



WOODBRIDGE MARKS 450 YEARS OF THE SHIRE HALL

This September, the historic heart of Woodbridge will come alive with the sights and sounds of the 16th century as the town marks a remarkable milestone: 450 years of the Shire Hall on Market Hill. On Saturday 13th September 2025, from 12pm to 5pm, Woodbridge Town Council will host an Bisabethanthemed celebration, bringing the town's past vividly to life with a day of free entertainment, food, music, and community spirit.

Falling within National Heritage Week, this colebration offers a perfect opportunity to reflect on the rich history of the Shire Hall, which has stood at the centre of civic life since the reign of Bisabeth L Vicitors can step incide this historic building and experience its rarely seen flux-floor courtroom, alongside an immensive art session hosted by Woodbridge Festival of Art and Music, where participants will help create collaborative artworks inspired by the town's past.

There'll be plenty of free giveners: throughout the day as a thank-you to the community. Street entertainment will include jesters performing and leading interactive workshops, giving families

the chance to experience the festive spirit of a lifth-century fair. Food lovers are in for a treat, too the Town Council has subsidized a hog roact and traditional pie and mash, ensuring everyone can afford a reduced-price hearty tacts of history. The Galley Creamery will be serving a specially commissioned heritage ice count flavour, while The

Kings Head pulp will be providing drinks on the day.

The combination of historical immersion, creative engagement, community energy, and good old-fashioned fun promises to make this a day to remember.

WOODBRIDGE MUSEUM

This photograph is of a fire engine parked in front of the fire station in The Thoroughfare. The registration number indicates the engine dates after 1932, but we haven't been able to date the photograph more accurately.

The fire station was on what is now the open land next to Specsavers. We have another photograph of the same engine with a wedding party on it.

We do have details on that picture of some of the firemen, including George Thorpe and Percy Darvell, who are listed in the 1939 census as part-time Woodbridge Firemen.

Accordingly, we are assuming this photo dates from the 1940s. We know the land was subsequently used by St John's Ambulance & The Red Cross, who collaborated in running an ambulance service.

We would love to know more about the fire and voluntary services in the Woodbridge and Melton area, so if any of you have any information particularly about when the fire station moved from The Thoroughfare we would love to hear from you. Please email: enquiries@woodbridgemuseum.com

FROM YOUR NEW MAYOR

At the end of May, I had the honour of being elected Mayor by my fellow Councillors. Below are some headlines of the issues that 'hit' me as I stepped into the role. More is available on the Woodbridge Town website.

Day one: The National Lottery Heritage Fund rejected our bid for an initial grant towards the Shire Hall Regeneration Project. Fortunately, the door was left open for a re-submission which has been put in hand.

A week later: I led a small delegation from Woodbridge to the market town of **Doullens** in Northern France to sign a friendship agreement that commits both towns to developing a full twinning arrangement by the end of 2026.

At the same time: Suffolk County Council published their response to the consultation on the second phase of Active Travel Woodbridge. The work is now being finalised and we are engaged on this.

18 June: My first Council meeting as chair. A heavy agenda but three items of note including two national priorities that will severely impact the residents of Woodbridge:

We co-opted a new Councillor, Simon Sadler. We had three strong applicants. Very encouraging. We reviewed the work that Councillor Sanders is leading on the NSIPs (Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects).



Did you know that within the next 20 years, 35% of the UK's electricity will be generated in, or transiting through, East Suffolk?

We established a working group on Local Government Reorganisation. Within the next four to five years, the provision of local services will be changed beyond recognition.

21 June: On a lighter note, have you seen the two hares and 18 leverets that have appeared around the historic centres of Woodbridge? If not Hop-to-it. Our Youth Council, facilitated particularly by Councillors Sutton and Pegg, are behind the project in Woodbridge.

I am looking forward to my year as Mayor. If you have an issue in town where you believe action is needed, do please get in touch.

