





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# HALESWORTH CLIMATE ACTION ENERGY WEEKEND



What if we never had to worry about energy price rises again? What if Halesworth generated its own electricity, reducing energy costs for homes and businesses? What if all our homes were insulated so well that our energy costs were under £100 a year? These are the questions behind a weekend of positive, practical workshops and discussion, on the last weekend in **September**, (26th - 28th). The event is organised by HASH (Halesworth Area Sustainability Hub) and is hosted by St Mary's Church, Halesworth.

Whether you are interested in taking steps to reduce bills and use cleaner forms of energy as a family, a business or at community level, this is a chance to gather information and inspiration from experts and local people who have already begun doing just that. Why not come along and learn more?

We will also be hearing a report from sustainable energy experts, Opergy, who have been commissioned to produce a baseline study of our town's current energy use and carbon footprint. From this baseline – where we are now – we will be developing a Net Zero Pathway to help Halesworth and area reach the sustainable energy targets adopted by the Town Council – where we want to get to.

Our partners, Blyth Valley Churches, are organizing a linked week of activities with local schools to engage children with the practical energy solutions to big problems that affect their futures.

### Friday evening 26 September: What if?

When we'll be imagining our energy futures. Adrian Ramsay MP will talk about the political dimension. Professor Peter Hobson will describe 'Energy Landscapes' and Climate Change: adapting to extreme weather events, ecosystems and natural energy. John Collins will tell the remarkable story of Charsfield Community Energy.

#### Saturday 27 September: Pathway to Net Zero:

OPERGY will present their report commissioned by the Town Council on current energy usage; they will explain the baseline and potential way forward for residents, businesses, transport, and land use. Then there will be a chance to join workshops on a list of topics including:

**How I changed my house:** Local residents will describe how they changed their homes with and without grants, to insulate and adapt.

**Challenge the Landlord:** How as a tenant you can safely challenge your landlord; and how landlords can benefit from retrofitting, particularly in the light of proposed government strategy.

**East Suffolk energy strategy:** councillors will explain how this informs planning decisions.

**Community Energy:** John Taylor (Community Energy UK) and James Rolls (Diocesan Net Zero Carbon Officer) and the Deben Climate Centre will share the joys of community energy ventures.

**My carbon footprint:** How to calculate your carbon footprint, with pleasure and not pain.

**Halesworth Town Council:** What is the responsibility of the town council in supporting the people and businesses of Halesworth to Net Zero?

### **Charity Shield Golf Tournament**



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# HALESWORTH TO SOUTHWOLD NARROW GAUGE RAILWAY

The charity would like to invite all Halesworth Hoot readers to attend our Open Day and Model Railway Show at Blythburgh Station on **Sunday 14th September,** from 10.30 'til 3.45. The event is, as always, free to attend: the light refreshments are also free! The station is signposted off the A12 almost opposite the White Hart - only Blue Badge holders can park onsite, but there is a field near the church for everyone else. Halesworth's Community Bus will provide car-free access to the event at 11.00 and 1.00, leaving from the Saxons' Way car park.

In the Village Hall will be unusual model railways, trade stands, displays of our work, teas, coffees and homemade cake, and films.

At the adjacent station will be guided tours of the museum site, and demonstration train runs and shunting turns, using our 90-year-old solarcharged battery-electric locomotive. The historic railway trackbed can be walked to both west and east and Holy Trinity Church is also close by, and well worth a visit. Before the event, we will be found in the I-Chameleon Pop-Up shop in Thoroughfare, Halesworth, on September 4th, 5th, 6th, 8th, 9th and 10th, promoting Halesworth's Heritage Open Days, so please drop in to see us. You may wish to support our efforts to restore the railway branch line in the Blyth Valley - if so, then becoming a member at one of our events is an ideal way to show support. For only £10 per year you can receive fortnightly newsletters and join in at our social events - also enjoying being part of this exciting project. The charity's work continues: our display and leaflets were popular at the 'Railway 200' Exhibition at Lowestoft Station - an extremely well-run and successful event, promoted by the Community Rail Partnerships.

Also, our volunteers are preparing to re-start work at Walberswick Station now that we have Agreement and insurance:

this important historic site will be presented to passers-by with information, photographs and a section of the original platform with its station sign. The Heritage Train is making strides - the luggage van now has both doors affixed and working, and only requires internal lining, some hardware, painting and lettering. The unique Cleminson coal wagon and the van will join the stock already at Blythburgh to "tell the story" of the station's history. Staff are working on the unique battery-electric locomotive and our coach to get them ready for next year's planned passenger trains.

