

# FROM WOODBRIDGE TOWN COUNCIL

To commemorate the 80th anniversary of VE Day, Woodbridge Town Council organised a Peace Day on Saturday 10th May. The proceedings started at 12 noon at the Shire Hall with a march led by the Royal British Legion Band, processing through the town centre and finishing in Elmhurst Park. The park was a hive of activity starting with the bandstand where musical entertainment reflected the 1940s. Radiating around the park were various stalls from local organisations, a refreshment marquee, organised by the Town Council, and purveyors offering a variety of food and drink.

Amongst those stalls could be found Woodbridge Rotary who ran a Wine Tombola, alongside a stall manned by the ladies of Woodbridge Inner Wheel. It proved a successful event with glorious weather ensuring a good turnout. Our bottle stall raised a worthwhile amount which will be allocated to one or more of the charities we support. In addition, we had permission to organise a bucket collection which raised over £958 to be donated to the Rotary Foundation charity.

Advance warning is helpful from the catering perspective - the food provided is very good indeed - you will find contact details are below.





# FELIXSTOWE LOVES SUMMER WEEKEND EVENTS 2025

#### Headliners Jazzie B - DJ set - and Aswad Live

Jazzie B, the double Grammy Award winning founder of Soul II Soul, and Aswad, Britain's biggest reggae act, are to headline the new 'Felixstowe Loves' events this summer on 15th – 17th August and 6th - 7th September.

Two new cultural weekends in Felixstowe, will feature live music and DJs, art, family activities and food and drink stalls across the town and on the sea front.

August's headline DJ Jazzie B, founder and frontman of Sou I II Soul, needs no introduction. Writer and producer of chart and club hits, such as 'Back to Life' and 'Keep On Movin', and winner of two Grammys, he was the first Sound System sound man to be awarded an OBE. He has been a regular on London radio since Kiss FM was a pirate station. He ran Motown in the UK and was asked to present James Brown with a Lifetime Achievement award by James Brown himself. Jazzie was awarded the Ivor Novello Award for inspiration; which described him as "the man who gave British black music a soul of its own". Don't miss him playing a beach front DJ set to kick-off the new 'Felixstowe Loves' weekends this summer. Aswad are arguably Britain's biggest Reggae act and appear at Felixstowe Loves as part of their 50th anniversary year! They've been performing since the 1970s and their albums, such as New Chapter in Dub and Live and Direct, and tracks such as Shine and Love Don't Turn Around, have spanned decades of chart and genre defining success. The band have played major events across the globe and headlined venues such as London's Royal Albert Hall and Montego Bay's Reggae Sunsplash. They bring their sunshine reggae and dub music to Felixstowe's shoreline in September.

The 'Felixstowe Loves' events are organised by Felixstowe BID and will feature international and local music acts and DJs, art and craft stalls, street food, bars, make and do art workshops, rides, family entertainments, eco-sessions, active participation events and a large-scale community art project, 'The Wall of Hearts'.

The multi-venue weekend will include events at the sea front Promenade, Beach Street, The Triangle, The Alex and more venues to be announced. Most of the weekend events are free to attend, but some events, such as the Jazzie B and Aswad, need attendees to register for tickets for audience management reasons. For those that want to help support future events, there is a donation ticket. Felixstowe BID (Business Improvement District) was formed in 2021. The BID represents 280 Businesses in a zone that stretches along the seafront and through the town centre.





## BAWDSEY RADAR MUSEUM

On the site of the world's first operational radar station, the Bawdsey Radar Museum is open 11am to 4pm on Thursdays, Sundays and Bank Holiday Mondays until the end of October. Don't forget, kids get in free!

In August we celebrate the world's first airborne radar experiments at Martlesham Heath. To commemorate these events the Bawdsey Radar Trust, in conjunction with the Defence Electronics History Society and the Communications and Electronics Museum Trust, will be holding an event at Adastral Park, the home to BT's research and innovation labs at Martlesham Heath on 15th August 2025.

There will be two sessions open to members of the public.

Session 1, on the morning of 15th August, will consist of a series of mini-presentations aimed at those with little or no technical background, and will give the opportunity to see replicas of the original airborne radar equipment.

Session 2, on the afternoon of 15th August, will consist of longer presentations for those with some technical background. Advanced booking is essential, via the website. £12.50 per person per session.



### REPORT FROM CEEC

### Climate & Ecological Emergency Committee

Hello people of Woodbridge and beyond; people of the Deben estuary

Addressing our town's biodiversity resources has been prioritised in the town's newly developed climate action plan. Our carefully designed, first major project, will result in time with a very attractive mix of hedging and larger standard tree planting - all native species. New shaded areas for human seating and, most importantly, new protective habitat for other than human wildlife will develop. And, with its determined line of new plantations, the Kingston Field is immediately more secured from unauthorised vehicles parking on our town's recreation field.

