A NOTE FROM OUR EDITOR





THE ALDEBURGH AND DISTRICT LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The Aldeburgh and District Local History Society (ADLHS) has announced an exciting and varied programme of lectures for its 2025/26 season, promising to take audiences on a journey from 15th Century Walberswick and Charles Dickens to the top-secret preparations for D-Day.

In November, the focus is on the Second World War as John Ogden presents 'Orford's Atlantic Wall Breakers.' The talk on **November 19th** will shed light on the little-known story of how 12 square miles of local countryside, including Orford and Snape, were used as a top-secret testing ground for the specialised tanks that proved crucial to the success of the D-Day landings.

A special ticketed event will be held on **December 17th i**n partnership with the Aldeburgh Society at the Jubilee Hall.

James Thellusson, a descendant of the wealthy Huguenot banker Peter Thellusson, will discuss his ancestor's extraordinary will from 1797. The talk will explore how the notorious 60-year legal battle that followed is said to have inspired Charles Dickens's masterpiece, Bleak House.

The new year brings fresh discoveries, with Sally Sibley giving an update on the latest archaeological work at Sutton Hoo on **February 18th**. Following the return of the Time Team to the world-famous Anglo-Saxon burial site, the talk will reveal some of the findings from the most intensive period of excavation there in 25 years. The season will conclude on **March 18th** with Dr. Tom Johnson from Oxford University, who will delve into the everyday life of households in the medieval fishing village of Walberswick during the 15th century.

All lectures, with the exception of the December event, will be held at 6pm in the Old Generator Station, Kings Field. Tickets for the joint event with the Aldeburgh Society are available from the Jubilee Hall website.

PROTECTING OUR LIBRARIES

LIBRARIES ARE NOT JUST COLLECTIONS OF BOOKS...

Many of us no longer rely on the printed word for information or knowledge, but libraries provide so much more. They are a vital community service that needs to be protected, especially in rural areas like East Suffolk.

The history of libraries dates back to ancient civilizations; the Romans first gave access to 'citizens', not just to scholars.

Modern public libraries emerged in revolutionary France with the nationalisation of noble libraries and national libraries were established in the 19th and 20th centuries. In recent years digital technology has transformed libraries once again.

Libraries continue to evolve, while maintaining their core mission of preserving knowledge and supporting education. They provide access to information and technology, and enrich society, supporting social well-being and mental health. They support young people, helping them to acquire key skills and have also become 'warm hubs' offering refreshments and a safe place to spend time for free.

With the demise of most of our Tourist Information Centres, libraries now offer a range of leaflets including bus times, information about what's on and services for residents and visitors.

As we lose pubs, banks and village shops, libraries have taken on even more roles. East Suffolk Council holds weekly drop-ins and Police Safer Neighbourhood teams visit.

Sadly, as of December, Barclays Bank will cease their satellite services in several local libraries, despite them being well attended!



Halesworth Community Library

Once you join your local library, you can access several online services for free: you can download e-books and read most national newspapers, borrow audio and large print books, access the County reference library and use the computers/ Wifi. Printing, photocopying, scanning and laminating are available for a small charge.

Volunteers provide a 'Books at Home' service for those unable to visit. Libraries host the Reading Challenge during school holidays, provide term-time access for schools, after school Code Clubs, and even visits by 'reading' dogs. Every library is unique. Some have meeting rooms for hire. Period products and other health-care items may be available. There are lots of weekly activities from Music/ Stay & Play for under 5s, to groups for those with Dementia and their Carers, language classes, and a wide range of talks and workshops. Libraries are truly an asset in our communities as diverse as you could imagine, yet familiar and welcoming for all.

ARE OUR LIBRARIES AT RISK?

Today there are 45 libraries across Suffolk and three mobile Libraries which visit villages in between.

Earlier this year the library service in Suffolk reverted to being run in-house by Suffolk County Council (SCC). Prior to this they were managed by an independent charity, 'Suffolk Libraries', which was set up when SCC threatened to close our libraries some ten years ago.

There was widespread outcry then and now, strong evidence of how passionately the public feels about keeping its libraries open to the same extent as currently, or even to increase this. SCC promised that library users would not notice any change to hours or services until a full review in 2026, but in the meantime, items of planned works and key decisions have been paused.