Grant aid has recently allowed the erection of high-quality information boards and photos at the station heritage centre, reflecting the history of the railway, and of the village, its church, the Priory, and the river Blyth.

# SOLAR FARMS: THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE DIVERSITY

As District Councillors, we are often involved in planning applications for solar farms in our communities. These can be controversial, and it is understandable when communities resist yet more energy development in our countryside.

The government plans to triple solar generation by 2030. Suffolk, as a largely flat agricultural county, can expect to see a good proportion of this generation. Large solar farms (over 50 MW) are decided by national government. Smaller applications go to the District Council for approval. These need to satisfy statutory consultees, and to meet planning 'tests' against national planning policy. There may be good reasons to refuse a mega-solar farm if it is placing an undue burden on a host community. The views of communities are always taken into account, but ultimately any application can only be refused on the recommendation of a statutory consultee, or failure of the planning tests. A particular preference of this Council is more small-scale Community Energy solar schemes which are planned and owned by the community, bringing electricity and any excess profits directly to residents in the host parish.

#### Do solar farms threaten food security?

There are some misconceptions about solar farms, which are important to address, given the urgent need to decarbonise our energy system and play our part in the global battle against a warming planet. One persistent allegation against solar arrays on farmland is that they threaten food security. Yet recent reports by DEFRA present climate change, in the form of increasing extreme weather events, flooding and drought, as the greatest threat to food security. DEFRA also cites soil degradation as a result of intensive farming, biodiversity loss, water insecurity (a real issue here in Suffolk), and ecological breakdown, particularly the loss of insects. They do not cite solar farms as a threat. Solar farms are one of the cheapest and quickest renewable technologies to implement and so play an important part in the phase out of carbon emissions that lead to climate change. More than this, they present significant opportunity for nature recovery and improved soil health, as solar panels mounted on former intensively farmed land allow the soil to regenerate, free from pesticides, tilling and soil compaction. This enables a greater diversity of species to thrive and ultimately improves the land for food production at the end of the solar lease.

In some cases, food production can even continue. So, in fact,

solar generation can support food security. With additional planting and management, which should always be prioritised in any solar scheme, it can also increase the abundance of insects and other plants and animals.

# Why don't we put all solar panels on brownfield sites and rooftops, instead of farmland?

In an ideal world, we would, but it's not so simple. Any solar farm is only viable once it has land rights and a connection to the electricity grid. However, following decades of inaction to prepare our national grid for the transition to renewable energy, there remains limited capacity for new connections, and developers are led by those sites which can absorb new generation. Solar developers are also in competition with housebuilders for brownfield sites, so that these become commercially unviable due to the limited lifespan of solar farms, against the costs of converting the sites. We should be placing more solar generation on rooftops, and recent government announcements on a Rooftop Revolution are welcome, as is the long overdue Future Homes Standard, putting solar panels on new homes by default. But rooftop solar can only be part of the equation. Solar farms are designed to produce high volumes of electricity that feed into the power grid to supply millions of people, to electrify our cars, heat our buildings and power industry. Rooftop solar panels are primarily intended for self-consumption in homes, businesses and community settings.

### We are here to work with you.

As we work within a national planning system, communities may find it a challenge to stop a solar farm in their community. But your councillors will always support you to engage with developers, preferably before plans are submitted for approval. Together we can help shape solar projects to minimise impacts on the community, maximise the gain for nature, and get the most payback from community benefit schemes.

In this month's update we can start with some great news. Although it seems a while ago now, at the end of June our street collection in the town on Friday 27th and Saturday 28th at the Co-op raised a brilliant £603.48. Thank you to everyone who stopped and contributed to this amount, it was so very kind of you all.

Thank you to committee members Helen and Maxine for organising everything and to everyone who gave their time to collect for us on what was two very hot days. I know some of you were concerned about us but please be reassured that everyone was aware of the damage the sun can do and they were all well prepared.

Our next piece of good news is that our week in the I-Chameleon pop up shop in July was a fantastic success. We hope if you visited the shop you managed to find some bargains and with your generosity we raised a brilliant £2455.53.

