

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TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

Aldeburgh Town Council met in September 2025 at the Moot Hall, where councillors discussed a range of local issues and projects and two new members, Ali Norman and Malcolm Myers, were co-opted onto the council and formally took their seats.

Councillors approved the engagement of Castleview Charitable Services to assist with a grant application to the Sizewell C Community Fund. The application will support upgrades to the Rugby Pavilion changing facilities and conversion works at the Old Generator Station.

Parking concerns were discussed, particularly the ongoing problem of vehicles parking on the grassed areas along Crag Path. The council continue to work with East Suffolk Council to identify longer-term solutions.

Other matters included approving a contractor for the internal redecoration of the Moot Hall, noting the final proofs for new directional signage, and setting a date for in-person Councillor Code of Conduct training in October. Reports from Suffolk County Council and East Suffolk Council highlighted wider issues affecting the town - these included housing and traffic pressures linked to Sizewell C and Scottish Power Renewables projects, the possibility of introducing 20mph speed limits in certain areas of Aldeburgh, and preparations for a parking review in summer 2026.

The Mayor's Report covered a busy programme of summer activities, including the Carnival, RNLI events, and the arrival of the Tour of Britain cycle race, all of which brought residents, visitors and volunteers together. The meeting concluded with councillors noting forthcoming forums on energy projects and receiving an update from the Town Clerk on the new Employment Rights Bill due later in 2025.

November opens in sparkling style with the Annual Fireworks Display (2nd November, Kings Field), followed by the town's poignant Remembrance Sunday service on 9th November and Armistice Day on Tuesday 11th November. Creativity takes the spotlight mid-month as the Poetry in Aldeburgh Festival (6th - 9th November) brings readings and workshops to venues across town.

On 15th November, treasure hunters can browse at the **Antiques & Vintage Fair**, while film lovers flock to the **30th Aldeburgh Documentary Festival**(21st - 23rd November). Meanwhile, the **Aldeburgh Gallery** stages Creative Fusion (13 – 19th November) and Sophie Crockett's exhibition Now More Than Ever (27th November - 3rd December).

December brims with festive traditions. The Christmas Craft Fair (22nd November) at the Jubilee Hall kicks off seasonal shopping, followed by the Christmas Lights Switch On the same day and later in the month the Aldeburgh Gallery Christmas Show (11th - 24th December) with unique gifts and artworks. At Jubilee Hall, Jane Austen Day (16th December) celebrates her 250th birthday, while **Ghost Stories** for Christmas (19th December) promises atmospheric winter chills. After Christmas, crowds cheer on hardy souls at the Boxing Day Swim (26th December), before the year ends with the fun-filled Sprout Sprint or Saunter 5K (31st December), a fancy-dress run-or stroll-by the sea.

Date for your Diary: Sunday 7 December, Lifeboat launch 9.30am, Aldeburgh Beach

On 7 December 1899, Aldeburgh Lifeboat Station suffered one of the worst disasters in RNLI history, when they launched into a raging gale and extremely heavy seas. The 18-strong lifeboat crew were doing a sterling job battling against the ferocious onshore wind. But the Aldeburgh's broadside was taking a pounding by the relentless waves. She was savagely struck by two huge waves in quick succession, causing her to capsize and hurling the crew into the tumultuous waters. The Aldeburgh did not sink. Instead, she was driven bottom upwards onto the shore. Only then came the stark realisation that six of the crew were missing, feared trapped underneath the boat.

The whole community gathered, and frantic work began to try and free the crew. But with the Aldeburgh weighing over 13 tonnes and measuring 14 metres in length, it was a gruelling task.

Six men died that day, and another didn't recover from his injuries and died the following March.

Augustus Mann was among the 11 survivors of the Aldeburgh disaster. He believed his lucky escape was down to the three acorns he carried in his pocket. The acorns have left a lasting legacy for Aldeburgh Lifeboat Station. A legacy that has kept the history, and the memory of his fellow lifeboatmen, alive.