Or even better come to one of our town council meetings and take up an available 3-minute speaking slot to put your issue to the Council. We prefer to hear about issues that come with some initial ideas for resolving them and a time commitment from you to assist the council in resolving them. With joint action we can get things done.

WOODBRIDGE FESTIVAL OF ART AND MUSIC 2025

Friday 29, Saturday 30, Sunday 31 August - Town Wide Festival, Woodbridge, Suffolk

Geno Washington brings British Soul Music Home To Woodbridge alongside funk, punk legends and jazz, rock and art events, at the much loved annual ground breaking festival.

Soul legend Geno Washington is bringing British Soul music home as part of Woodbridge Festival's Super Fly theme, in Elmhurst Park and venues around town, on the last weekend of August.

The soul pioneer, celebrated in Dexy's Midnight Runners 1980s' hit 'Geno', will headline the 14th annual town event in Elmhurst Park on Saturday 30 August.

American-born singer Geno fronted British soul outfit the Ram Jam Band and started singing while he was based at US Air Force (USAF) bases in Woodbridge and Bentwaters in the early sixties. He became the biggest selling UK soul artist of the 1960s. This performance sees him bring his upbeat brand of Brit soul back to Woodbridge for the first time in 60 years - 1965 to 2025.

Geno appears as part of the 'Super Fly' project at this year's Woodbridge Festival. Also appearing as part of 'Super Fly' is pioneering Liverpool funk DJ Les Spaine, who played in Suffolk Airforce bases in the 1970s. 'Super Fly' is a project by DJ Ben Osborne, which celebrates the role US Air Force bases in Suffolk played bringing soul music into the UK.

Joint headliners of the impressive festival line-ups are 'Immersion'. The off-shoot project from Colin Newman - the front man of seminal post punk act Wire. 'Immersion' is an ever-changing collaboration between Colin Newman and Minimal Compact's Malka Spigel. They perform live at Woodbridge in advance of their new album and a national UK tour starting this autumn - and following their first, hugely successful, US tour.

Another headline act is electro clash era club act 'Spektrum'. They make their first live appearance in 10 years, and first show in Suffolk since Latitude in 2006. Their track 'Kinda New' is an era-defining club hit.

Mega film, stage and TV star Ben Miles returns to play Woodbridge Festival, alongside long-time friend and festival founder DJ Ben Osborne. The huge line-up includes acts 'East Angles', 'JS and The Lockerbillies', Sid Le Sarge, 'Girl in A T-Shirt', 'The Pangs', 'Strictly Vinyl DJs' and more.

One of two themes announced for this year's festival, 'Super Fly' explores the hidden history that US air force bases in Suffolk played in the development of UK music from the late 1950s to the 1990s. Between this period the numbers of USAF personnel in Suffolk accounted for one in seven people living in the county.

The project was recently featured on BBC Radio 4s Today programme, reaching an audience of nearly 5 million - generating some unknown stories that will be revealed over the festival weekend.

Liverpool's OG funk DJ Les Spaine is a principal figure in 'Super Fly'. As well as playing the USAF bases, Les imported US Funk music he was given at the US bases, into the UK. He went on to be the UK representative for Motown Records, working with the label's golden era of artists, including Marvin Gay, Stevie Wonder, Diana Ross, The Jacksons and more.

'Spin', the other theme for 2025, launched in mid-June with a series of interactive workshops and audio -visual events being held in schools, colleges and community events across Suffolk. The project explores the continuous role spinning has played in history. It has been generously supported by local councillors in East Suffolk District Council.

The festival weekend in Elmhurst Park and venues across town, also features bands and acts playing everything from dance music to folk, jazz and rock, along with all ages art workshops, street food village, craft ale, wine and cocktail bars, local crafts and vendors, kids zone, Two-Toed skate pipe, the return of Anchors Aweigh, Make and Do workshops, Caribbean BBQ, Roti, Gourmet Burgers, Pan Asian and bars from Hopsters, Mr Bees, Tipsy Bubbles craft beer, natural wine and cocktail bars, Kids Areas, Eco zones and more.