We had something different each day outside the shop. Thank you to Gill and Paula for organising Saturday Cake Day and thank you to everyone who baked for us. Thank you to Jane Bastow for bringing such an array of lovely plants on Friday which is always very popular. A big thank you to Halesworth Ukulele Band for giving up their time to play for us on Tuesday morning.

It was lovely to see so many people stopping to listen and generously popping something in our collecting bucket. They played a variety of songs and it was such a great atmosphere in the town.

Our next big event is at the end of August so we will let you know how we got on at The Maize Maze by Torchlight in the next edition of the magazine.

We would like to take this opportunity to share with you just some of the early detection research that your generosity in supporting our events is making possible. As you know the best way to improve cancer survival is detecting and diagnosing it earlier. A simple breath test is being developed to detect stomach cancers. It will identify the gases produced by stomach cancer cells as an early sign of cancer. A hydrogel flavoured lollipop is being developed to diagnose mouth cancer using saliva rather than invasive biopsies. Work is being carried out on a urine test that amazingly could help doctors spot lung cancer at its very early stages.

Your support is making all this vital research possible which will save lives and we are truly very grateful to you all. Thank you all very much.

# ..'WHEN WILL THAT BE?..

"When will that be? Say the bells of Stepney" - a line from 'Oranges and Lemons', the playground and party game of London bells, known and loved by generations of children, its origins lost in obscurity.

The bells of Stepney still ring in the tower of St.Dunstan and All Saints, originally and for many years the parish church of the whole of Tower Hamlets in East London. It is the focus of an exhibition of new work by Jane Roberts and Derek Chambers in the Ballroom Gallery, Aldeburgh, from **September 18th to 23rd**, daily 10 to 5. Late Opening Friday and Saturday until 7pm. Like all our parish churches, St.Dunstan's is steeped in history. Dunstan was a learned and influential monk, who built the second church on the site in 952, dedicated to All Saints.



Stepney was a wealthy manor with fertile fields and orchards and close to the Norman stronghold of the White Tower.

A third church was built in the thirteenth century; the

nave, aisles and tower in the fifteenth century and it is that medieval gothic building which stands today, much altered, repaired and extended over the years. Stepney itself has changed and the bells now ring out over busy roads and housing estates.


It stood through the Dissolution of the Monasteries, the Reformation, the English Civil War, the Industrial Revolution and two world wars. Some key figures in these political and social changes are represented in the detail of the furnishings and fabric of the building and in the headstones and crumbling tombs of the graveyard.

All the festivals and rituals of the Christian church are celebrated at St.Dunstan's; it hosts a food bank, regular Veterans' Association events, school visits and other social activities. For many years babies born at sea were registered here and visitors come from all over the world to look for traces of their ancestors in the old records and in the weathered gravestones. Close links with shipping and trade have earned it the title 'The Church of the High Seas'. The Red Ensign, flag of the Merchant Navy, flies from the flagpole.

Jane Roberts has been artist-in-residence at St.Dunstan's for two years. She appreciates the church as a building well-used and well-loved, which has been altered, patched and repaired over the centuries. Her work for this show reflects this long usage, focussing on the worn fabric of the building with drawings of the stonework and of the strange decorative figures, battered by wind and weather.

Suffolk artist Derek Chambers, familiar with the building from his working life in London, is taken by the way the church stands in an oasis of shade and shelter, surrounded by tall trees, as if on a village green.

His paintings and drawings for this show reflect his admiration for this peaceful setting.

# HIMALAYAN BALSAM PULL

For the fourth year, volunteers, corralled by Halesworth Greens, pulled Himalayan Balsam from the banks of the town river, along Halesworth Town Park.

"It is most heartening to notice the difference we are making. The first year we needed many volunteers and 3 - 4 days; this year we have almost pulled all in one morning." said Rachel Kellett.

It takes about 5 years of continual pulling to effectively curtail this invasive species, however, due to the ease of spread in water, the plants upstream spread their seeds into the water which then float downstream. Ideally, we need to start upstream and work down, and join up the work of pulling throughout the Blyth river but this takes time. It's not only the time doing it, but the preparation time: we need to contact all the riparian owners, (East Suffolk Council, Town Council, Environment Agency, Environment police), seek advice from Suffolk Wildlife Trust, and very importantly, carry out a risk assessment to ensure the safety of our volunteers and we have to look out for water voles, making sure we do not jeopardize this endangered species.