Great uncertainty remains, for the amazing staff, dedicated volunteers and the services that many residents have come to rely upon.

One worrying change is that the former SCC Portfolio Holder for Libraries has banned story-telling activities by a Pantomime Dame who has done this for 7 years across our area. This seems to go against principles of free speech and welcoming diversity, not to mention theatre tradition since Shakespearean times!

Libraries have clearly played a significant role throughout human history and still do today. It is vital that our communities have free access to information, a 'place' for all, without perceived or actual barriers, and where young people can continue their relationship with reading. Your library is there for YOU, will you be there for your library? To enrol for free, just pop along, or look at the library website for opening hours, information about services and activities. www.suffolkcommunitylibraries.co.uk

Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

We are pleased to announce our SMS alert service is now live, the community can now sign up to receive works tracker updates via SMS as well as email. Subscribe to the Sizewell C Works Tracker at szcworkstracker.co.uk. Track Sizewell C Projects and get alerts for new activities via the login button.

Firstly, thank you for your patience as we work hard to get new infrastructure in place, such as park and ride facilities to bus our workers into site and improvements such as the A12 two village bypass and Sizewell Link Road. We are sorry for the inconvenience this is causing and will work to complete these essential projects as quickly as possible whilst providing updates to communities so you can plan your journeys. With this in mind, the Sizewell C works tracker and One Network Causeway one.network are guides to works in the area and the new subscription service through our works tracker will also help with transport plans around the county.

We are working across the county and wider East Anglian region to improve Sizewell C related road signs, which includes removing temporary signs and replacing with permanent road signs. This will ensure contract drivers are taking the correct routes. Closer to site, we are also replacing temporary road signs along the B1122 with permanent speed reduction and camera signs.

As part of our accommodation strategy, we announced at the last Northern Transport Forum that we have acquired part of the Darsham High Lodge site which will provide accommodation for our workforce. High Lodge benefits from being closely located to the Darsham Railway Station and the Northern Park and Ride site. A bus service will be available for workers to transport from High Lodge to site, keeping cars off the road.

We have started to build a widened and improved layby on the A12 to assist police escorting our wide load HGVs. Working closely with Suffolk County Council, we have closed one of the lanes of the dual carriageway. This is to ensure traffic flow and not create a bottleneck along the dual carriageway by ensuring a consistent one lane traffic flow from Woodbridge. This also ensures road safety for road users and workers, and Suffolk County Council will also be undertaking maintenance work during this time. The traffic management will be in place until December.

Open Sessions

Britten Pears Arts Residencies provide time and space for creators at all stages of their careers to create, be curious and try out new ideas. Open Sessions offers a unique chance to experience new work that is being developed collaboratively and authentically in a safe supportive environment.

Ana Silvera, Lydia Samuels and Tomer Damsky

During their Britten Pears Arts Residency, the trio will embark on a bold new collaboration, drawing on ancient texts and rare recordings from medieval Iberia. Their music reimagines the shared heritage of Sephardic, Arabic, and Ibero-Christian traditions, weaving a rich tapestry of sound that bridges centuries and cultures (2 October, 7pm, Jerwood Kiln Studio, Snape Maltings).

Olivia Chaney

After a week-long residency, Olivia will share early insights, new interpretations, and live performances that breathe fresh life into Purcell's work, placing it in vibrant conversation with modern songwriting. Expect explorations of folk, pop and contemporary classical interpretations. Whether you're a classical enthusiast, a folk fan, or simply curious about the creative process, this is a rare chance to witness a unique musical journey in progress (3 October, 7pm, Britten Studio).

James Blades: Pandemonium of the One Man Band

Acclaimed actor James Anthony-Rose brings legendary percussionist James Blades back to the stage in this piece of theatre magic recorded for BBC Radio 3. From his obscure beginnings as a circus drummer, and an accompanist to silent movies at the Wisbech Hippodrome, to the international classical concert hall, Blades was a long-term collaborator of Britten. Blades habitually toured a percussion-lecture nationwide, and this show presents as one of these.

There will be demonstrations of instruments and techniques, and anecdotes and revelations, as James Anthony-Rose tells the story of his remarkable life, together with a celebration of the power and mystery of Blade's extraordinary talent and career. Written by Robin Brooks and James Anthony Rose, directed and produced by Fiona McAlpine and music direction by Tomi Rose (11 October, 3pm & 7pm, Britten Studio).