Geno Washington says of his return to Woodbridge after 60 years: "I'm glad to be doing the concert in Woodbridge, man, man, man! That is something! To be back in Woodbridge. We're going to party, come on down, we're going to party!"

Les Spaine says: "I spent a lot of time in the 70s on American bases in the UK, dropping tunes and making good friends and then watching them get sent off to Vietnam and not coming back. So, it did make a massive imprint on me. I'm happy and proud to be part of this celebration".

Woodbridge Festival founder, Ben Osborne, who started work on Super Fly in 2018, says the project highlights an important and over-looked cultural history, in which "USAF bases brought American black music into the UK through Suffolk.

"We hadn't expected to be picked up by national media so quickly and are hugely grateful for that and the local media. It's helped us spread our call out for stories and memorabilia and the response has been huge. I've been researching this for eight years but the public responses have revealed totally undocumented events. That's why it's so vital for us to gather this people's history now. It has national and international significance and otherwise it will be lost."

Some of the results from the project's first call out will be revealed over the festival weekend. After which there will be a year-long process of further research that will be presented in

NEWS FROM FARLINGAYE HIGH SCHOOL

First State School in Suffolk to use Fixtures Software.

Biddable Solutions' (Online Advertising Specialists) owner, James Giles, has teamed up with Farlingaye High to provide SOCS, the schools online calendar system, for the next academic year. Mr Turner went on to say, "Organising that many fixtures with our current system was very challenging and time consuming. I anticipate that due to the many benefits and features of SOCS, we will be able to arrange more fixtures across all sports as the system allows for online communication between all schools that are using it. As a result, we already have a full calendar of fixtures for Year 7 and 8 which are available to view online."

Mr Giles, a parent, shared his reasons for getting involved: "Sport plays a vital role in keeping students physically and mentally healthy.

"It boosts confidence and helps them form friendships across year groups — the impact is overwhelmingly positive. Farlingaye's sports department is exceptional, with a packed calendar of events. For parents, being able to keep track of fixtures, team selections and pick-up times is really important, and the SOCS platform makes that communication simple and effective. We're proud to be supporting the school's sports teams."



MORABE RURAL MUSIC

Donor appeal launched to bring music to children and communities in rural Suffolk

A charity set up to bring to music to children and communities in rural Suffolk has launched an appeal for 50 donors to secure its future and ensure no talent is left undiscovered because of postcode or poverty.

MORABE Rural Music offers subsidised music tuition, instruments and performance opportunities to schools and communities in Suffolk. What started in 2023 with six donated violins and a pilot scheme in Eyke Primary School, where every child in the school learns to read music, sing and play an instrument on a weekly basis. The programme has also expanded to include Mini Music classes for under fours, a community choir, therapeutic music interventions for children with additional needs, and maternal wellbeing sessions, run in conjunction with the NHS, to support new mothers.

Since September, the programme has reached more than 600 children and families through performances and weekly activity, and in the autumn primary schools in Melton and Orford will be joining the MORABE Rural Music family.

At the annual MORABE summer showcase at Seckford Theatre, Woodbridge on Friday 4 July, where young musicians performed alongside the community choir, the charity's founder and music education specialist Maria Dobing said she was hopeful they can raise the funds needed to keep the music programme going and growing, bringing the transformative power of music to more people:

Maria said: "We are a small charity but we have big ambitions for MORABE and what we can achieve through increasing access to music in underserved rural communities - not just for children, but adults and older people too. We have seen firsthand how music transforms lives, eases loneliness, supports mental health and creates opportunities for families who are too often overlooked. There is so much talent out there just waiting to be discovered, but for children and families it's been so more than just that - music has been their lifeline.

"The impact we are having and the amazing feedback we get from children, parents and the community is driving us to scale up the programme, reach more people and really make a difference. But we can't do it alone - we need resources and that's why we are launching the MORABE 50 fundraising initiative.

