A NOTE FROM OUR EDITOR





PROJECT UPDATE

OCTOBER 2025

Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

We are pleased to announce our SMS alert service is now live, the community can now sign up to receive works tracker updates via SMS as well as email. Subscribe to the Sizewell C Works Tracker at szcworkstracker.co.uk. Track Sizewell C Projects and get alerts for new activities via the login button.

Firstly, thank you for your patience as we work hard to get new infrastructure in place, such as park and ride facilities to bus our workers into site and improvements such as the A12 two village bypass and Sizewell Link Road. We are sorry for the inconvenience this is causing and will work to complete these essential projects as quickly as possible whilst providing updates to communities so you can plan your journeys. With this in mind, the Sizewell C works tracker and One Network Causeway one.network are guides to works in the area and the new subscription service through our works tracker will also help with transport plans around the county.

We are working across the county and wider East Anglian region to improve Sizewell C related road signs, which includes removing temporary signs and replacing with permanent road signs. This will ensure contract drivers are taking the correct routes. Closer to site, we are also replacing temporary road signs along the B1122 with permanent speed reduction and camera signs.

As part of our accommodation strategy, we announced at the last Northern Transport Forum that we have acquired part of the Darsham High Lodge site which will provide accommodation for our workforce. High Lodge benefits from being closely located to the Darsham Railway Station and the Northern Park and Ride site. A bus service will be available for workers to transport from High Lodge to site, keeping cars off the road.

We have started to build a widened and improved layby on the A12 to assist police escorting our wide load HGVs. Working closely with Suffolk County Council, we have closed one of the lanes of the dual carriageway. This is to ensure traffic flow and not create a bottleneck along the dual carriageway by ensuring a consistent one lane traffic flow from Woodbridge. This also ensures road safety for road users and workers, and Suffolk County Council will also be undertaking maintenance work during this time. The traffic management will be in place until December.

PROTECTING OUR LIBRARIES

LIBRARIES ARE NOT JUST COLLECTIONS OF BOOKS...

Many of us no longer rely on the printed word for information or knowledge, but libraries provide so much more. They are a vital community service that needs to be protected, especially in rural areas like East Suffolk.

The history of libraries dates back to ancient civilizations; the Romans first gave access to 'citizens', not just to scholars.


Modern public libraries emerged in revolutionary France with the nationalisation of noble libraries and national libraries were established in the 19th and 20th centuries. In recent years digital technology has transformed libraries once again.

Libraries continue to evolve, while maintaining their core mission of preserving knowledge and supporting education. They provide access to information and technology, and enrich society, supporting social well-being and mental health. They support young people, helping them to acquire key skills and have also become 'warm hubs' offering refreshments and a safe place to spend time for free.

With the demise of most of our Tourist Information Centres, libraries now offer a range of leaflets including bus times, information about what's on and services for residents and visitors.

As we lose pubs, banks and village shops, libraries have taken on even more roles. East Suffolk Council holds weekly drop-ins and Police Safer Neighbourhood teams visit.

Sadly, as of December, Barclays Bank will cease their satellite services in several local libraries, despite them being well attended!



Halesworth Community Library

Once you join your local library, you can access several online services for free: you can download e-books and read most national newspapers, borrow audio and large print books, access the County reference library and use the computers/ Wifi. Printing, photocopying, scanning and laminating are available for a small charge.

Volunteers provide a 'Books at Home' service for those unable to visit. Libraries host the Reading Challenge during school holidays, provide term-time access for schools, after school Code Clubs, and even visits by 'reading' dogs. Every library is unique. Some have meeting rooms for hire. Period products and other health-care items may be available. There are lots of weekly activities from Music/ Stay & Play for under 5s, to groups for those with Dementia and their Carers, language classes, and a wide range of talks and workshops. Libraries are truly an asset in our communities as diverse as you could imagine, yet familiar and welcoming for all.

ARE OUR LIBRARIES AT RISK?

Today there are 45 libraries across Suffolk and three mobile Libraries which visit villages in between.

Earlier this year the library service in Suffolk reverted to being run in-house by Suffolk County Council (SCC). Prior to this they were managed by an independent charity, 'Suffolk Libraries', which was set up when SCC threatened to close our libraries some ten years ago.

There was widespread outcry then and now, strong evidence of how passionately the public feels about keeping its libraries open to the same extent as currently, or even to increase this.

SCC promised that library users would not notice any change to hours or services until a full review in 2026, but in the meantime, items of planned works and key decisions have been paused.

Great uncertainty remains, for the amazing staff, dedicated volunteers and the services that many residents have come to rely upon.

One worrying change is that the former SCC Portfolio Holder for Libraries has banned story-telling activities by a Pantomime Dame who has done this for 7 years across our area. This seems to go against principles of free speech and welcoming diversity, not to mention theatre tradition since Shakespearean times!

Libraries have clearly played a significant role throughout human history and still do today. It is vital that our communities have free access to information, a 'place' for all, without perceived or actual barriers, and where young people can continue their relationship with reading. Your library is there for YOU, will you be there for your library? To enrol for free, just pop along, or look at the library website for opening hours, information about services and activities. www.suffolkcommunitylibraries.co.uk

WOODBRIDGE TOWN COUNCIL

During the August/ September,
Woodbridge played host to many
visitors. The evidence was all around.
Kingston Field was very popular. The
Deben Yacht Club's regatta brought
many people back to Woodbridge.
Engaging with visitors provided a
wonderful opportunity to get a glimpse
into other people's lives – people from
Shropshire, Amersham, Stansted and a
self-declared Cockney now living in Essex
to name a few, in my case.