Family Concerts

Britten Pears Arts present a double-bill of Wallace and Gromit with live brass band accompaniment from one of the UK's finest ensembles, The Fairey Band. Blast off with a spacethemed programme exploring the scale and wonder of the universe including Wallace & Gromit's first ever adventure Wallace & Gromit's A Grand Day Out, (19 October, 2.30pm, Snape Maltings Concert Hall). The Academy Award-winning adventure, The Wrong Trousers, sees the debut of the dastardly penguin Feathers McGraw (19 October, 4.30pm, Snape Maltings Concert Hall). Between the two screenings, the fun continues with free interactive brass demonstrations and hands-on percussion workshops. Mini Music Makers is a Friday morning session of fun music and play activities for 0-5-yearolds. The 90-minute sessions are led by The Red House's Community and Collections Curator Joe Carr and include singing and creative play to encourage social skills, turn-taking, sharing and having fun (every Friday to 12 December, The Red House). Family Music Makers is a free, fun session of music and play activities for 5-7-year-olds including warm-ups, musical games and creating new music (27 October, Peter Pears Recital Room, 2pm).

Red House Garden Tour: 60-minute tour of the garden through Britten and Pears' eyes led by the horticultural team. (15 & 29 Oct, 2pm).

At the Heart of it All: Hugh Nankivell and Wils Wilson explore music and performance with the very young and very old in their Residency. Poetry in Aldeburgh Festival Returns November 6 - 9, 2025.

Now Featuring an Extra Day! The Poetry in Aldeburgh Festival returns from Thursday, 6 November to Sunday, 9 November 2025. This year, the festival has expanded to a four-day celebration, offering an extra day of readings, workshops, exhibitions, talks, and more.

The theme is "The Book and Beyond".

Building on the success of previous years, and adding an extra day compared to 2024, the 2025 festival will host a variety of events for poetry enthusiasts.

The Gala Reading on Saturday 8 November will feature Clare Pollard whose sixth collection 'Lives of the Female Poets' is out in September.

It will also feature Richard Scott, whose latest collection 'That Broke into Shining Crystals' is a Poetry Book Society Choice.

Other headline performers include Patience Agbabi whose poetry addresses contemporary issues by means of a language that mixes classic forms such as the sonnet with the modern rhythms of rap and grime.

Her forthcoming verse novel, 'Wonderland' is due in 2026.

Fiona Benson, whose 'Vertigo' and 'Ghost' won the 2019 Forward Prize for Best Poetry Collection, and T S Eliot prizewinner Roger Robinson are both reading as part of the Sunday afternoon (9 November) final event.

The poet, translator and academic Ian Patterson will be giving the Robin Boyd Memorial Lecture on 'Essential modernist texts'.

Paying Income Tax on your State

Pension. It is not always appreciated that the state pension is subject to Income Tax. This is because HMRC do not deduct tax before paying the state pension. If you are receiving the basic state pension of £230.25 per week this is not an issue as the annual amount received of £11,973 is below the tax-free allowance of £12,570. However, if you receive more than the basic state pension you should check if this exceeds the annual tax-free allowance. If it does, there is a tax liability on the excess.

If you do not have private pension income as well, HMRC will issue you with a Simple Assessment calculating the tax due and asking for payment by 31 January 2026. If you do have private pension income, HMRC will collect the tax on the state pension via PAYE from your private pension provider.

Effectively you will be paying more tax on your private pension to compensate for the tax you should be paying on your state pension. We take a number of calls from people who cannot understand why the tax being deducted from their private pension goes up each year. The simple reason is that the triple lock means that the state pension must increase each year. However, the tax-free allowance of £12,570 has not increased since 5 April 2021 and will not increase until 5 April 2028 at the earliest. This means that the tax on the increase in the state pension is being deducted from your private pension income. In net of tax terms, you are overall better off, but it is confusing when the tax paid on your private pension increases even though the gross amount remains the same. With the tax-free allowance frozen at £12,570 it is likely that from 5 April 2027 even the basic state pension will exceed this.