In 2025, Suffolk, UK experienced its driest and hottest spring since at least 1974. The spring was also the warmest on record for the UK as a whole (breaking the previous record of 2024). Specifically, the spring months of March, April, and May saw below-average rainfall and significantly higher-than-average temperatures.

Hence, we had an immediate challenge to our best efforts in Kingston field. I'm happy to say that WTC rose to the challenge with especially purchased watering equipment and many hours of council employee dedicated labour.

It takes a few years for these small 'whips' to establish a root system and without such thoughtful human assistance the planting over the winter would have been a shrivelled-up waste of time and resources before the first summer began.

The biodiversity crisis - often overlooked by the generic use of the term 'climate crisis' - IS an issue that we can usefully and appreciably address at a local level.

There has been a catastrophic 73% decline in the average size of monitored wildlife populations in just 50 years (1970-2020), according to the World Wildlife Fund's (WWF) Living Planet Report 2024. The report warns that parts of our planetary home are approaching dangerous tipping points driven by the combination of nature loss and climate change which pose grave threats to humanity (England is amongst the most denatured environments in Europe).

However, town by town concerned citizens can restore habitable areas for non-human animals by building networks of interconnection. Locally, the ever resourceful Mr Martin continues, with CEEC support to develop 'bee-highways' to supplement his bee hotel initiative by strategically positioning feeding stations of wild flowers in such a manner that pollinators can move around in - AND beyond - Woodbridge and thus continue to do their essential work in maintaining the eco-system that they, you and I depend upon.

We have placed 3 bird baths in Elmhurst Park, and the specific encouragement of wetland areas are under consideration in Fen meadow; a handsome boardwalk has been installed across the bottom path before the steps.

A provisional agreement has been reached - subject to stringent health & safety precautionary checks - to locate our first WTC sponsored pond in Elmhurst Park in what used to be the rose bed (just below the bandstand). And we continue to discuss possibilities for both rainwater harvesting and surface water capture - to enable us to be off-grid with our watering needs, and also to render us more resilient to the increasing phenomenon of flash-flooding.

I am proud to be working on the CEEC with a council that claims to be an 'earth protector town' (see badge above) and to participate in and witness our accumulating momentum. Some of us may well experience moments of despair and hopelessness when viewing the ecocidal 'business as usual' antics on an increasingly fractured and unravelling world stage? The old adage "think global, act local" is a welcome refuge, at whatever level we might engage with it. For example - is there anything you can do in your garden; ponds, insect hotels, wilded areas, even bowls of water or upturned dustbin lids, placed outdoors for birds and small mammals during the inevitable drought periods we will face during the long hot summer that has been forecasted.

No garden? You might consider offering a watering volunteer shift; feel part of a team of concerned, like-minded townsfolk who, in years to come will take pride in knowing that they contributed to the thriving habitat area of Kingston field. Interested? - drop us a line.

### **WOODBRIDGE TIDE MILL NEWS**

On Thursday 29 May The Woodbridge and Melton Society and the Woodbridge Tide Mill Charitable Trust unveiled a Blue Plaque on Woodbridge Tide Mill honouring Mrs Jean Gardner. Mrs Gardner bought the near derelict Mill in 1968 for £7,300 and encouraged its restoration. In 1977 she gave it to the Town for the enjoyment of the people of Woodbridge. It is now the only working tide mill in the UK and still produces stoneground flour.

The unveiling, attended by invited guests from the community and four generations of Jean Gardner's extended family. The plaque was unveiled by George one of her greatgreat grandsons. Woodbridge Tide Mill Museum Chair, John Carrington comments "The Mill's Trustees cannot overstate the importance of Mrs Jean Gardner who purchased the Mill to save it. Mrs Gardner approached Norman Scarfe, a local historian, after hearing him lecture on the Mill's plight. They discussed the possibility of her buying and restoring it. Time was short but at its auction in May 1968 Mrs Gardner became the proud owner of a ruined Mill and granary!

"This unique and attractive part of the Woodbridge Riverside is a tribute to the generosity of Mrs Jean Gardner, without whom it would surely have been lost. The Tide Mill remains a symbol of the Suffolk tourist industry. It is one of the most photographed, painted and drawn buildings in the East of England, and attracts the attention and interest of mill enthusiasts worldwide.

"We are grateful to the work of the Woodbridge and Melton Society in securing this lasting tribute to the lady that saved the Mill".

### A summer butterfly walk in Bonny Wood, Barking.

Suffolk Wildlife Trust, Woodbridge Wildlife group invite you to join them for a butterfly walk to the ancient Bonny Wood near Barking on Saturday 12 July at 2 pm.

"We are meeting at Barking Tye Village Hall from where we will take the 15-20 minute walk along public footpaths to this delightful reserve" said Phil Smith, Chairman of the SWT Woodbridge Wildlife Group.