Woodbridge now has improved bus services. There are more frequent services to Felixstowe, Grundisburgh, Rendlesham and Sutton. The 73 Felixstowe bus now provides the link to Tesco, M&S and Aldi at Martlesham Heath. The new 800 service provides a new link with Martlesham Park and Ride and a service into the centre of Ipswich hospital. The 70 bus provides a later return bus from Ipswich than previously available.

August did not turn out to be a complete holiday for the Council.

Have you heard of the plans for **Local Government Reform**? Sounds a bit dry but it is going to impact Woodbridge and its ability to thrive as a Market Town. LGR will abolish the current two upper levels of local government – Suffolk County Council and East Suffolk Council – and replace it with a single Unitary Council. There will also, in addition, be a new Strategic Authority for Norfolk and Suffolk presided over by a directly elected Mayor.

What does this all mean for us in Woodbridge? In July and August, we met with both SCC & ESC and there are some early indications that Woodbridge Town Council might need to play a bigger role in looking after some of the land and buildings currently owned by both. Opportunity? Threat? We're trying to work it out. We've established 4 working parties based on the four wards of Woodbridge to do an immediate review of the land and buildings. You might see us about - your engagement will be needed if we are to get this right.

Other events: Woodbridge has held commemorations for Victory in Japan Day and Merchant Navy Day. Both paid homage to the bravery of many in wartime and reminded us all how vital it is that we work for peace and reconciliation rather than conflict.

We also hosted the opening stage of the Tour of Britain men's cycle race. It was quite a spectacular event and, despite the traffic and the inconvenience caused, I hope you were able to enjoy it. As Mayor, I was also invited on to the panel of judges for the RSPCA's annual dog show. Judging dogs was a first for me, but I was surrounded by other very knowledgeable people. By the time this is published, we will have celebrated the 450th birthday of the Shire Hall which we all hope will have been an enjoyable, Elizabethan celebration, for Woodbridge to mark National Heritage Week.

Friends of Woodbridge Museum talks continue at the Community Centre at 2.30pm and guests are very welcome.

The next talk on 14th November is to be presented by Jane Bradburn: Capture & Escape in WW2. In the summer of 1941 Woodbridge men who had joined the 67th (Suffolk) Medium Regiment R.A.T.A. left England. The entire regiment was captured at Tobruk and Jane's talk provides a picture of how these local men survived their experiences of war.

On the 5th December Karl Lumbers' talk is entitled 'The Trinity (Lighthouse) Story'. More details to follow in our next article.

Woodbridge Museum is delighted to have received a gift of this model ship. The donor said his family believed the model was made by William Woodruffe who lived in The Thoroughfare, Woodbridge. We have a copy of Dr Groom's detailed notes of conversations he had with local people and there is a reference to a 'Woodruffe' who made model ships and who was a sailor. Dr Groom's own notes refer to a full model of the 'Newcastle' being a full three rigged mast ship without sails. Is that a reference to this model? Sadly, there is no name on this model.

Two of our knowledgeable volunteers think the model is of a whaling ship because the small boats lashed to the sides look like the type used by whalers.

We would love to know more about William Woodruffe and whether our suppositions are correct.

WATERS COPSE AND A DAY TO REMEMBER

Waters Copse lies at the bottom of Skilmans Hill, behind the free car park on Gardner Road. Named after Ronnie Waters, a former mayor, town Councillor and butcher, the copse as of 2020 was in dire straits. Overrun by brambles, nettles and Alexander there was only one pathway through from the Common to the road. Then Covid struck!

Ben Marriner rang up a few of his friends and collected together a group to tackle the problem of Waters Copse. The volunteers set to with a zeal unmatched. The two principal movers were Ben (on the right) and Bill Hancock (on the left) and it was Bill who tempered our enthusiastic efforts at immaculate husbandry, steering us to tending nature in a more considerate way. Instead of clearing the site and removing everything, Bill showed us how to build bug hotels and even created a beaver dam. He approved our digging out of the Alexander but insisted we pile it in heaps to rot slowly down. We have not seen a beaver yet however!

Paths have been driven north and south and east and west to create a delightful passage way from the carpark on Godyll Road right down and across the bridge, kindly put in by Suffolk Town Council, to the Ferry Road footpath. These paths have been laid with wood chippings, some of which have been brought up from the offcuts from the Long Ship at Woodbridge.

It is now possible to walk from the harbour to the centre of the high street and only cross one road.

Areas have been scoured to reveal snowdrops, daffodils, flowering blackcurrant, honeysuckle, wild garlic and a few bluebells. A space has been made for the talking bench. The increased bird song been remarked on, our resident mole has built his piles in the pathways and the rabbits play at dawn and dusk. The copse is there for everyone and if you have not seen it please do come and visit. The volunteers who have carried out all this work will make you most welcome - you might even like to join them one Thursday morning – we meet at the bottom of Skilmans Hill at 9am.

One final note - as a result of Ben's initiative he and Anthea were invited to a garden party at Buckingham Palace and you can't beat that!


WOODBRIDGE RIVERSIDE TRUST




RETURN OF THE OSPREY

SUFFOLK GIFT FAIR RETURNS
