

While the Council remains neutral on the overall development, we are committed to working constructively with SZC to help ensure that any construction impacts on Leiston-cum-Sizewell are mitigated as much as possible.

How we respond to enquiries:

SZC Office: For detailed or technical questions, residents will be directed to the dedicated SZC office, which has the expertise and resources to provide accurate information.

Full Council Meetings: Residents are welcome to attend Full Council meetings when SZC representatives are present and may put questions directly to them. Please check the Council website for agendas, as representatives do not attend every meeting.

Forums: The Main Development Site Forum, Community Forum, and Northern Transport Forum are public meetings. Residents may attend but cannot participate directly. However, they may request that their question is raised by their Council representative.

Council Role: The Council does not have specialist expertise or resources to answer complex technical questions about SZC. Our role is to represent residents' concerns and ensure they are properly raised with the relevant bodies.

Our commitment:

The Council will continue to:

Work with SZC to lessen the impact of construction on Leiston and its residents.

Ensure local voices are heard in discussions with SZC.

Provide clear routes for residents to get answers to their questions.

Celebrating 175 Years of Saxmundham Chapel

The weekend of the 6th, 7th & 8th September saw folk from Leiston & Saxmundham United Church (Methodist / URC), churches across the URC pastorate and other friends from the surrounding area gather to celebrate the 175th Anniversary of the opening of Saxmundham Chapel. There was a celebration tea, exhibition and self-guided tour on the 6th and 7th and a Service of Thanksgiving was held on the 8th, in addition to 'Start the Week with a Cuppa' - a time for chat and refreshments normally held on the fourth Monday of each month.

The opening services for Saxmundham chapel took place on Wednesday 22nd May 1850 with a morning service at 11am and an evening service at 6pm. The first Sunday services took place on 26th May. The journey, which ultimately led to the establishment of the Saxmundham Chapel and congregation started long before - in 1650 at Sweffling Chapel. That place of worship was replaced with the opening of Rendham Chapel in 1750. The mission and worship in Rendham thrived, making it necessary to enlarge the building, with work completed in 1834

Of course, for those folk who lived in Saxmundham, this meant a three mile walk each way, to attend worship in the only local non-conformist church and with two services on a Sunday they clocked up quite a few miles on foot. The decision to build a separate building for worship in Saxmundham took place in 1849. The church became a distinctive congregation with its own membership record in June 1850 – sharing a minister with Rendham. Saxmundham Chapel was originally the home of Saxmundham Congregational Church. In 1972, with the establishment of the United Reformed Church, it became Saxmundham URC. In January this year (2025) Saxmundham URC joined with Leiston United Church to form Leiston and Saxmundham United Church – a partnership between the Methodist and United Reformed Churches. We are one church with two locations and our worship alternates, each Sunday, between the two sites.

Ryan is loving life at Leiston

From the Premier League to non-league, the buzz Ryan Jarvis says he has always enjoyed - and still enjoys - from football, has not waivered.

The Blues midfielder netted one of the two goals that beat Redditch in the last Blues home clash and, although he may not appear on the scoresheet that often, he's clocking up the appearances for Leiston now, as he reaches his century for the club - his experience and presence on and off the pitch immense. Then again, Ryan Jarvis is a player who has played at some of the highest levels in the game.

Representing England youth from under-16s to under-19s, playing in two European Youth Championships, reaching the final against France at under-19s, Jarvis, now 39, made his Championship debut for Norwich City away at Walsall as a 16-year-old.

Two years later he made his Premier League debut for the Canaries and, in January 2005, netted in a 1 - 2 defeat to Liverpool at Carrow Road. You can check out the YouTube clip! For Ryan, there have been many highlights, but he continues to look for more.

"It's something I'd love to replicate at Leiston. I'm absolutely loving football at Leiston. As much as I enjoy supporting the younger players in the group, I still have the desire and buzz to play whenever called upon."



ALDE VALLEY SUFFOLK FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

The Hollond Family of Great Ashfield House, Suffolk – a Talk by Dave Steward – Monday 20th October 2.30pm in Saxmundham.

Great Ashfield House, built in 1755, had a history of extensions and renovations. It is described as a 'lost palace' in some accounts and is Grade II listed.

The Hollond Family were known to have moved in cultured circles, with Stanley Spencer visiting and painting there in the 1920s.

After Arthur Hollond's death, the family's connection to the outside world diminished.

The daughters' unconventional lifestyle, including sleeping outdoors in various weather conditions, led to them being viewed with suspicion by some villagers.

The house fell into disrepair and the family lived in relative isolation, with the daughters adopting a unique, nature-focused lifestyle.

Dave Steward is a local historian well known for researching family trees as well as giving talks on local history subjects in the East Anglian region. The talk takes place on Monday 20th October at 2.30pm, in person at the Fromus Centre, Street Farm Road, Saxmundham, IP17 1AL (behind the library). The talk starts at 2.30pm. No need to book, just turn up. £1 for members, £3 for visitors, including tea/coffee/biscuits. Good, free car-parking. The speaker will be present in person, and the talk will NOT be on Zoom.