Yes, we are very vigilant and want to protect the water vole and river habitat! If you are a riparian owner of a river side along the Blyth, can you help by pulling your side of the river? If you need help we have a very good team of volunteers who can assist!

Why are we doing it? To limit this invasive species. It threatens to overwhelm our native species and adversely impact the associated native insect and animal life. It can also damage and erode stream and river banks, thereby causing a threat of serious erosion and increasing the flood risk. It is not taken light heartedly, but it is fun:

"There is a certain pleasure in pulling this extraordinary plant, with triffid like roots that easily give" said one volunteer puller, George, who pulled for the first time. Once pulled, we leave them beside the riverbank to rot down, which it does very quickly.

## **HELP2UKRAINE**

This autumn Southwold's Erika Clegg DL is walking the 60-mile Sandlings Way over three days to raise £16,000 for Help2Ukraine - enough to send two fully equipped ambulances to the frontline. On day three Erika will be joined by other women to share a symbolic walk of solidarity with the women of Ukraine. The ambulances, which are sourced by Help2Ukraine through a trusted medical network, will be driven to the Ukraine border from which they are transferred in country to the front line, ready to deploy. They will each be stocked with around £250,000 of medical equipment and will begin saving lives immediately. Erika's walk takes place over three consecutive days, each one with a different theme and a different walking companion.

- Day One: Peace (Friday 3rd October): A solo walk with her dog, Biggles, from Ipswich to Rendlesham Forest. A quiet day of reflection.
- Day Two: Hope (Saturday 4th October): A full day with her son, Will, from Rendlesham to Sizewell.
- Day Three: Solidarity (Sunday 5th October): A 20-mile women's walk from Sizewell to Southwold, in step with the women of Ukraine, who are carrying the weight of war, family and survival.

"This is a promise to the women of Ukraine," says Erika. "We will not look away, and we will do what we can to help. They are doing impossibly tough jobs: running hospitals, farming land, protecting their families and rebuilding communities. This walk is for them."

Erika adds: "An ambulance costs £8,000 to buy and deploy. That small sum becomes £250,000 worth of medical aid. The impact is immediate and enormous. I hope that this walk can reach its target of £16,000 to cover the cost of two ambulances and take half a million pounds' worth of supplies to the people who need it most."

Between 2024 and 2025 Help2Ukraine has raised in excess of £70,000 to date. They now seek to raise funds to take at least four more ambulances in 2026. Funds raised will be used to pay exclusively for ex-NHS ambulances, for their preparation for the journey to Ukraine, for their fitting out, MOTs, tools, insurance and breakdown insurance, and the cost of rooms, fuel and air tickets and for drivers' return. Sustenance, drink and other costs will be paid for personally by those involved so that the funds people so kindly give go entirely into the task of raising the funds and getting the ambulances and medical supplies to Ukraine.

When peace finally comes to Ukraine, the requirement for these vehicles and medical supplies will long remain to manage the wounded and crippled. The clear up and rebuilding operation will be years in the making.

The wounded will long need extra transport and supplies.

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

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# PROJECT UPDATE

### SEPTEMBER 2025

You may have read, Sizewell C has announced the new shareholders of the project, with the government the largest shareholder, alongside EDF, Centrica, La Caisse and Amber Infrastructure. Further details on the final investment decision can be found on our website sizewellc.com.

We also announced the location and designs of the College on the Coast. This post-16 education facility will be located on the eastern edge of Leiston on King George's Avenue, opposite the Sizewell C Ancillary Construction Area. The college will include an apprentice hub and have space for 150 students, 20 full-time staff and drop-in space for 50 apprentices.

We also launched the East Suffolk Trust (EaST), a new grant-giving charity, set up to enhance biodiversity and restore landscapes in east Suffolk and the wider county. This includes at least £78 million over the next 70 years, with the aim to make East Suffolk the most ecologically diverse and resilient area in England.

Everyone in the area will have noticed a significant uptick in road improvements along the A12. We know this disruption can be annoving, but the various speed limits have been introduced for the safety of workers and road users. We continue to review speed limits and will adjust if appropriate.