The very acorns that were in his pocket have been carried onboard Aldeburgh's lifeboats since the disaster as a sign of good luck.

Due to the fragile nature of the 126-year old acorns, we will display the originals at the lifeboat station, and place fresh acorns on the lifeboat, swapping each year around 7 December.

On Sunday 7 December at approximately 9.30am, we place new acorns on our Atlantic 85 Lifeboat, Ralph, and launch from Aldeburgh Beach. All welcome.


Since moving here most of his work has primarily centred on coastal images, in particular Aldeburgh and the surrounding areas and most images are available as beautiful fine art prints and cards.

LEISURE FACILITIES - THE FUTURE & Green Party

Changes at Leisure Centres

You will be seeing some significant changes at your local leisure centre soon - Green led East Suffolk Council has ambitious plans to upgrade and decarbonise three of the district's leisure centres and has secured £4.8m to do the necessary work.

To help residents improve their health and to achieve our goal of becoming carbon neutral by 2030, we are adding £2m to a hard-won government grant of £2.8m for the necessary improvements.

Leisure centres are currently the single largest contributor to the Council's greenhouse gas emissions, accounting for around 42% of the total, so tackling emissions from the buildings is crucial to meeting overall carbon reduction targets. We also want to secure the financial future of leisure centres by reducing their running costs. Put simply, swimming pools are eye wateringly expensive to heat, so good insulation and reduced energy bills are needed to make them financially sustainable. At a time when leisure centres all over the country are being closed due to high maintenance and operating costs, this investment is essential for the planet and residents.

Everyone benefits from physical activity



Upgrades to Leiston, Waterlane in Lowestoft and Deben in Woodbridge will focus on replacing outdated gas boilers with cutting-edge air source heat pump systems for heating and CO2 heat pumps for hot water, significantly cutting energy use and emissions. The Council is also planning solar panel installations at all three sites to help offset increased electricity use from electric-only systems and is exploring a potential project for solar panel car ports at Leiston to further reduce energy bills.

Deben Leisure Centre will benefit from a new roof (the current roof was installed in the 1980s) and ageing equipment due for renewal will also be replaced across all sites.

Work is currently in the planning stage and will begin over the next two years. While there will be some inconvenience, the long-term benefits to the community are huge.

Encouraging Participation

Fewer than two-thirds of adults and less than half of children and young people meet the Chief Medical Officer's guidelines for physical activity (Sport England 2022). Tempting residents into leisure centres with modern facilities and very low cost, or free, opportunities, such as Feel Good Suffolk, The Big Sister Project and swimming lessons, are vital in encouraging the first positive steps towards investing in one's own health and wellbeing. It's not just about mental and physical health, it's also about community cohesion and personal development.

Meeting the Demand for new Leisure Options

The power of leisure activities is huge but planning proposals for new facilities can be contentious. For example, the previous Conservative administration promised a big increase in artificial grass surface ('3G') pitches which are popular with teams who can use them 24/7, but opposition to them can be significant.

If clubs follow planning legislation when applying, we are legally required to approve 3G pitches. However, if local clubs want to receive Council managed grants (mainly the Community Infrastructure Levy) they now have to meet stringent demands on business planning, projected use and capturing micro plastics.

Offering enthusiastic team members a local venue and preventing long and repeated car journeys has to come into the planning equation, as does the value of increasing opportunities for young people to play team sports.

Swimming lessons are vital for children



Access to the outdoors has become so restricted to young people that these new facilities are becoming vitally important in finding rewarding and healthy ways for them to spend their spare time.

A Personal Perspective

Soon after becoming a councillor for East Suffolk I attended a national course for newbies. On the first day the course facilitator (and a council leader) apologised for not being as cheerful as she should be. She fought back the tears as she explained that the previous evening her cabinet had reluctantly decided to close the only remaining public swimming pool in her borough. She described the anger and disappointment of residents because previous administrations had not invested sufficiently in leisure facilities. As a long-term advocate of regular activity to maintain physical and mental health, I vowed not to let that happen in East Suffolk. The plans we are making now will secure the future for our leisure centres for a decade.