Marion and David Sillett have been running the Foodbank throughout the time it has operated and given considerable time and energy to maintaining this important local project, supporting many folk along the way.



PROTECTING OUR LIBRARIES

LIBRARIES ARE NOT JUST COLLECTIONS OF BOOKS...

Many of us no longer rely on the printed word for information or knowledge, but libraries provide so much more. They are a vital community service that needs to be protected, especially in rural areas like East Suffolk.

The history of libraries dates back to ancient civilizations; the Romans first gave access to 'citizens', not just to scholars.

Modern public libraries emerged in revolutionary France with the nationalisation of noble libraries and national libraries were established in the 19th and 20th centuries. In recent years digital technology has transformed libraries once again.

Libraries continue to evolve, while maintaining their core mission of preserving knowledge and supporting education. They provide access to information and technology, and enrich society, supporting social well-being and mental health. They support young people, helping them to acquire key skills and have also become 'warm hubs' offering refreshments and a safe place to spend time for free.

With the demise of most of our Tourist Information Centres, libraries now offer a range of leaflets including bus times, information about what's on and services for residents and visitors.

As we lose pubs, banks and village shops, libraries have taken on even more roles. East Suffolk Council holds weekly drop-ins and Police Safer Neighbourhood teams visit.

Sadly, as of December, Barclays Bank will cease their satellite services in several local libraries, despite them being well attended!



Halesworth Community Library

Once you join your local library, you can access several online services for free: you can download e-books and read most national newspapers, borrow audio and large print books, access the County reference library and use the computers/ Wifi. Printing, photocopying, scanning and laminating are available for a small charge.

Volunteers provide a 'Books at Home' service for those unable to visit. Libraries host the Reading Challenge during school holidays, provide term-time access for schools, after school Code Clubs, and even visits by 'reading' dogs. Every library is unique. Some have meeting rooms for hire. Period products and other health-care items may be available. There are lots of weekly activities from Music/ Stay & Play for under 5s, to groups for those with Dementia and their Carers, language classes, and a wide range of talks and workshops. Libraries are truly an asset in our communities as diverse as you could imagine, yet familiar and welcoming for all.

ARE OUR LIBRARIES AT RISK?

Today there are 45 libraries across Suffolk and three mobile Libraries which visit villages in between.

Earlier this year the library service in Suffolk reverted to being run in-house by Suffolk County Council (SCC). Prior to this they were managed by an independent charity, 'Suffolk Libraries', which was set up when SCC threatened to close our libraries some ten years ago.

There was widespread outcry then and now, strong evidence of how passionately the public feels about keeping its libraries open to the same extent as currently, or even to increase this. SCC promised that library users would not notice any change to hours or services until a full review in 2026, but in the meantime, items of planned works and key decisions have been paused.

Great uncertainty remains, for the amazing staff, dedicated volunteers and the services that many residents have come to rely upon.

One worrying change is that the former SCC Portfolio Holder for Libraries has banned story-telling activities by a Pantomime Dame who has done this for 7 years across our area. This seems to go against principles of free speech and welcoming diversity, not to mention theatre tradition since Shakespearean times!

Libraries have clearly played a significant role throughout human history and still do today. It is vital that our communities have free access to information, a 'place' for all, without perceived or actual barriers, and where young people can continue their relationship with reading. Your library is there for YOU, will you be there for your library? To enrol for free, just pop along, or look at the library website for opening hours, information about services and activities. www.suffolkcommunitylibraries.co.uk

PROJECT UPDATE

OCTOBER 2025

Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

We are pleased to announce our SMS alert service is now live, the community can now sign up to receive works tracker updates via SMS as well as email. Subscribe to the Sizewell C Works Tracker at szcworkstracker.co.uk. Track Sizewell C Projects and get alerts for new activities via the login button.

Firstly, thank you for your patience as we work hard to get new infrastructure in place, such as park and ride facilities to bus our workers into site and improvements such as the A12 two village bypass and Sizewell Link Road. We are sorry for the inconvenience this is causing and will work to complete these essential projects as quickly as possible whilst providing updates to communities so you can plan your journeys. With this in mind, the Sizewell C works tracker and One Network Causeway one.network are guides to works in the area and the new subscription service through our works tracker will also help with transport plans around the county.

We are working across the county and wider East Anglian region to improve Sizewell C related road signs, which includes removing temporary signs and replacing with permanent road signs. This will ensure contract drivers are taking the correct routes. Closer to site, we are also replacing temporary road signs along the B1122 with permanent speed reduction and camera signs.

As part of our accommodation strategy, we announced at the last Northern Transport Forum that we have acquired part of the Darsham High Lodge site which will provide accommodation for our workforce. High Lodge benefits from being closely located to the Darsham Railway Station and the Northern Park and Ride site. A bus service will be available for workers to transport from High Lodge to site, keeping cars off the road.