The result - a tax liability for the majority of pensioners. For married couples, where one of the spouses does not use their tax-free allowance (possibly due to restricted pension entitlement), it is possible to have up to £1,260 of their unused allowance transferred to their spouse, saving up to £252 pa. in tax. A Marriage Allowance claim must be submitted to HMRC by the lower income spouse - this can be backdated to 6 April 2021. This could result in a refund of tax of up to £1,008. We recommend you take advice before you make any submission to ensure that this decision benefits you. 

ALDEBURGH GARDENING CLUB

Judging by the magazine pictures one of the favourite flowers of garden designers are those fabulous blobs on sticks, the Alliums. I have tried them and they look wonderful the first year but have vanished completely by year three. They are supposed to be good in sandy soil but they don't seem to like mine.

I have even tried some of the smaller versions such as Allium moly with yellow flowers which is reputed to be a complete thug and even that one didn't make it. The only one that does well is Allium sphaerocephalum, which has tall slender stems with an inch wide purple/maroon coloured blob on top and of course that's the one I hate. It's just dotty and not at all fabulous. It produces bulbils so if you heave one out, ten come up in the same place the next year. Almost as bad as the star of bethlehem.

There are alliums that do okay such as chives, which are clumpers rather than bulb formers so I have changed tack. Welsh onions are perennial like chives, useful for large edible leaves (I understand that all Alliums are edible) that you can chop into salad and produce big white drumstick flowers in spring.

Not quite decorative enough for the flower garden perhaps but an interesting addition to the veg patch.

I also have two other perennial 'chive like' alliums which all flower in late summer. The first is tiny and very slow and sits in the alpine bed in the front garden, producing odd, pale, slightly twisted leaves and eventually four inch tall pink chive like flowers.

Number 2 is a bit bigger and also slow but perhaps it is the weather at fault as I only planted it last year, it is called 'Summer Beauty' and I got it from Peter Nyssen with my tulip order. It has green grassy leaves like a thrift. This one is reputed to steadily form a decent clump and it does look rather nice at the moment and the bees love it. Maybe I'll get another.

The name 'salvia' covers an enormous range of plants, again all suited to our dry climate and sandy soil. I do like the herbaceous varieties 'Salvia nemorosa Caradonna' is a very popular one but there are many other varieties in colours from white through pink to the more usual purple flowers. There is also a native species 'Salvia pratensis' which I have seen growing wild in the long grass around Orford castle.

I bought one, probably from Ladybird, which had larger flowers of a deeper purple than ones I have seen in the wild and it did wellso I collected seed and grew a few more. I also got one or two self setters and one of those is very vigorous and has flowered all summer and is still in flower now in mid-September. It has a more sprawly habit than the 'nemorosa' varieties and the leaves are much bigger.

I shall be trying to take cuttings of that one in the spring. Meanwhile on 7th October in the church Hall we have Lucy Skinner talking about Salvias! I'm looking forward to it.



When The Cranes Fly South - Lisa Ridzén. A tender, simple book about the multitude of stories contained within a life.



A debut novel and Swedish Book of the Year.

Then there is the relationship with his only son, Hans. Hans is concerned about Bo's ability to continue caring for Sixten and suggests it is time for Sixten to be taken away.

Bo's defiance is heart rending and at times humorous.



ALDE VALLEY SUFFOLK FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

The Hollond Family of Great Ashfield House, Suffolk – a Talk by Dave Steward – Monday 20th October 2.30pm in Saxmundham.

Great Ashfield House, built in 1755, had a history of extensions and renovations. It is described as a 'lost palace' in some accounts and is Grade II listed.

The Hollond Family were known to have moved in cultured circles, with Stanley Spencer visiting and painting there in the 1920s.

After Arthur Hollond's death, the family's connection to the outside world diminished.

The daughters' unconventional lifestyle, including sleeping outdoors in various weather conditions, led to them being viewed with suspicion by some villagers. The house fell into disrepair and the family lived in relative isolation, with the daughters adopting a unique, nature-focused lifestyle.

Dave Steward is a local historian well known for researching family trees as well as giving talks on local history subjects in the East Anglian region.

The talk takes place on Monday 20th October at 2.30pm, in person at the Fromus Centre, Street Farm Road, Saxmundham, IP17 1AL (behind the library). The talk starts at 2.30pm.