Starring The Bear's Jeremy Allen White as the Boss, the film is written for the screen and directed by Scott Cooper, based on the book "Deliver Me from Nowhere" by Warren Zanes.



ONE BATTLE AFTER ANOTHER -

Washed-up revolutionary Bob (Leonardo DiCaprio) exists in a state of stoned paranoia, surviving off-grid with his spirited, self-reliant daughter, Willa (Chase Infiniti). When Bob's evil nemesis (Sean Penn) resurfaces after 16 years and Willa goes missing, the former radical scrambles to find her.

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

CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

Are you a student wanting to build your CV? Or leaving college or uni' and looking for a job? If the answer is 'yes' we need you, and we think we have a lot to offer too. One staff member, now 24, agrees: "I wasn't sure what I wanted to do after uni'. I knew Citizens Advice was well respected, so I applied to train as a volunteer adviser. This was March 2023. My trainee cohort were friendly and welcoming. When we went to the office the advisers and supervisors were welcoming too - how they dealt with client issues was impressive. I also met several of the managers early on and I remember thinking how closely their values matched my own.

"Quite soon after qualifying as a volunteer adviser I was told of job opportunities. I applied and was successful.

"My first role involved working with the Probation Service providing support and guidance to vulnerable people on probation."

"It taught me a lot about the justice system but also about the incredibly tough lives many people have. I also worked on a housing research project for CA's Research and Campaigns team. Again, I learned a lot about housing but also about how to run a campaign. Over the last two years I've had a chance to work on many other projects. I've also developed the skills to support and supervise volunteers.

"What can Citizens Advice offer people my age? Well, based on my experience, it gives you the skills needed for any public facing job. Teaching for example, or the health service, counselling, charity work, law, politics, journalism. Time spent as a volunteer adviser is great for a CV.

"There are also opportunities for paid work in CA itself. You train as a volunteer, do some general advising and then, you can apply for a paid job when opportunities arise. Some jobs allow you to specialise, others give you supervisory and management skills."

"Does CA need more young people as volunteers and staff? Yes, I think it does, for several reasons. People in their late teens or twenties don't tend to come to CA for advice, not because they haven't got problems, just because they don't think it's for them. We need ways to reach that group. Having more young people as face-to-face advisers would show we're here for them.

"CA needs more young people for other things too. Take social media – we use it and understand it. And we're not fazed by rapid changes in technology or digital systems. We grew up with them. Teams work best when with a range of skills and perspectives - we have skills that weren't needed in the past but are now."

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ALDEBURGH GARDENING CLUB

My topic this month is seeds. Again. I checked my archive and find that I have been writing this column every month since 2012, so it is unsurprising that I am starting to repeat myself. Also, I am 72 so it is unsurprising I am starting to repeat myself (that was an intentional joke not an indication of dementia).

I have had a bit of a seed collecting binge and finding a growing pile of rattling paper bags in the kitchen I had to set about sorting the seed from the chaff and popping them in envelopes to take to the gardening club where we have a free seed exchange. This "little" job, plus writing on the envelopes, takes hours and is either boring or zen depending on your outlook. Needless to say, my mind wanders... a lot.

One of the nice things about growing on sandy soil is the number of plants that pop up from self-set seed. If, of course, your garden is of the very neat variety, that can be a nuisance but I love it.

I have a lot of biennials like foxglove and verbascum and Ammi that I would never get round to replanting every year deliberately and luckily they do it themselves. I have never deliberately planted Gaura (yes I know it has changed its name but can't remember the new one) since my sister gave me a plant 20 years ago, or Catananche 10 years, or orange poppies 7 years. The list goes on. The mix that appears each year varies according to the conditions so one year I might have a magnificent display of white foxgloves, the next it might be a sea of grey leaved Lychnis and I love the variation.