"MORABE 50 will guarantee us an income for three years so we can put more instruments into the hands of children and pay for the resources to teach them; we can run more Mini Music classes for babies and their parents and reach more people who are lonely or isolated through inclusive, community music programmes."

MORABE 50 donors are being asked to contribute £85 a month for three years to help MORABE continue its great work, and to expand to reach more schools and communities in Suffolk. 85% of MORABE's students receive individual lessons through bursaries, so for less than £3 a day, MORABE 50 donors can give children the gift of music and the chance to discover a talent they may never have known they had. The MORABE 50 funding will also be used to fund new community music programmes to transform the lives of people living in isolated areas.

Lucie Fairweather, headteacher at Eyke Primary School and co-founder of MORABE added: "Access to music has become a luxury, especially in rural or deprived communities. In 2023 we launched MORABE to change that and we have already come a long way. We now have an alumni scheme to help budding musicians continue to learn after they leave primary education. We are levelling the playing field to ensure that even children from rural, deprived areas can excel in music, and it's working."

LLOYDS TOUR OF BRITAIN MEN

Britain's biggest professional cycle race and the UK's largest free-to-spectate live sporting event will return to Suffolk this September, as the opening stages of the race take place in the region on Tuesday 2nd and Wednesday 3rd September.

East Suffolk will host the first stage of the race, with the return of the world's top male cyclists to the district for a third consecutive year, as Woodbridge and Southwold play host to the stage one start and finish.

A day later the second stage of the race will start and finish in Stowmarket, hosted by Mid Suffolk District Council and neighbouring Babergh District Council, as two stages of the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men take place in the county for the first time.

The announcement follows the success of this year's Lloyds Tour of Britain Women in June, which saw an action-packed edition of the race only decided in the final sprint to the line in Glasgow, as Kiwi rider Ally Wollaston claimed victory.

Cllr Sarah Whitelock, East Suffolk Council's cabinet member for Communities, Culture, Leisure and Tourism, said: "We are excited to welcome the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men back to East Suffolk for the third consecutive year, and to be hosting the opening stage. This is the UK's largest free-to-spectate live sporting event and directly benefits local businesses and communities. The Tour, and the community activities which accompany it, also helps to promote the physical and mental health benefits of cycling to all ages and abilities and showcases East Suffolk as a cycle friendly destination to a national audience."

Having hosted the final stage of the 2024 Lloyds Tour of Britain Men, East Suffolk will now host the start of racing in September 2025, marking the first time since 2012 that the overall race has begun in Suffolk, and a debut for Woodbridge as a host venue for the event.

Southwold has never hosted the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men, but has twice seen the women's race visit, most recently in 2018 when Jolien D'hoore won a stage finishing on North Parade in the town.

The exact stage route for the opening leg of the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men may have been published by the time this goes to print but will include passing through Wickham Market, Aldeburgh, Saxmundham, Framlingham, Halesworth, Bungay, and Beccles.

For the second stage, Stowmarket will host the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men for the first time, though like Southwold has hosted a finish of the women's race, also won by Jolien D'hoore in 2019.

The route of stage two will include Debenham and Eye in Mid Suffolk, and Sudbury and Hadleigh in Babergh.

Cllr John Ward, leader of Babergh District Council said: "This is fantastic opportunity for us to showcase Babergh's beautiful landscapes, towns and villages to an international audience.

"We're also committed to providing opportunities to get involved in sports and physical activity and by hosting this international event showcasing prominent cyclists we hope to inspire the next generation of budding athletes right here in Suffolk."

Commenting on the announcement of the opening stages, Jonathan Day, Managing Director of British Cycling Events, said; "Having finished the Lloyds Tour of Britain Women with some great racing and a fantastic festival of cycling in Glasgow, our attention is now on September and the return of the men's event. We are delighted to begin our announcements with the news that East Suffolk will host the opening stage, and two new venues – Woodbridge and Southwold – will appear on the Lloyds Tour of Britain Men map. Then moving onto stage 2 and a huge thanks to our partners at Babergh and Mid Suffolk, which will see Stowmarket become the third new venue for the men's race, ensuring a fantastic opening two days in the beautiful Suffolk countryside.