Northern

Transport Forum

We have installed average speed cameras along the B1122 and B1125 to enhance road safety in the new 30mph speed limit. On the B1122 the average speed cameras are in operation between Yoxford and Leiston, and the B1125 speed cameras are between the B1122 junction and Westleton. The speed limits are now enforceable with legal penalties which are enforced by Suffolk Constabulary. To further enhance this, from 11 August, permanent 30mph signs along B1122 will begin to be installed.

A further 30mph speed limit has been implemented along the A12 for the duration of the works around the Friday Street site, Northern Park and Ride site (Darsham) and Yoxford. This is to ensure the safety of the public and our workforce during construction. Further traffic calming measures have also been installed including lane management cones and lining. As work progresses, further traffic management and some smaller road closures will be required, which we will publish once timelines are confirmed.

We will start the upgrade work to the layby on the northern carriageway of the A12 near to the B1078 in mid-August. This work will help us to manage our Abnormal Indivisible Loads which are escorted by the police. There will be a lane closure along the dual carriageway section of the A12 during this time.

# FRAMLINGHAM AND SAXMUNDHAM CATS PROTECTION

Kittens, kittens and yet more unwanted kittens; 30 still with us as I write and more on the waiting list to come in! All need to be socialised, fed (sometimes by hand), taught to use litter trays and taken to the vets for at least two visits before we can find suitable homes for them.

We do everything we can to ensure every cat has received only the best standards of love and care while with us. A kitten adopted from Fram and Sax Cats Protection will always come with assurances that they have been health-checked, treated for fleas and worms, vaccinated, microchipped and neutered if older than 16 weeks (or a voucher for free neutering if not). Four weeks of free insurance is another plus point. We also provide support, help and advice on getting your new cat settled in. Whilst the love and attention our cats receive comes free, veterinary treatment, neutering and microchipping all have to be paid for. We ask for an adoption fee of just £95 for a kitten under 6 months. Our adoption fee helps us continue our work.

Be wary of buying a kitten from sales or auction sites or through social media (unless from a legitimate seller, registered breeder, charity or shelter) as it can be risky and may perpetuate indiscriminate breeding. In such private ads for kittens, the health of the mother is rarely mentioned; whether she is kept for breeding and how many pregnancies she has endured, or whether she has been regularly vaccinated and health checked. Thought must be given to infectious diseases, genetics and other breed issues. Always be cautious of a private sale where you are unable to see the mother. Ask for the vet's details and what treatments have been given.

If you are told the kitten has been vaccinated, you must be given the record card. A seller who cares about a kitten's well-being will make enquires about you and your home, too. Importantly, make sure you have the kitten neutered to prevent yet more unwanted kittens. Please, if you or your friends and neighbours are looking for a kitten to re-home, adopt rather than shop.

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### CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

Marriage, Civil Partnership or Living Together: does it make a difference to your legal rights?

The legal rights of two people living together may depend on whether they are married, in a civil partnership or cohabiting. Marriage in the UK is valid if it complies with the law relating to who can marry and the ceremony conforms to certain procedures. A registered civil partnership is a relationship recognised in law between two unrelated people, whether same-sex or opposite-sex, conferring rights similar (but not identical) to marriage. Living together (or cohabitation) generally means to live together as a couple without being married or in a civil partnership. Automatic legal rights are not necessarily the same as if married or in a registered civil partnership.

Couples can make an official agreement that will be recognised by the courts setting down each person's legal rights in specified areas of the relationship.

To terminate a relationship, an unmarried couple can separate informally without the intervention of the court.

A couple in either a civil partnership or marriage can also separate informally but will need to apply to the court for formal dissolution of a civil partnership, or a divorce if married.

In the case of a tenancy, options on relationship termination will depend, not just on the status of the relationship, but also on whether the landlord is a local authority or housing association, or if it is a private rental; on whether one or both of the couple are named on the tenancy agreement; and if just one or both wish to move out of the property.

An owner-occupier, if named in the title deeds, usually has the right to stay in the home irrespective of the relationship. If both of a separating couple are named on the title deeds, both own the home and will need to decide what happens to the

The care and safety of children is, necessarily, of prime importance to all separating couples.

The rights and responsibilities of parents and others having responsibility for children are complex and advice should be sought at the earliest opportunity.

Other areas of law where the nature of the relationship may be relevant include inheritance rights, occupational and personal pensions, entitlement to some state benefits, ownership of and access to money and possessions, responsibility for debts and the right to financial support.




