful experience. I was nervous beforehand, worrying that I might drop the baby, but in the end, all went well and it was a lovely occasion. I have been privileged to conduct other baptisms and it is always wonderful to celebrate bringing people, whether babies, children or adults, into the church family and Christian life.

Our regular service pattern has an informal service at 09:30 and a Holy Communion service at 11:00 each Sunday. There are other occasional events especially around Christmas and Easter, as well as other times throughout the year. For me, this year has been about learning what parish ministry is like, so I have tried to get involved in all the different services we have and it is great to experience a range of traditions within our benefice. I was also kindly invited to preach at a neighbouring church in Knodishall and at the Methodist church in Woodbridge, providing some great experience for me.

At Christmas time you may have come along to our short Christingle service during the town Christmas fair. If you remember we had to move activities inside due to the weather, so we held our service in the Fromus Centre. It was lovely to see lots of people there. We sang a couple of carols and Dave, our Rector, dressed up as a giant Christingle in an inflatable orange costume. This was used again at our Christingle service for Kelsale school where the pupils were able to explain what they had learned about what the Christingle represents.

The year has not just been about church services of course. I'm often at our church café 'At the Crossroads' or at our Community Fridge on a Friday morning you. Both of these places you can get a coffee and meet socially with others. If you see me around, please say hello. I'll be happy to have a chat.

As curate I am also part of our standing committee and church council, giving me an opportunity to get involved in the leadership of the church and providing an insight into the wider activities in the benefice. There is always loads to talk about and over the next couple of years we are planning some improvements to our churches, including the installation of a toilet and kitchenette in Kelsale church. Funding needs to be raised for such a large project and we would welcome ideas for fundraising events.

My first year in ordained ministry has been busy but very enjoyable, and I'm excited to see what comes next.

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Making Tax Digital: What the HMRC Letter Means for You

HMRC has started sending out its first wave of letters to individual taxpayers likely to be affected by the next phase of Making Tax Digital (MTD) for Income Tax Self-Assessment (ITSA).

Starting April 2026, MTD will become mandatory for self-employed individuals and landlords with income over £50,000 annually (income is defined as gross self-employment income plus gross rental income before expenses as shown on your tax return for the year ended 5 April 2025).

Those earning between £30,000 and £50,000 will be brought into the system from April 2027, and eventually, those earning over £20,000 will be included from April 2028. In short, MTD is coming for a lot of people.

Those affected by the rules will need to keep income and expense records digitally and use MTD-compatible software to submit quarterly updates to HMRC.

If you're already using accounting software and keeping your records neat and tidy, you're likely in a good position. But if your current bookkeeping involves a shoebox full of receipts and a once-a-year panic, it's time to think about going digital or hiring someone who can help.

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

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PROJECT UPDATE

JULY 2025

Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

You may have seen recent media coverage regarding funding of the Sizewell C. On Tuesday 10 June, the UK government gave the go-ahead for Sizewell C. This is the first British-owned nuclear power station to be announced in over three decades, with the government as a majority shareholder alongside EDF.

The Chancellor confirmed £14.2 billion of investment will be allocated to the project. It is the first nuclear power station in the UK to be funded through a Regulated Asset Base (RAB) model. Under the model, consumers are protected through independent regulation, strict cost controls, and transparent oversight – so families benefit from secure, low-carbon energy without the risk of cost overruns.

We are aware there are several key summer events coming up. We are in direct contact with Latitude and will work around their peak traffic times and remove our HGVs. For the Ed Sheeran concerts, we are working with Suffolk County Council to ensure disruption at Darsham Station does not affect travel. We will also not have any HGV movements during the Aldeburgh Carnival. The closure of Willow Marsh Lane will require cyclists on the Dunwich Dynamo to take the official diversion so we will actively communicate this on social media. GPS maps have been updated so riders can follow the designated route.

We have now installed average speed cameras along the B1122 and B1125 to further enhance road safety for the 30mph speed limit. We are also upgrading the temporary Sizewell C A-frame signs along the A14, A12 and local roads to permanent signs on posts. Further speed restrictions along the A12 are being implemented, including south of Yoxford, to ensure road safety as HGVs and construction vehicles manoeuvre on the sites. Further speed restrictions will be implemented in due course on the A12 at Darsham and the Friday Street turning.

Pre-construction works are progressing well and the roads, roundabouts and park rides will start construction this summer. The main site and temporary construction area are also preparing for construction, along with the temporary sea defence works along the beach.

Preparation for the Friday Street Roundabout is ongoing, with a works compound being established, and the vegetation and tree clearance along the A12 is almost complete. Site preparation along the two-village bypass route around Farnham and Stratford St Andrew is also ongoing, and Yoxford Roundabout is being prepared for construction.