We have started to build a widened and improved layby on the A12 to assist police escorting our wide load HGVs. Working closely with Suffolk County Council, we have closed one of the lanes of the dual carriageway. This is to ensure traffic flow and not create a bottleneck along the dual carriageway by ensuring a consistent one lane traffic flow from Woodbridge. This also ensures road safety for road users and workers, and Suffolk County Council will also be undertaking maintenance work during this time. The traffic management will be in place until December.

Paying Income Tax on your State Pension

It is not always appreciated that the state pension is subject to Income Tax. This is because HMRC do not deduct tax before paying the state pension. If you are receiving the basic state pension of £230.25 per week this is not an issue as the annual amount received of £11,973 is below the tax-free allowance of £12,570.

However, if you receive more than the basic state pension you should check if this exceeds the annual tax-free allowance. If it does, there is a tax liability on the excess. If you do not have private pension income as well, HMRC will issue you with a Simple Assessment calculating the tax due and asking for payment by 31 January 2026.

If you do have private pension income, HMRC will collect the tax on the state pension via PAYE from your private pension provider. Effectively you will be paying more tax on your private pension to compensate for the tax you should be paying on your state pension.

We take a number of calls from people who cannot understand why the tax being deducted from their private pension goes up each year. The simple reason is that the triple lock means that the state pension must increase each year. However, the tax-free allowance of £12,570 has not increased since 5 April 2021 and will not increase until 5 April 2028 at the earliest. This means that the tax on the increase in the state pension is being deducted from your private pension income.

In net of tax terms, you are overall better off, but it is confusing when the tax paid on your private pension increases even though the gross amount remains the same.

With the tax-free allowance frozen at £12,570 it is likely that from 5 April 2027 even the basic state pension will exceed this resulting in a tax liability for the majority of pensioners.

For married couples, where one of the spouses does not use their tax-free allowance (possibly due to restricted pension entitlement), it is possible to have up to £1,260 of their unused allowance transferred to their spouse, saving up to £252 pa. in tax. A Marriage Allowance claim must be submitted to HMRC by the lower income spouse - this can be backdated to 6 April 2021. This could result in a refund of tax of up to £1,008. We recommend you take advice before you make any submission to ensure that this decision benefits you.

YOUR PETS IN AUTUMN

Autumn is a beautiful time of the year but with the autumn months there are things to consider with your pets. The colder weather can affect your pet's joints especially with the older pet. They may become sluggish and stiff. Do not ignore these signs as there might be an underlying cause such as arthritis, which can be very painful, or even other hormone/metabolic issues.

With the autumn leaves falling there are poisons to think about, such as conkers, acorns and rotting fruits which can cause upset tummies. Conkers and acorns are toxic and can cause intestinal blockages. Mushrooms are also toxic and depending on the mushroom type the toxicity level can vary. Also, many plant bulbs are toxic to your pet.

When you walk your pet keep an eye on what your pet is picking up. It is also the time of year when anti-freeze is started to be used more. Anti- freeze is highly toxic and, because they like the taste, is a particular problem in cats. Be careful to keep anti-freeze away from your pets.

Seasonal Canine Illness is a rare but serious condition and is commonly diagnosed between August and November. The cause is unknown but symptoms are sickness and diarrhoea, soon after walking in woodland. If your dog shows symptoms then urgent veterinary treatment is required.

Parasites are also an issue at this time of year, with ticks and harvest mites both enjoying the colder, moist conditions of autumn. Harvest mites can be very prevalent and can make your pets extremely itchy. Harvest mites commonly congregate between toes and in the ears and can be seen as tiny, bright orange dots. Fleas are also still around, so keep your regular protection up.

Alllow for the loss of light hours when planning work on the garden. Clean up all fallen leaves, protect delicate plants from frost, and clean out water butts ready for any fresh rainwater.

Vegetables: If not done already, harvest main crop potatoes which should be 'lifted' by the end of this month. Harvest the last of peas and beans. Sow lettuces for growing under cloches. Manure or compost any spare areas or plots. Order seeds for next year.

Check 'sow by' date to avoid any failures. Fruit: Prune fruit canes, continue harvesting of apples and pears. Prune your apple trees once all the leaves have dropped, not forgetting all dead, diseased branches. Fit grease bands or barrier glue round your apple trees to catch any winter moths. Flowers: Prune climbing roses. As soon as the first frost has blackened dahlia stems or foliage, cut down to about 6" above the soil. Bulbs: Lift your gladioli corms and dry off, then store in trays or boxes.

October is the best time for planting your flower bulbs such as tulips and daffodils. **Greenhouse:** Remove tomato leaves to expose unripe fruit, and water all crops when required. Bring plants into greenhouse, reduce watering and control any slugs with slug pellets. Line your greenhouse with bubble wrap or fleece using special clips. **Lawns:** Aerate and scarify before treating with an autumn fertilizer.