It's like a new bedding scheme every year without ever having to plan it or plant it, just yank out the ones that are in the wrong place.

Other things manage to seed occasionally including Ceratostigma wilmottianum and lavender. I have a lovely yellow Abutilon that volunteered from scattered bird seed. Such serendipitous treats are joyful discoveries.

My wandering thoughts started me thinking 'what is it about sand that makes this so common?' The same is true of gravel, though perhaps fewer plants manage the trick in gravel.

I think it is partly the fact that water doesn't sit about on the surface so seeds don't rot before they have a chance to germinate.

Sand grains are large compared to heavier soils so small seed (and most of the reliable self-setters have small seed) can drop into the surface and hide from foraging birds and mice and frost. This is so successful that sometimes half-hardy seed survives the winter here.

This year I had a white flowered half-hardy tobacco plant appear that I haven't grown for at least 5 years! That is pretty amazing even allowing for climate change.

I do 'top up' some plants that are a bit less reliable. I love the small, short-lived, shrubby Hypericum olympicum which has neat plants of vertical shoots with tiny greyish leaves and a flush of yellow full sized hypericum flowers across the top. A post flowering shearing will have it flowering again in September. I have collected seed of this one this year and some of those seeds will, of course, be at the Gardening Club.

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PROJECT UPDATE

NOVEMBER 2025

Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

Sizewell C is now working in multiple areas across East Suffolk whilst we build infrastructure such as park and ride facilities and rail extensions to transport our workers and freight. We are very sorry for the impact this work is having on local journeys. Our teams are working hard to get the new infrastructure built as quickly and safely as possible but we acknowledge that some work, such as the major works to build a new road to by pass two villages on the A12, will take up to two years before it is finished.

As our work ramps up we have introduced a weekly summary of road diversions and closures that can be found on the **Sizewell C Works Tracker** - Track SZC Projects & Get Alerts for New Activities. The update will be added to the Sizewell C social media feeds, our SMS and email alerts.

The traffic lights on the A12 at Marlesford will be lifted and moved off the carriageway by the time of publication. We are reviewing the cones along the A12 and will reduce the number required as much as possible, the lay-by works are due to be completed in early December, however we are making good

progress and hope to complete the work earlier than projected. As we progress the roundabouts at Friday Street and Yoxford, careful traffic management will still be required.

We are working hard to reduce HGV and Sizewell C related traffic, we are reducing the number of office-based workers coming into Leiston as we relocate staff to the Orwell Logistics Park site where 300 desks are available. The office at Orwell will also become the default base for external meetings. We are also opening the Northern Park and Ride in phases with the first partial opening from early November, with a bus service running from the Park and Ride to site. Bus services are also now running from Saxmundham train station as we continue to promote the use of train and public transport.

As part of our commitment to bring 60 per cent of our materials by sea and rail, we are prioritising the construction of the new rail line that will take our materials to our temporary construction area, with the aim to have trains running in the first half of 2026. The works will involve building level crossings across Buckleswood Road and the B1122 (Abbey Road) in Leiston, we have built a temporary diversion road to ensure that traffic disruption is minimised.

It is firework time! 5 ways to help your cat stay calm during fireworks season

Keep your cat indoors after dark. It will reduce the risk of them being spooked!

Create a safe space for your cat. A cardboard box lined with blankets is perfect. Cats feel safer higher up – placing the box on a sturdy shelf is even better.

Play music. Cats and loud noises don't necessarily mix and keeping a radio or TV can help if your cat gets scared from the sudden sounds of fireworks. Classic FM even has a special programme of soothing music specially for your pet! Use a pheromone plug-in. A plug-in diffuser, such as Feliway, can create a calming effect on anxious cats. Begin using it a couple of weeks before fireworks season and place it in the room where your cat spends most of its time.

Stay calm. Instead of overly comforting an anxious cat, keep your cool – your cat is more likely to feel settled if you are.

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
