



#### Aldeburgh Hosts Inaugural Comedy Weekend with a Star-Studded Celebration of Laughter

# Monday 18 August, approximately 11am, Demonstration Launch

RNLI Aldeburgh are proud to be a part of Aldeburgh Carnival again this year, with a demonstration launch planned for approximately 11am. As with all planned launches, this is subject to weather and operational requirements.

Commentary from the crew will explain the process of launching the lifeboats, will talk through some of the manoeuvres happening close to the beach to give you a good view of what normally happens out at sea and will then explain how to recover the lifeboats (and our local volunteer crew!) safely back to shore.

#### Saturday 23 August, 10am – 4pm, Street Fair and Open Day

The Aldeburgh Lifeboat Fundraising Guild will have lots of interesting stalls for you to browse in the morning, and the lifeboat operational staff will show you around our town's two lifeboats, D-class Susan Scott and Atlantic 85, Ralph throughout the day.

#### Saturday 30 August, 2.30pm, Naming Ceremony

Everyone is welcome on the beach for the Naming Ceremony and Service of Dedication of the lifeboat B-949 Ralph. This is an outdoor event, so please check the weather forecast and dress appropriately. Flat shoes are advised due to uneven surfaces.

There is no parking at the lifeboat station. Parking has been arranged at Queen's Field, Park Road, Aldeburgh IP15 5HY, which is approximately a 10 minute walk to the lifeboat station. Parking ///what3words: Arranges. Applauded. Collects.

Since formation, their lifeboats have launched 1,267 times and saved 693 lives. Aldeburgh lifeboat station has two boats on service: Atlantic 85 lifeboat, Ralph, and D class inshore lifeboat, Susan Scott.







# TRIATHLON 10TH ANNIVERSARY

The Aldeburgh fun relay triathlon is about to celebrate its 10th year of running, having started in 2015 with 50 teams as a trial event and growing ever since to a regular 100+ teams made up of families, friends and work colleagues with several having multiple teams for friendly inhouse rivalry and challenges between them and others on the day. Each team comprises of a swimmer, a cyclist and a runner and distances are 750m swim, 22km cycle and a 5km run with a relay handover between each member once they finish their bit for the team! It's aimed at being fun and encouraging the local community to take part in some outdoor sport as part of a team and supporting others taking part.

When we formed a Community Interest Company (CIC) called Heritage coast events, an important part of our volunteering was to raise funds for both local and relevant national charities and so far we have raised over £45,000 which includes donations to the Aldeburgh RNLI, East Anglian Air Ambulance, Knodishall Cancer Research, Aldeburgh United Charities and many more over our 10 years and we hope to continue to grow our total raised again this year. # ALDE VALLEY SUFFOLK FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

We recently welcomed (online), Janet Few, an experienced social historian who lectures and is author of books including the handbook, 'Family Historian Enquire Within'. Janet is President of the Family History Federation and is passionate about encouraging young people to become interested in the past.

Janet's talk was about 'Husbandry, Housewifery and Home Working - Women's Lives on the Farm'. Using illustrations, Janet told us about women's work in the farmhouse, including butter and cheese making, made for family use with surplus sold at market. Butter was made in the spring when milk was more creamy and was mainly used in baking. Cheese could be made all year round.

Before tea was affordable for most people, ale or beer were the main drinks, again made by the farmer's wife, the ingredients being sourced from the farm. Bread formed a staple food until potatoes became more commonly grown. The farmer's wife would have a small hand mill to grind her own grain, hence the term 'daily grind'. Bread ovens were heated up with wood and when at the right temperature, ash was scraped out and the loaf was put in and baked with other items as the oven cooled. The loaf would be gritty on the base so it was sliced horizontally, hence the "upper crust" being the best piece.

Pickling, potting and preserving were important, to use up fruits and vegetables. Chickens were kept for their eggs, mainly used in baking and to sell for pin money. Spinning, weaving and dyeing of wool was another skill women learnt.

The only source of water would be from a pond, a well, or a spring - otherwise it required a walk to the village pump.

Cottage industries enabled women to work at home, so called 'piece work'. Glovers, buttoners, stockingers, lace makers, and straw plaiters were very common. One member commented at the end of Janet's talk that there were several plaiters known in Benhall and hat makers in Saxmundham.

Janet gave us a lot of interesting information about the lives of women; often their occupation was not even recorded on census forms. J

# Saturday Night Sides

After its successful debut last summer, our SATURDAY NIGHT SIDES season returns to deliver a hand-picked selection of classic movies – modern and not-so-modern – that celebrate Saturday nights at the movies. The final line-up isn't confirmed, but we confirm three of the movies that will feature...



# LEISTON BOOK FESTIVAL



And again, the festival will be devoted to writing about nature and the environment, making it unique among literary festivals. Each of the six authors on the programme writes from a different perspective about our changing landscape. Together they form a daylong event that will inform, inspire and perhaps encourage you to see the world a little differently.

#### Festival line-up

Patrick Barkham, The Swimmer: the wild life of Roger Deakin: Patrick is natural history writer for the Guardian and is one of a generation of authors who have revitalized nature-writing in Britain.

His books include *The Butterfly Isles*, Coastlines and Badgerlands.

His work has been short-listed for the Ondaatje Prize and the Wainwright Prize. His new book is a creative biography of the late Roger Deakin, writer, film-maker and environmentalist. The story is told primarily in the words of the subject himself, with support from a chorus of friends, family, colleagues, lovers and neighbours.



Richard Negus, Words from the Hedge: a hedge-layer's view of the countryside:

Richard is passionate about the human skill and effort that go into the creation and nurturing of hedgerows, emblems of the British countryside that are often taken for granted. Well-known for his 'Letter from the Country' on BBC Radio Suffolk, in this book he brings to life the biodiversity that hedgerows foster and introduces the men and women who deal with the everyday complexities of modern farming, conservation and countryside stewardship.



Melissa Harrison, Homecoming: a guided journal to bring you back to nature: Melissa's novel At Hawthorn Time was longlisted for the Bailey's Women's Prize for Fiction. All Among the Barley, set in East Anglia in 1933, offers what the Guardian described as "an in-thebone connection with the natural world". Melissa's book The Stubborn Light of Things is based on the monthly nature notebook she contributes to The Times. This, her latest book has been described as "a simple, friendly and – above all - accessible nature journal for anyone who wants to observe more of the world around them".

Patrick Galbraith, Uncommon Ground: rethinking our relationship with the countryside: Patrick appeared at the book festival in 2024 discussing his book In Search of One Last Song, about Britain's disappearing birds and the people trying to save them. It is regarded as one of the most important books on the countryside of recent years. The Sunday Times calls Uncommon Ground "a curious-minded and subtle intervention in the politics of the countryside". Patrick writes for the Observer, the Spectator, The Times and the Daily Telegraph.

He is a columnist for *Country Life* and *The Critic* and runs the literary magazine *Boundless*.

Tom Heap, Land Smart: how to give people and nature the space to thrive:

Tom is well-known as a presenter on BBC's Countryfile, Radio 4's Rare Earth and The Climate Show on Sky News. In Land Smart he journeys through the British countryside, speaking with farmers, researchers, conservationists and even logistics experts who are developing innovative approaches to land use. Their work offers hope for a future where both people and the planet can flourish.

lan Collins, Blythe Spirit: the remarkable life of Ronald Blythe:

At the memorial service for Ronald Blythe, who died in January 2023 at the age of 100, it was said he ensured that the enduring beauty of Suffolk and the tenacity of its people were immortalized through his prose. Drawing on unparalleled access to letters, notebooks, published works, drafts and conversations over many decades, his close friend lan Collins tells the full story of Ronald Blythe's life for the first time.



I spect I'll be gorn dowen to Aldeburgh Carnival in a few weeks and I usually like to sit up on the beach and watch the world go by and everyone getting chased by the sausage if they see it sticking out of the bag. I love watching the Carnival lantern parade at night and seeing the sky light up with all them fireworks, sitting on my fold up chair and listening to everyone gorn "ew" and "arr" as the fireworks go up and then pop. # ALDEBURGH GARDENING CLUB

Some plants actually seem to have enjoyed the dry spring. My various Agapanthus all have multiple buds here in early July even the ones that usually only produce one or two if I am lucky. I am somewhat puzzled by repeated references to the 'warm spring' we had by various weather folk because it didn't feel very warm to me. That continual easterly or northerly wind that went on for weeks and weeks felt ruddy cold to me and I saw precious little evidence in my garden that the plants were coming on early. I was glad in fact that I had delayed planting squash seed for a week or two as it was too cold to plant them out.

On the other hand, my fruit bushes are doing remarkably poorly. I am currently picking raspberries but the crop is sparse and shrunken. My tayberry is having another bad year. It didn't like the rain last year and produced relatively few new 'canes', though the ones I did get are cropping alright this year. I have only got a couple of very wimpish shoots for next year though and am wondering what I can do. They got a dressing of homemade compost and have been watered through this drought, so I am at a loss. I really like tayberries for cooking, they are more tart than the raspberries and have more flavour than the blackberries so I'd really like to keep them going.

The newish gooseberry that I got a good crop from last year actually died on me early this year and never produced any leaf at all. I was very surprised as they have always seemed pretty tough and survive annual attacks of defoliating gooseberry sawfly even if they don't grow very fast. Two blackcurrant bushes have never done very well and I took them out over the winter too, so I am rather depleted of fruit. I have a strong worcesterberry cutting from the garden club plant sale and am told that is very vigorous so maybe that can fill a gap in the freezer next year or I may have to wait till the year after.

It is all very vexing. Last year I had a fantastic crop of squash and was eating the last of them at the end of February, in spite of giving one big Crown Prince to the gardening club raffle table and palming off large chunks to friends, cleaner and gardener. The only thing that didn't do so well were the courgettes. I shall have to make sure I keep up with the watering this year if I want another bumper crop or they will go the same way as the fruit bushes.

Meanwhile, occasional watering in the front garden has been enough to produce the usual display from the purple phlox (no I have no idea what variety it is) and the lemon daylily (whichford). The orange flower in the middle of the picture is an antirrhinum, 'potomac orange' which I grew from seed as a half hardy annual. It is reputed to reach 5 feet but as you can see is struggling to get to two. I never expected 5' on this soil but the dryness hasn't helped. It is nice though and I might save some seed and try it again.



# CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

#### Eligible for PIP or UC? Apply before the rules change

There has been a great deal of talk recently about proposed changes to government disability and health benefits, specifically to Personal Independence Payment (PIP) and the health component of Universal Credit (UC). While some proposals were knocked down in June 2025, the government still has plans to improve the efficiency, fairness, and targeting of these benefits.

#### What are these benefits? When might they change?

Personal Independence Payment (PIP) is a government benefit for people with a long-term illness or disability. It is designed for people of working age to help with the extra costs associated with daily tasks (like dressing, cooking, washing, and managing medication) and/or with mobility (walking, moving about safely). PIP is not means-tested, which means you can apply whatever your income, savings, or employment status.

The government are planning changes to the rules for claiming PIP. We don't know exactly what these are yet (and will tell you when we do) but they won't come into effect until 2026. This means....if you think you may be eligible for PIP you should apply this year as fewer people will qualify when the rules change. First though, check your eligibility, and read how DWP assessors make their decisions (see helpful websites below). And if you find long application forms daunting, ask Citizens Advice for help.

Universal Credit, health element. Universal Credit (UC) is a means tested benefit for people of working age and their families who have low incomes and few savings. You can be employed, self-employed, or not working but you must meet the low income and savings criteria. The health component of Universal Credit gives people with disabilities or long-term health conditions additional money.

The amount is tailored to the severity of the condition. Claimants have a 'Work Capability Assessment' (WCA) determining whether they must look for work/more work or not, and how much they get.

The government are planning changes to the amount of Universal Credit people can receive, and how the health element of UC is assessed. It is likely that the **rules for the WCA** will be tightened. However, changes will not happen before April 2026. This means...if you don't get any benefits and you're on a low income with few savings you should make a claim for UC soon. You might get more money if you apply before the rules change. Again, Citizens Advice can help you claim. Have a look at these useful websites before making a new application for PIP or UC:

# The Fortnight in September by R.C Sheriff

This is a simple story, first published in 1931, told in a few penny-plain words about a small suburban family on their annual fortnight's holiday at Bognor. The family is made up of man and wife, a grown-up daughter working for a dressmaker, a son just started in a London office, and a younger boy still at school. It is a day-to-day account of their holiday, from their last evening at home until the day they packed their bags for their return; how they came out of their shabby boarding house every morning and went down to the sea; how the father found hope for the future in his brief freedom from work; how the children found romance and adventure; how the mother, scared of the sea, tried to make the others think she was enjoying it.

The book is appealing for its simplicity and its universality. You will see yourself reflected in the holiday arrangements, the flutters about train journeys, buying tickets and the arrangements for looking after the canary, to name just a few.

"For six years now, Mrs Haykin had looked after the canary when the Stevens went away. For six years, to the Stevens' own knowledge Mrs. Haykin had not been away herself. The Stevens' holiday had become Mrs. Haykin's holiday: she lived every moment of it from her little house in Corunna Road."

You will find yourself in sympathy with all of the characters and be moved by their humanity, it is a great holiday read that engages you from start to finish in its modest and understated way.

# PROJECT UPDATE

# **AUGUST 2025**

## Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

Last month, Sizewell C announced plans to build a new post-16 college for its host town in Suffolk a move that could transform higher education access in the area and ensure a long-term skills legacy for the region. The Further Education (FE) college will be delivered in partnership with Suffolk New College and will be an extension of their current local provision, known as 'On the Coast'. It will be a permanent highquality post-16 education facility for Leiston, which will deliver comprehensive, multi-site education and training. Further details regarding location and planning requirements will be outlined shortly. For further information visit sizewellc.com/news.

Construction of the northern section of the temporary sea defence has started with the first sheet piles being installed. The works will take place within the Sizewell C fence line and the public footpath will remain open. We apologise for any noise disturbance which we will endeavour to keep to a minimum. Works will soon commence on installing a temporary outfall on the beach. This work will be for a short duration and within a fenced compound.

Site preparation, including construction compounds and welfare facilities, ecology and archaeology mitigations, continues at our Northern Park and Ride In Darsham. Construction of the roundabout next to the A12 and Willow Marsh Lane has started. To aid road safety for all road users a 30 mph speed limit on the A12 is planned between the A144 and the Darsham level crossing.

Similarly in Wickham Market work will conclude this summer. As areas become clear of archaeology work, construction will begin in a phased manner.

From the week commencing 7th July, track works will start along the Leiston branch line. Work will include lifting and removing of old track and ballast. Once this phase is complete, there will new track and

The works will be carried out by engineering trains and specialist tracklaying plant including along the track, initially in the section to the west of Leiston. The work can be noisy and create dust, however we will have dust suppression in place to minimise the impact. Working hours will be from approximately 07:00 to 19:00.

# LLOYDS TOUR OF BRITAIN MEN

A day later the second stage of the race will start and finish in Stowmarket, hosted by Mid Suffolk District Council and neighbouring Babergh District Council, as two stages of the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men take place in the county for the first time.

The announcement follows the success of this year's Lloyds Tour of Britain Women in June, which saw an action-packed edition of the race only decided in the final sprint to the line in Glasgow, as Kiwi rider Ally Wollaston claimed victory.

Cllr Sarah Whitelock, East Suffolk Council's cabinet member for Communities, Culture, Leisure and Tourism, said: "We are excited to welcome the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men back to East Suffolk for the third consecutive year, and to be hosting the opening stage. This is the UK's largest free-to-spectate live sporting event and directly benefits local businesses and communities. The Tour, and the community activities which accompany it, also helps to promote the physical and mental health benefits of cycling to all ages and abilities and showcases East Suffolk as a cycle friendly destination to a national audience."

Having hosted the final stage of the 2024 Lloyds Tour of Britain Men, East Suffolk will now host the start of racing in September 2025, marking the first time since 2012 that the overall race has begun in Suffolk, and a debut for Woodbridge as a host venue for the event.

Southwold has never hosted the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men, but has twice seen the women's race visit, most recently in 2018 when Jolien D'hoore won a stage finishing on North Parade in the town.

The exact stage route for the opening leg of the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men may have been published by the time this goes to print but will include passing through Wickham Market, Aldeburgh, Saxmundham, Framlingham, Halesworth, Bungay, and Beccles.

For the second stage, Stowmarket will host the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men for the first time, though like Southwold has hosted a finish of the women's race, also won by Jolien D'hoore in 2019.

The route of stage two will include Debenham and Eye in Mid Suffolk, and Sudbury and Hadleigh in Babergh.

Cllr John Ward, leader of Babergh District Council said: "This is fantastic opportunity for us to showcase Babergh's beautiful landscapes, towns and villages to an international audience.

"We're also committed to providing opportunities to get involved in sports and physical activity and by hosting this international event showcasing prominent cyclists we hope to inspire the next generation of budding athletes right here in Suffolk."

Commenting on the announcement of the opening stages, Jonathan Day, Managing Director of British Cycling Events, said; "Having finished the Lloyds Tour of Britain Women with some great racing and a fantastic festival of cycling in Glasgow, our attention is now on September and the return of the men's event. We are delighted to begin our announcements with the news that East Suffolk will host the opening stage, and two new venues – Woodbridge and Southwold – will appear on the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men map. Then moving onto stage 2 and a huge thanks to our partners at Babergh and Mid Suffolk, which will see Stowmarket become the third new venue for the men's race, ensuring a fantastic opening two days in the beautiful Suffolk countryside.

"Over the coming weeks we look forward to sharing more exciting details about this year's race with fans and building up to what will be another incredible edition of the Lloyds Tour of Britain."

Further announcements about the host venues of the other four stages, as well as the participating teams for the Lloyds Tour of Britain will be made over the coming weeks.

# FRAMLINGHAM AND SAXMUNDHAM CATS PROTECTION



# **BUNGAY FOLK FESTIVAL**

The second Bungay Folk Festival, over the weekend of September 5 - 7, will feature 35 different acts, the most well known of which is Eliza McCarthy, one of the most recognisable faces in British folk, who is booked for two concerts at the Fisher Theatre.

The Indian-influenced folk collective Mishra are booked along with The King Driscolls, Orchestra of Samples, The John Ward Trio, Christina Alden and Alex Patterson.

Some of the 35 booked acts have already been active in the area: Rumburgh Morris were around at dawn for the May Day celebrations on Broome Heath, later that week, amidst the ancient barrows at the Annis Hill Community Woodland, Paul Gill led the crowd with May Day songs and traditional English tunes. Whirligig, who will close the festival on Sunday, September 7, appeared at St James South Elmham, and on May 30 there was a concert at Bungay's Three Tuns promoting the festival with Gavin, Fairhall and Lever.

On July 17, BFF2025 teamed up with their friends at Black Shuck to provide the lunchtime concert courtesy of Artistic Fields in St Mary's Church.

Thanks to funding from Bungay Town Council, BEBA, East Suffolk Council and Suffolk County Council, Blake Harrison will be bringing his African drums to the festival and offering a free drum workshop to both adults and youngsters.

Norwich-based singer, Mary Lovett will lead a free singing workshop and Mog and his renegade Irish drums will make a second appearance with four workshops.

In addition, the festival organisers are determined to present free live folk music in all the town's venues including St Mary's Church, Trinity Church, The Bell Gallery, The Three Tuns and Bungay Castle Bailey.

Meanwhile at the Green Dragon and Three Tuns pubs the folk tune and sing-around sessions are continuing every month on the second and third Monday evenings from 7 - 10. Why not come along and join in or just come and listen?