"Over the coming weeks we look forward to sharing more exciting details about this year's race with fans and building up to what will be another incredible edition of the Lloyds Tour of Britain."

Further announcements about the host venues of the other four stages, as well as the participating teams for the Lloyds Tour of Britain will be made over the coming weeks.

PROJECT UPDATE

AUGUST 2025

Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

Last month, Sizewell C announced plans to build a new post-16 college for its host town in Suffolk – a move that could transform higher education access in the area and ensure a long-term skills legacy for the region. The Further Education (FE) college will be delivered in partnership with Suffolk New College and will be an extension of their current local provision, known as 'On the Coast'. It will be a permanent high-quality post-16 education facility for Leiston, which will deliver comprehensive, multi-site education and training. Further details regarding location and planning requirements will be outlined shortly. For further information visit sizewells.com/news.

Construction of the northern section of the temporary sea defence has started with the first sheet piles being installed. The works will take place within the Sizewell C fence line and the public footpath will remain open. We apologise for any noise disturbance which we will endeavour to keep to a minimum. Works will soon commence on installing a temporary outfall on the beach. This work will be for a short duration and within a fenced compound.

Site preparation, including construction compounds and welfare facilities, ecology and archaeology mitigations, continues at our Northern Park and Ride in Darsham. Construction of the roundabout next to the A12 and Willow Marsh Lane has started. To aid road safety for all road users a 30 mph speed limit on the A12 is planned between the A144 and the Darsham level crossing.

Similarly in Wickham Market work will conclude this summer. As areas become clear of archaeology work, construction will begin in a phased manner.

From the week commencing 7th July, track works will start along the Leiston branch line. Work will include lifting and removing of old track and ballast. Once this phase is complete, there will new track and ballast laying.

The works will be carried out by engineering trains and specialist tracklaying plant including along the track, initially in the section to the west of Leiston. The work can be noisy and create dust, however we will have dust suppression in place to minimise the impact. Working hours will be from approximately 07:00 to 19:00.

CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

Eligible for PIP or UC? Apply before the rules change

There has been a great deal of talk recently about proposed changes to government disability and health benefits, specifically to Personal Independence Payment (PIP) and the health component of Universal Credit (UC). While some proposals were knocked down in June 2025, the government still has plans to improve the efficiency, fairness, and targeting of these benefits.

What are these benefits? When might they change?

Personal Independence Payment (PIP) is a government benefit for people with a long-term illness or disability. It is designed for people of working age to help with the extra costs associated with daily tasks (like dressing, cooking, washing, and managing medication) and/or with mobility (walking, moving about safely). PIP is not means-tested, which means you can apply whatever your income, savings, or employment status.

The government are planning changes to the rules for claiming PIP. We don't know exactly what these are yet (and will tell you when we do) but they won't come into effect until 2026. This means....if you think you may be eligible for PIP you should apply this year as fewer people will qualify when the rules change. First though, check your eligibility, and read how DWP assessors make their decisions (see helpful websites below). And if you find long application forms daunting, ask Citizens Advice for help.

Universal Credit, health element. Universal Credit (UC) is a means tested benefit for people of working age and their families who have low incomes and few savings. You can be employed, self-employed, or not working but you must meet the low income and savings criteria. The **health component of Universal Credit** gives people with disabilities or long-term health conditions additional money.

The amount is tailored to the severity of the condition. Claimants have a 'Work Capability Assessment' (WCA) determining whether they must look for work/more work or not, and how much they get.

The government are planning changes to the amount of Universal Credit people can receive, and how the health element of UC is assessed. It is likely that the **rules for the WCA** will be tightened. However, changes will not happen before April 2026. This means...if you don't get any benefits and you're on a low income with few savings you should make a claim for UC soon. You might get more money if you apply before the rules change. Again, Citizens Advice can help you claim. Have a look at these useful websites before making a new application for PIP or UC:




