

SOUTHWOLD AND REYDON SOCIETY

We are concerned that the proposed Teal Close development by McCarthy Stone (shown in colour below), next to the Sole Bay Health Centre, does not provide the sort of housing required in our area, in particular affordable housing.



The proposed development is for 36 leasehold retirement properties and 28 parking spaces. We feel that the parking spaces are inadequate and that the two and a half storey buildings do not fit in with the surroundings. We also strongly feel that the development will put additional, and unacceptable, strain on local resources and facilities.

We have written to East Suffolk Council expressing our concerns, as have Reydon Parish Council.

The RNLI provide an invaluable service to our area and most of the lifeboat crews are unpaid volunteers. On 2nd September one of the volunteer crew, Jochem Voogt, was awarded a 20 year service medal. In total the RNLI operate over 400 boats from 238 stations. There are various ways to support the RNLI and we encourage people either to volunteer their support or give a donation.

The Reydon & Southwold Community Fridge & Pantry is a local initiative, led by Reydon Parish Council in collaboration with Southwold Town Council. The project helps local businesses reduce food waste by offering the local community short-date fresh and dry goods that would otherwise be thrown away, free of charge.

Volunteers, especially drivers to collect the donations, are needed to support this work, the Parish Council can be contacted at: https://reydonvillage.org/ contact-us/

We are very concerned about the lack of activity on the empty Council properties in Southwold and Reydon, for example, along North Road, as these could potentially provide suitable accommodation for local people.

We have been active in trying to move this forward and are writing to ESCC with questions to understand better what can be done.

The SRS annual lunch will be held on the 13th November at the William Godell Pavilion (the Rugby Clubhouse) and will comprise a two course meal at a very reasonable price of £32 with Marc Vlessing as the guest speaker.

We hope that as many members as possible are able to attend, and members may also bring guests - the more the merrier.

SOUTHGEN NEWS

The opening of the Story of Southwold Hospital, a permanent exhibition on the hospital's history from when it was a seed in the mind of the Vicar of St Edmund's Church through 'till today, was a great success. More than 50 people attended the event, which took place on Friday, 5 September, including Suffolk Coastal's MP, Jenny Liddell-Carpenter. The exhibition provides interesting details, not widely known, about the people who worked in the hospital, and the building itself. There is a plaque honouring the service of all those who worked in every capacity at the hospital, who could be identified within living memory, and also a spar of wood with the names of the builders who worked on the 1954 renovation of the building, which was continuously extended from the 1920s onwards as demand for its services grew. The exhibition's curators could not decipher the first name on the spar, so we are now calling out to the community in the hope that the name will be recognised by a family member or an old-time local with a long memory.

During the lonely days of Lockdown Summer of 2020, when the world as we knew it seemed to be coming to an end, SouthGen provided materials for people isolated at home to embroider a square on the theme of 'A Brave New World' with the idea of eventually hanging them in the hub once it was completed. The squares are now framed and part of the exhibition and make a lovely collection, with many original ideas and much charm.

Now their creators will be able to pop into The Studio at the Old Hospital and see their work given its proper prominence.

In her remarks, Mrs Liddell-Carpenter or Jenny, as she told everyone to call her, commented on the strength of community through Suffolk Coastal. Time and again, she is so impressed by how much is going on at the grass roots level.

Like the building and maintaining of the original hospital, it was mostly volunteers the exhibition was created by and it is designed to recognise the enduring strength of our community.

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OUR LOVELY HUTS

Nothing shouts 'seaside' more than the spectacular array of colourful beach huts along Southwold front. They also have a fascinating history.

In the past fishermen lived and worked on Southwold beach. 'Beach huts' in the Victorian era provided accommodation for the fishermen and their families as well as a place to store and process their catch. In the early 20th Century recreation began to overtake fishing as the main activity on the beach. The beach huts evolved accordingly. Photos from the 1920s show Southwold beach containing a mix of fishing boats, beach huts like today's, and also 'bathing machines'.

The late Jack Storer, founder of the Southwold Beach Hut Owners Association, recalls using a bathing machine on a Southwold holiday in the early 1920s: "They were drawn by a horse to the water's edge and were double ended so that you entered from the landward end, up steps, changed into swimwear inside the machine, then descended into the sea, as far as possible out of public gaze, at the seaward end. As the tide came in the horse would draw the machines back up the beach."

In 1929 Jack's father rented a beach hut on the promenade. With the fading of Victorian modesty, bathing machines were dropping out of use to be replaced with more of the huts (or chalets as they were then often called) that we know and love a century on.


Bathing machine on the beach 1923

Today the famous Southwold beach huts provide places to fully enjoy being by the seaside, even with the unpredictability of English weather. Like all treasures, the huts and the beach need constant care and attention. The Southwold Beach Hut Owners Association was formed with this intent. Not only does it act on behalf of hut owners it also helps to maintain the amenity of the promenade, beach and surrounding areas.

THE TALES OUR MOTHER TOLD! by Pat Whymark

At their mother's memorial, estranged brothers Brian and Dennis remember her childhood tales—some wise, some grim. Did they guide or confuse them? Were they fun or a smokescreen?

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VIEW TO THE NORTH

There is a definite chill in the air when I go for my morning stroll north of the pier. I would have expected to see wheatears passing through but so far I have seen none. They were absent in the spring and I was hoping to photograph some on their migration south. There are a few sand martins, and more swallows are passing though often settling on the wires near the paddle boat pond. Butterflies are still flitting around the garden, predominantly, whites, peacock and red admiral. I was pleased to see a hummingbird hawk moth feeding on the plumbago. Even at 1/1000 second, its rapid wing beat is not frozen



The boating lakes attract numerous birds. Recently I have seen reed and sedge warblers and lots of pied wagtails. One morning they were accompanied by a single yellow wagtail, a bird I have not seen there for several years. A little egret can often be seen patrolling the paddle boat and model yacht ponds. They also attract mute swans, and a pair has recently taken up residence. I managed to capture this incoming flight.



By the shore, the turnstones are gathering on the groynes and one morning I saw five redshanks on the tideline. They are not a frequent visitor here and usually they appear as individuals. Oystercatchers have also been present, usually flying past making their characteristic call. One morning I was rather baffled by a sound I heard. I tried the 'Merlin' App to see if it was recognised, it was not. I then remembered that I had heard something similar before; it was a muntjac barking.

Another insect that allowed me to get close to photograph was a speckled bush cricket. It was resting on the porch window. A rather splendid beast with a very green body and legs with a hint of red. The males rub their wings together to attract females. The sound is very high pitched about 40 kHz. Despite the wings, it is flightless.



Since I last wrote, it has continued to be predominantly dry and there have been clear nights allowing me to take images of nebulae and galaxies. Unfortunately, it was cloudy for the total eclipse of the moon. One of my favourite deep sky objects is the Iris Nebula. It is a bright reflection nebula in the constellation Cepheus and is around 1300 light years away.

PROTECTING OUR LIBRARIES

LIBRARIES ARE NOT JUST COLLECTIONS OF BOOKS...

Many of us no longer rely on the printed word for information or knowledge, but libraries provide so much more. They are a vital community service that needs to be protected, especially in rural areas like East Suffolk.

The history of libraries dates back to ancient civilizations; the Romans first gave access to 'citizens', not just to scholars.


Modern public libraries emerged in revolutionary France with the nationalisation of noble libraries and national libraries were established in the 19th and 20th centuries. In recent years digital technology has transformed libraries once again.

Libraries continue to evolve, while maintaining their core mission of preserving knowledge and supporting education. They provide access to information and technology, and enrich society, supporting social well-being and mental health. They support young people, helping them to acquire key skills and have also become 'warm hubs' offering refreshments and a safe place to spend time for free.

With the demise of most of our Tourist Information Centres, libraries now offer a range of leaflets including bus times, information about what's on and services for residents and visitors.

As we lose pubs, banks and village shops, libraries have taken on even more roles. East Suffolk Council holds weekly drop-ins and Police Safer Neighbourhood teams visit.

Sadly, as of December, Barclays Bank will cease their satellite services in several local libraries, despite them being well attended!



Halesworth Community Library

Once you join your local library, you can access several online services for free: you can download e-books and read most national newspapers, borrow audio and large print books, access the County reference library and use the computers/ Wifi. Printing, photocopying, scanning and laminating are available for a small charge.

Volunteers provide a 'Books at Home' service for those unable to visit. Libraries host the Reading Challenge during school holidays, provide term-time access for schools, after school Code Clubs, and even visits by 'reading' dogs. Every library is unique. Some have meeting rooms for hire. Period products and other health-care items may be available. There are lots of weekly activities from Music/ Stay & Play for under 5s, to groups for those with Dementia and their Carers, language classes, and a wide range of talks and workshops. Libraries are truly an asset in our communities as diverse as you could imagine, yet familiar and welcoming for all.

ARE OUR LIBRARIES AT RISK?

Today there are 45 libraries across Suffolk and three mobile Libraries which visit villages in between.

Earlier this year the library service in Suffolk reverted to being run in-house by Suffolk County Council (SCC). Prior to this they were managed by an independent charity, 'Suffolk Libraries', which was set up when SCC threatened to close our libraries some ten years ago.

There was widespread outcry then and now, strong evidence of how passionately the public feels about keeping its libraries open to the same extent as currently, or even to increase this. SCC promised that library users would not notice any change to hours or services until a full review in 2026, but in the meantime, items of planned works and key decisions have been paused.

Great uncertainty remains, for the amazing staff, dedicated volunteers and the services that many residents have come to rely upon.

One worrying change is that the former SCC Portfolio Holder for Libraries has banned story-telling activities by a Pantomime Dame who has done this for 7 years across our area. This seems to go against principles of free speech and welcoming diversity, not to mention theatre tradition since Shakespearean times!

Libraries have clearly played a significant role throughout human history and still do today. It is vital that our communities have free access to information, a 'place' for all, without perceived or actual barriers, and where young people can continue their relationship with reading. Your library is there for YOU, will you be there for your library? To enrol for free, just pop along, or look at the library website for opening hours, information about services and activities. www.suffolkcommunitylibraries.co.uk



OPEN SPACE THEATRE COMPANY

THE YOUNG and naive Vincent van Gogh finds himself lodging in a house full of secrets in a theatre production destined for Halesworth and Southwold and four other local venues in November.

'Vincent in Brixton', by Nicholas Wright, was premiered at the National Theatre and the local production is by Open Space Theatre Company, which has brought a series of classic plays to the area over the past 17 years.

It is 1873 and the young Dutchman rents a room in a suburb of London while he is being trained for a career as an art dealer.

Slowly, he becomes aware of the secrets which lie beneath the surface of everyday life in this house. Wright's play traces the transforming effects of love, sex and youthful adventure on Van Gogh's still unfound talent as a painter.

It is scheduled for Southwold Arts Centre on Thursday, November 6 and The Cut, Halesworth on Saturday November 8. Further performances are at Wingfield, Laxfield, Diss and Bungay November 5 – 14.

CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

Paying Income Tax on your State Pension

It is not always appreciated that the state pension is subject to Income Tax. This is because HMRC do not deduct tax before paying the state pension. If you are receiving the basic state pension of £230.25 per week this is not an issue as the annual amount received of £11,973 is below the tax-free allowance of £12,570. However, if you receive more than the basic state pension you should check if this exceeds the annual tax-free allowance. If it does, there is a tax liability on the excess. If you do not have private pension income as well, HMRC will issue you with a Simple Assessment calculating the tax due and asking for payment by 31 January 2026. If you do have private pension income, HMRC will collect the tax on the state pension via PAYE from your private pension provider. Effectively you will be paying more tax on your private pension to compensate for the tax you should be paying on your state pension. We take a number of calls from people who cannot understand why the tax being deducted from their private pension goes up each year. The simple reason is that the triple lock means that the state pension must increase each year. However, the tax-free allowance of £12,570 has not increased since 5 April 2021 and will not increase until 5 April 2028 at the earliest.

This means that the tax on the increase in the state pension is being deducted from your private pension income.

In net of tax terms, you are overall better off, but it is confusing when the tax paid on your private pension increases even though the gross amount remains the same. With the tax-free allowance frozen at £12,570 it is likely that from 5 April 2027 even the basic state pension will exceed this resulting in a tax liability for the majority of pensioners.

For married couples, where one of the spouses does not use their tax-free allowance (possibly due to restricted pension entitlement), it is possible to have up to £1,260 of their unused allowance transferred to their spouse, saving up to £252 pa. in tax. A Marriage Allowance claim must be submitted to HMRC by the lower income spouse - this can be backdated to 6 April 2021. This could result in a refund of tax of up to £1,008. We recommend you take advice before you make any submission to ensure that this decision benefits you.

LLOYDS TOUR OF BRITAIN MEN







OCTOBER 2025

Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

We are pleased to announce our SMS alert service is now live, the community can now sign up to receive works tracker updates via SMS as well as email. Subscribe to the Sizewell C Works Tracker at szcworkstracker.co.uk. Track Sizewell C Projects and get alerts for new activities via the login button.

Firstly, thank you for your patience as we work hard to get new infrastructure in place, such as park and ride facilities to bus our workers into site and improvements such as the A12 two village bypass and Sizewell Link Road. We are sorry for the inconvenience this is causing and will work to complete these essential projects as quickly as possible whilst providing updates to communities so you can plan your journeys. With this in mind, the Sizewell C works tracker and One Network Causeway one.network are guides to works in the area and the new subscription. service through our works tracker will also help with transport plans around the county.

We are working across the county and wider East Anglian region to improve Sizewell C related road signs, which includes removing temporary signs and replacing with permanent road signs.

This will ensure contract drivers are taking the correct routes. Closer to site, we are also replacing temporary road signs along the B1122 with permanent speed reduction and camera signs.

As part of our accommodation strategy, we announced at the last Northern Transport Forum that we have acquired part of the Darsham High Lodge site which will provide accommodation for our workforce. High Lodge benefits from being closely located to the Darsham Railway Station and the Northern Park and Ride site. A bus service will be available for workers to transport from High Lodge to site, keeping cars off the road.

We have started to build a widened and improved layby on the A12 to assist police escorting our wide load HGVs. Working closely with Suffolk County Council, we have closed one of the lanes of the dual carriageway. This is to ensure traffic flow and not create a bottleneck along the dual carriageway by ensuring a consistent one lane traffic flow from Woodbridge. This also ensures road safety for road users and workers, and Suffolk County Council will also be undertaking maintenance work during this time. The traffic management will be in place until December.


