

Planning Applications: A reminder that residents can view and comment on planning applications via East Suffolk Council's Public Access system. Your local Town Council responds to applications in the parish at its planning committee meetings held every fourth Tuesday of the month at 6.30pm at Leiston Community Centre, King Georges Ave, and at Full Council meetings held every second Tuesday at 6.45pm. Public are welcome to attend and make representation. The final decision on planning applications is made by the local planning authority (East Suffolk Council).

We also wish to clarify that Discharges of Requirements related to Sizewell C are determined by the local planning authority (East Suffolk Council); the Town Council is not a consultee in this process but does note and monitor Discharges for any exceptions that might deem a response.

LEISTON BOOK FESTIVAL


The 2025 Leiston Book Festival will take place on Saturday 20 September, building on the success of the inaugural festival in 2024. As before, the venue will be the splendid Leiston Film Theatre. And again, the festival will be devoted to writing about nature and the environment, making it unique among literary festivals. Each of the six authors on the programme writes from a different perspective about our changing landscape. Together they form a daylong event that will inform, inspire and perhaps encourage you to see the world a little differently.

Festival line-up

Patrick Barkham, The Swimmer: the wild life of Roger Deakin: Patrick is natural history writer for the Guardian and is one of a generation of authors who have revitalized nature-writing in Britain.

His books include *The Butterfly Isles*, Coastlines and Badgerlands.

His work has been short-listed for the Ondaatje Prize and the Wainwright Prize. His new book is a creative biography of the late Roger Deakin, writer, film-maker and environmentalist. The story is told primarily in the words of the subject himself, with support from a chorus of friends, family, colleagues, lovers and neighbours.



Richard Negus, Words from the Hedge: a hedge-layer's view of the countryside:

Richard is passionate about the human skill and effort that go into the creation and nurturing of hedgerows, emblems of the British countryside that are often taken for granted. Well-known for his 'Letter from the Country' on BBC Radio Suffolk, in this book he brings to life the biodiversity that hedgerows foster and introduces the men and women who deal with the everyday complexities of modern farming, conservation and countryside stewardship.



Melissa Harrison, Homecoming: a guided journal to bring you back to nature: Melissa's novel At Hawthorn Time was longlisted for the Bailey's Women's Prize for Fiction. All Among the Barley, set in East Anglia in 1933, offers what the Guardian described as "an in-thebone connection with the natural world". Melissa's book The Stubborn Light of Things is based on the monthly nature notebook she contributes to The Times. This, her latest book has been described as "a simple, friendly and – above all - accessible nature journal for anyone who wants to observe more of the world around them".

Patrick Galbraith, Uncommon Ground: rethinking our relationship with the countryside: Patrick appeared at the book festival in 2024 discussing his book In Search of One Last Song, about Britain's disappearing birds and the people trying to save them. It is regarded as one of the most important books on the countryside of recent years. The Sunday Times calls Uncommon Ground "a curious-minded and subtle intervention in the politics of the countryside". Patrick writes for the Observer, the Spectator, The Times and the Daily Telegraph.

He is a columnist for Country Life and The Critic and runs the literary magazine Boundless.

Tom Heap, Land Smart: how to give people and nature the space to thrive:

Tom is well-known as a presenter on BBC's Countryfile, Radio 4's Rare Earth and The Climate Show on Sky News. In Land Smart he journeys through the British countryside, speaking with farmers, researchers, conservationists and even logistics experts who are developing innovative approaches to land use. Their work offers hope for a future where both people and the planet can flourish.

lan Collins, Blythe Spirit: the remarkable life of Ronald Blythe:

At the memorial service for Ronald Blythe, who died in January 2023 at the age of 100, it was said he ensured that the enduring beauty of Suffolk and the tenacity of its people were immortalized through his prose. Drawing on unparalleled access to letters, notebooks, published works, drafts and conversations over many decades, his close friend lan Collins tells the full story of Ronald Blythe's life for the first time.



The result is a sensitive, revelatory portrait which celebrates a fascinating, complex man and casts new light on one of our greatest writers.

The Leiston Book Festival taps into the creativity and innovation for which the Suffolk coast is celebrated, bringing together inspiring writers and enthusiastic readers for a day of exploration, debate and discovery. 

LEISTON FOOTBALL CLUB

The new football season gets underway at Leiston FC this month.

The Blues first team will be playing in the Southern League Premier Central Division once more and are one of four Suffolk sides who play at this, the highest level of non-league football in the county.

For the town of Leiston, having a team play at such a high level is a tremendous feat. Towns and cities the size of Worcester, Stratford, Kettering, Halesowen and Stourbridge will all be among the league visitors to Leiston this season, as well as local derbies with AFC Sudbury, Bury Town and Needham Market. It should all make for another exciting nine months or so, at Victory Road.

Meanwhile, the Blues U23s will compete in the Thurlow Nunn Division One North. The Blues put out a young side in this division and again come up against some very established teams, including Haverhill Borough, Haverhill Rovers, Framlingham, Harwich & Parkeston and Diss Town.

Leiston U18s will partake in the Thurlow Nunn Youth League, Central Division, while the Club's many Saturday and Sunday youth teams will also play throughout the season.

Joao's Special Message

Leiston have signed exciting Portuguese winger, Joao Rangel.

Joao put pen to paper in June and joins Chris Wigger's squad after joining from Lowestoft Town. He admits he can't wait to get going.

"I'm really happy to be joining Leiston," Rangel said. "It's a club with great ambition and I'm looking forward to being part of the journey. The fans can expect energy, creativity and someone who loves to attack and make things happen on the pitch.

"I want to contribute as much as I can with goals and assist and improve personally in every game."

Rangel was born in Lisbon and began his youth career at Norwich City, playing up to under-16s. After that he signed a two-year scholarship with Barnsley, then moved abroad and played in Portugal for Academica de Coimbra and Nogeuirense FC. Returning to England he has played at Steps three and four and internationally represented Portugal at U15 level. Recently he played for international side Timor-Leste in the AFC Asian qualifiers against the Maldives.

So, back at Leiston, what is he looking forward to most?

"I'm very much looking forward to working with the staff and my team-mates and meeting the Leiston fans. I'm excited to be part of this group."

Speaking of his new signing, boss Chris Wigger said: "Joao is a player I've followed for quite some time now. He first signed for Gorleston when he came back to Norfolk from Portugal, then Wroxham and finally Lowestoft Town.

"He's now had a decent season playing for Lowestoft, proved he's quite capable of holding his own at this level. He's blessed with incredible pace, and we are going to be looking for him to build on his fine performances for Lowestoft last year."





ALDE VALLEY SUFFOLK FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

We recently welcomed (online), Janet Few, an experienced social historian who lectures and is author of books including the handbook, 'Family Historian Enquire Within'. Janet is President of the Family History Federation and is passionate about encouraging young people to become interested in the past.

Janet's talk was about 'Husbandry, Housewifery and Home Working - Women's Lives on the Farm'. Using illustrations, Janet told us about women's work in the farmhouse, including butter and cheese making, made for family use with surplus sold at market. Butter was made in the spring when milk was more creamy and was mainly used in baking. Cheese could be made all year round.

Before tea was affordable for most people, ale or beer were the main drinks, again made by the farmer's wife, the ingredients being sourced from the farm. Bread formed a staple food until potatoes became more commonly grown. The farmer's wife would have a small hand mill to grind her own grain, hence the term 'daily grind'. Bread ovens were heated up with wood and when at the right temperature, ash was scraped out and the loaf was put in and baked with other items as the oven cooled.

The loaf would be gritty on the base so it was sliced horizontally, hence the "upper crust" being the best piece.

Pickling, potting and preserving were important, to use up fruits and vegetables. Chickens were kept for their eggs, mainly used in baking and to sell for pin money. Spinning, weaving and dyeing of wool was another skill women learnt. The only source of water would be from a pond, a well, or a spring - otherwise it required a walk to the village pump.

Cottage industries enabled women to work at home, so called 'piece work'. Glovers, buttoners, stockingers, lace makers, and straw plaiters were very common. One member commented at the end of Janet's talk that there were several plaiters known in Benhall and hat makers in Saxmundham.

Janet gave us a lot of interesting information about the lives of women; often their occupation was not even recorded on census forms. Janet's helpful handout can be downloaded from her website: https://thehistoryinterpreter.com/talks-and-presentations/handouts/





Pets in summer heat

As temperatures rise for summer it is important to remember to keep your pets safe to enjoy the summer sun. Dogs can suffer heatstroke within minutes, which can be fatal. Unlike humans, dogs can't sweat through their skin and so they rely on panting and releasing heat through their paw pads and nose to regulate their body temperature and keep cool. Signs of heat stroke include collapse, excessive panting, salivating and sometimes vomiting. If you suspect your pet is suffering from heat stroke move them to a cool, shaded place, preferably with a draught, thoroughly wet the coat with cool water, cover with a wet towel, and contact your vet immediately.

A few ways to keep your pet safe and prevent heatstroke:

- Make sure your dog has access to cold water at all times. Carry water and a bowl with you on walks.
- On hot days, walk your dog during the cooler parts of the day, in the early morning and late evening. If it is a hot day, it is advisable to do shorter walks on the lead only.
- Keep your pets in the shade in the summer between 11am and 3pm.
- Wetting the coat in the morning will ensure a cooler body temperature throughout the day.
- Watch your pet for signs of over-heating, including heavy panting and loss of energy. If you recognise these signs when on a walk, stop and find a shady spot and give your dog water.

It is important to remember that cars can become overheated very quickly. Even if it does not feel that warm outside, your car can reach an unbearable 47°c even if it is only 22°c outside.]This is why it is advised to NEVER leave your pet alone in a car, even with the windows open.

Be particularly careful with short nosed breeds (such as bull breeds, boxers, pugs), older dogs, and those that are overweight. These dogs can get heatstroke simply by running around. Pale-coloured skins are vulnerable to sunburn, particularly on their ears, noses and sparsely haired areas. Sun damage can lead to skin cancer. Sunlight can also make existing skin conditions worse, particularly if your dog has allergies.

You can apply a non-toxic waterproof human sunblock or one specifically made for pets. Paw pads can burn on hot pavements. As a general rule, if it's too hot for your hand it's too hot for their paws.

If your dog swims or paddles in the sea to keep cool, remember to rinse the salt water and sand from your dog's coat after swimming to avoid drying out and irritating their skin. Make sure they do not drink any salt water. Only allow your pet to swim in a safe place.

In the summer your pet's coat needs to be groomed/clipped short especially for longhaired breeds, to get rid of matts and tangles. A tangle-free coat will protect your pet's delicate skin and help to keep them cool.

Rabbits and small furries with matted unkempt coats run the risk of flystrike which is where blowflies lay their eggs, which hatch and become maggots. Elderly cats and rabbits with urine soiling around the tail area are big targets for flystrike.

Frozen doggy treats are always well received and cooling bandanas are another excellent way to help keep your pet cool.

PROJECT UPDATE

AUGUST 2025

Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

Last month, Sizewell C announced plans to build a new post-16 college for its host town in Suffolk – a move that could transform higher education access in the area and ensure a long-term skills legacy for the region. The Further Education (FE) college will be delivered in partnership with Suffolk New College and will be an extension of their current local provision, known as 'On the Coast'. It will be a permanent high-quality post-16 education facility for Leiston, which will deliver comprehensive, multi-site education and training. Further details regarding location and planning requirements will be outlined shortly. For further information visit sizewells.com/news.

Construction of the northern section of the temporary sea defence has started with the first sheet piles being installed. The works will take place within the Sizewell C fence line and the public footpath will remain open. We apologise for any noise disturbance which we will endeavour to keep to a minimum. Works will soon commence on installing a temporary outfall on the beach. This work will be for a short duration and within a fenced compound.

Site preparation, including construction compounds and welfare facilities, ecology and archaeology mitigations, continues at our Northern Park and Ride in Darsham. Construction of the roundabout next to the A12 and Willow Marsh Lane has started. To aid road safety for all road users a 30 mph speed limit on the A12 is planned between the A144 and the Darsham level crossing.

Similarly in Wickham Market work will conclude this summer. As areas become clear of archaeology work, construction will begin in a phased manner.

From the week commencing 7th July, track works will start along the Leiston branch line. Work will include lifting and removing of old track and ballast. Once this phase is complete, there will new track and ballast laying.

The works will be carried out by engineering trains and specialist tracklaying plant including along the track, initially in the section to the west of Leiston. The work can be noisy and create dust, however we will have dust suppression in place to minimise the impact. Working hours will be from approximately 07:00 to 19:00.

Eligible for PIP or UC? Apply before the rules change

There has been a great deal of talk recently about proposed changes to government disability and health benefits, specifically to Personal Independence Payment (PIP) and the health component of Universal Credit (UC).

While some proposals were knocked down in June 2025, the government still has plans to improve the efficiency, fairness, and targeting of these benefits.

What are these benefits? When might they change?

Personal Independence Payment (PIP) is a government benefit for people with a long-term illness or disability. It is designed for people of working age to help with the extra costs associated with daily tasks (like dressing, cooking, washing, and managing medication) and/or with mobility (walking, moving about safely). PIP is not means-tested, which means you can apply whatever your income, savings, or employment status.

The government are planning changes to the rules for claiming PIP. We don't know exactly what these are yet (and will tell you when we do) but they won't come into effect until 2026. This means....if you think you may be eligible for PIP you should apply this year as fewer people will qualify when the rules change. First though, check your eligibility, and read how DWP assessors make their decisions (see helpful websites below). And if you find long application forms daunting, ask Citizens Advice for help.

Universal Credit, health element. Universal Credit (UC) is a means tested benefit for people of working age and their families who have low incomes and few savings.

You can be employed, self-employed, or not working but you must meet the low income and savings criteria. The **health component of Universal Credit** gives people with disabilities or long-term health conditions additional money.

The amount is tailored to the severity of the condition. Claimants have a 'Work Capability Assessment' (WCA) determining whether they must look for work/more work or not, and how much they get.

The government are planning changes to the amount of Universal Credit people can receive, and how the health element of UC is assessed. It is likely that the **rules for the WCA** will be tightened. However, changes will not happen before April 2026. This means...if you don't get any benefits and you're on a low income with few savings you should make a claim for UC soon. You might get more money if you apply before the rules change. Again, Citizens Advice can help you claim. Have a look at these useful websites before making a new application for PIP or UC:

LEISTON ALLOTMENT HOLDER & GARDENERS ASSOCIATION

August is the harvest month, when you can enjoy the reward for all your hard work.

Vegetables: Time to harvest second early potatoes. Begin to lift onions for winter storage. If runner beans have reached the top of the canes, pinch out the growing 'tip' to help avoid getting tangled. Continue sowing salad crops, and "keep the hoe going".

Fruit: Protect all ripening from the birds. Finish summer pruning of apples and pears. Prune blackcurrants by removing any branches that have fruited this year. On red/white currants, reduce side shoots by about two thirds.

Flowers: Complete disbudding chrysanthemums of outdoor flowering varieties by the middle of the month to ensure blooming, in dry weather water once a week and keep well supported.

Hedges: Time for a final cut to evergreen hedges to enable them to be in good shape until next spring arrives.

Greenhouse: Cucumbers, tomatoes, and peppers should all be growing well. Keep them all well watered and feed them about every ten days. Sow cucumber seed thinly, as overcrowded seedlings become weak quickly and are more likely to get disease.

Remove male flowers as soon as they are seen. For cucumbers and tomatoes to flourish you need a humid atmosphere.

When the sun gets hot you may have to open ridge vents as well as opening windows.







THE RETURN OF AKENFIELD

Leading Costume Maker Constance Mackenzie to join the creative team on the AKENFIELD stage production.

SHAKE is delighted to announce that the international costume maker, Constance Mackenzie has joined the creative team for the new stage production of Akenfield.

Best known as the senior costumer maker on Wolf Hall: The Mirror and the Light, and as a daily costume maker on Downton Abbey 2, Constance was inspired to learn her craft as a teenager on reenactments at Kentwell Hall in West Suffolk.

"I fell in love with making period costumes at Kentwell Hall, when I was very young, so I'm excited to be making costumes for the first stage production of Ronald Blythe's iconic book about Suffolk," said Mackenzie from her studio near Rickinghall.

"In Akenfield, the villagers' memories stretch from the first world war up to the late 1960s, so it's an exciting challenge for a costumer maker."

Mackenzie worked her way up as a freelancer collaborating on many films for Disney, the BBC, Warner Bros and Sky, before becoming Senior Maker on large TV projects such as Lord of the Rings, The Rings of Power.

Months working at the Globe Theatre in London, the Mercury Theatre in Colchester, and making costumes for principals and chorus at Glyndebourne Touring Opera in Sussex have given Constance an enviable expertise in her craft.

She now teaches when she has time, for instance at the Los Angeles Costume College, and she writes about specialist areas of historical costumes.


"My greatest passion is 16th C ruffs. If there's such a thing as a Ruff-Geek, that must be me!" she says with a grin. The new play of Akenfield has been adapted by Glenn Wilhide from Ronald Blythe's iconic Akenfield; Portrait of an English Village.

Taking its lead from the 1975 film which was performed by non-professional local people, the stage play of Akenfield is being cast from within the Suffolk community.



LLOYDS TOUR OF BRITAIN MEN

Britain's biggest professional cycle race and the UK's largest free-to-spectate live sporting event will return to Suffolk this September, as the opening stages of the race take place in the region on Tuesday 2nd and Wednesday 3rd September.

East Suffolk will host the first stage of the race, with the return of the world's top male cyclists to the district for a third consecutive year, as Woodbridge and Southwold play host to the stage one start and finish.

A day later the second stage of the race will start and finish in Stowmarket, hosted by Mid Suffolk District Council and neighbouring Babergh District Council, as two stages of the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men take place in the county for the first time.

The announcement follows the success of this year's Lloyds Tour of Britain Women in June, which saw an action-packed edition of the race only decided in the final sprint to the line in Glasgow, as Kiwi rider Ally Wollaston claimed victory.

Cllr Sarah Whitelock, East Suffolk Council's cabinet member for Communities, Culture, Leisure and Tourism, said: "We are excited to welcome the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men back to East Suffolk for the third consecutive year, and to be hosting the opening stage. This is the UK's largest free-to-spectate live sporting event and directly benefits local businesses and communities. The Tour, and the community activities which accompany it, also helps to promote the physical and mental health benefits of cycling to all ages and abilities and showcases East Suffolk as a cycle friendly destination to a national audience."

Having hosted the final stage of the 2024 Lloyds Tour of Britain Men, East Suffolk will now host the start of racing in September 2025, marking the first time since 2012 that the overall race has begun in Suffolk, and a debut for Woodbridge as a host venue for the event.

Southwold has never hosted the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men, but has twice seen the women's race visit, most recently in 2018 when Jolien D'hoore won a stage finishing on North Parade in the town.

The exact stage route for the opening leg of the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men may have been published by the time this goes to print but will include passing through Wickham Market, Aldeburgh, Saxmundham, Framlingham, Halesworth, Bungay, and Beccles.

For the second stage, Stowmarket will host the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men for the first time, though like Southwold has hosted a finish of the women's race, also won by Jolien D'hoore in 2019.

The route of stage two will include Debenham and Eye in Mid Suffolk, and Sudbury and Hadleigh in Babergh.

Cllr John Ward, leader of Babergh District Council said: "This is fantastic opportunity for us to showcase Babergh's beautiful landscapes, towns and villages to an international audience.

"We're also committed to providing opportunities to get involved in sports and physical activity and by hosting this international event showcasing prominent cyclists we hope to inspire the next generation of budding athletes right here in Suffolk."

Commenting on the announcement of the opening stages, Jonathan Day, Managing Director of British Cycling Events, said; "Having finished the Lloyds Tour of Britain Women with some great racing and a fantastic festival of cycling in Glasgow, our attention is now on September and the return of the men's event. We are delighted to begin our announcements with the news that East Suffolk will host the opening stage, and two new venues – Woodbridge and Southwold – will appear on the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men map. Then moving onto stage 2 and a huge thanks to our partners at Babergh and Mid Suffolk, which will see Stowmarket become the third new venue for the men's race, ensuring a fantastic opening two days in the beautiful Suffolk countryside.

"Over the coming weeks we look forward to sharing more exciting details about this year's race with fans and building up to what will be another incredible edition of the Lloyds Tour of Britain."

Further announcements about the host venues of the other four stages, as well as the participating teams for the Lloyds Tour of Britain will be made over the coming weeks.