"Bonny Wood is part of Barking Tye Woods, a site of special scientific interest and, weather permitting, is a good place to spot a range of butterflies. We'll also be on the lookout for woodland flowers and birds."

The walk starts from Barking Tye Village Hall car park, IP6 8HP (TM 076524). Participants should bring binoculars and wear strong and waterproof footwear, as this reserve can be wet and muddy. Also bring a drink and sun hat.

Places on this walk are strictly limited and must be pre-booked by contacting Suffolk Wildlife Trust. The cost is £5 per person with under 25s free and bookings can be made online through www.suffolkwildlifetrust.org (events section) or by telephoning them on 01473 890089.

Our research indicates that William was born in Woodbridge in 1811. His father, another William (1782-1851) was also a carpenter as was his grandfather, yet another William (1756-1826).

William married Lucy Wightman in 1835 in London and from census records of 1841 and 1851 it looks like he stayed in London until his death.

His parents William and Elizabeth (nee Gosling) lived in The Thoroughfare in 1841 and in Sun Lane in 1851.

William is listed as a furniture maker in the Dictionary of British & Irish Furniture Makers.





# PROJECT UPDATE

### **JULY 2025**

## Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

You may have seen recent media coverage regarding funding of the Sizewell C. On Tuesday 10 June, the UK government gave the go-ahead for Sizewell C. This is the first British-owned nuclear power station to be announced in over three decades, with the government as a majority shareholder alongside EDF.

The Chancellor confirmed £14.2 billion of investment will be allocated to the project. It is the first nuclear power station in the UK to be funded through a Regulated Asset Base (RAB) model. Under the model, consumers are protected through independent regulation, strict cost controls, and transparent oversight – so families benefit from secure, low-carbon energy without the risk of cost overruns.

We are aware there are several key summer events coming up. We are in direct contact with Latitude and will work around their peak traffic times and remove our HGVs. For the Ed Sheeran concerts, we are working with Suffolk County Council to ensure disruption at Darsham Station does not affect travel. We will also not have any HGV movements during the Aldeburgh Carnival. The closure of Willow Marsh Lane will require cyclists on the Dunwich Dynamo to take the official diversion so we will actively communicate this on social media. GPS maps have been updated so riders can follow the designated route.

We have now installed average speed cameras along the B1122 and B1125 to further enhance road safety for the 30mph speed limit. We are also upgrading the temporary Sizewell C A-frame signs along the A14, A12 and local roads to permanent signs on posts. Further speed restrictions along the A12 are being implemented, including south of Yoxford, to ensure road safety as HGVs and construction vehicles manoeuvre on the sites. Further speed restrictions will be implemented in due course on the A12 at Darsham and the Friday Street turning.

Pre-construction works are progressing well and the roads, roundabouts and park rides will start construction this summer. The main site and temporary construction area are also preparing for construction, along with the temporary sea defence works along the beach.

Preparation for the Friday Street Roundabout is ongoing, with a works compound being established, and the vegetation and tree clearance along the A12 is almost complete. Site preparation along the two-village bypass route around Farnham and Stratford St Andrew is also ongoing, and Yoxford Roundabout is being prepared for construction.

### BENTWATERS COLD WAR MUSEUM

Back in 1991, as the Cold War ended and the bases of RAF Bentwaters and RAF Woodbridge faced closure, something unusual was seen leaving the Bentwaters base.

The 527th Aggressor Squadron had left in 1990, flying out their F-16 fighters, and the other A-10 squadrons had yet to wind down before leaving in 1993. But in 1991 a 1/5th scale model of a F-16 that had been on display, mounted on a plinth next to the Command Post, was transported to the Imperial War Museum at Duxford after the United States Air Force donated it to the museum.

It remained there on display until 2014 and was then put into storage. By then the Bentwaters Cold War Museum had opened and it seemed fitting that the F-16 "came home". After some lobbying and negotiations, permission was granted and in early 2023 the volunteers at BCWM collected the model and the "baby F-16" was at last back where it belonged. However, the task of moving the plinth to be nearer the museum (located in the Command Post) and then the installation of the model proved to be quite a challenge.

Eventually in spring 2025 the F-16 with its new paintwork and markings that reflect the 527th was positioned and unveiled. It had involved not only some manhandling by the volunteer staff (it is heavy and awkward), but mechanical help from local JCB dealer G & J Peck who provided a Telehandler to lift the plinth over the fence. The model now sits proudly at the front of the main museum entrance and gives visitors an opportunity for spectacular photos. Many thanks to G & J Peck at Bentwaters Parks.

The museum is open on the first and third Sundays of each month to October and Bank Holiday Sunday and Mondays, 10.00 to 4.00. It's a great place for local families to come and visit and enjoy your local tourist attraction ... and kids are free too!
