





THE YOUNG and naive Vincent van Gogh finds himself lodging in a house full of secrets in a theatre production destined for Halesworth and Southwold and four other local venues in November

'Vincent in Brixton', by Nicholas Wright, was premiered at the National Theatre and the local production is by Open Space Theatre Company, which has brought a series of classic plays to the area over the past 17 years.

It is 1873 and the young Dutchman rents a room in a suburb of London while he is being trained for a career as an art dealer.

Slowly, he becomes aware of the secrets which lie beneath the surface of everyday life in this house.

Wright's play traces the transforming effects of love, sex and youthful adventure on Van Gogh's still unfound talent as a painter.

It is scheduled for Southwold Arts Centre on Thursday, November 6 and The Cut, Halesworth on Saturday November 8. Further performances are at Wingfield, Laxfield, Diss and Bungay November 5 – 14.

SOUTHWOLD & REYDON SOCIETY

The King Charles III England Coast Path will be the longest managed coastal path in the world, and when complete will cover 2700 miles around England's shores. Nearly 1900 miles is already open and fully accessible to the public, but the section between Southwold and Pakefield has not been approved yet, delayed because of objections by the Landowner.

The Society has written to local MP, Jenny Riddell Carpenter but is waiting for a reply.

Despite a successful season for holiday lettings in Southwold and Reydon, Southwold High Street has seen yet another reduction in footfall this year.

The Society notes with sadness the recent closure of Squires, the traditional sweet shop and tearoom, which has been a wellknown fixture on the High Street for over 40 years.

With high business rates and rents and National Insurance contributions for employers to pay for their staff it's hardly surprising that independent traders are finding it tough. Sadly, vacant spaces are too often filled either by charity shops or chain stores who are apparently the only retailers that can afford to be on the High Street, all of which reduces Southwold's appeal to visitors looking for independent shops.

Extra help with business rates is something that could perhaps be done at a local level to encourage small businesses to open on the High Street.

And the Rats! Measures have been taken by East Suffolk Council to reduce the rat population along the cliffs, with some success. However, Felixstowe and Lowestoft, both sharing the same problems have benefitted, it seems, from funding to tackle the vermin and re-landscape their cliffs. Southwold - it would appear - is unlikely to qualify for this support. The Society will continue to follow this up with East Suffolk Council.

The Society is delighted to hear that The Southwold Arts Centre is reporting a very successful year so far, together with the Summer Theatre. Managed entirely by volunteers, this is a valuable asset for the Community and should be congratulated. "We want to create a space that truly serves our whole community - whether you're looking for cardio machines and weight training, group exercise classes, support with mobility challenges, postnatal exercise, or anything in between. This survey helps us understand what Southwold and Reydon actually need."

Responding to Community Need

Over the summer, residents made their voices heard loud and clear on social media: Southwold and Reydon need local fitness facilities. With hundreds of new homes being built in Reydon, the population is growing, but the nearest gym remains a 30 minute drive away. As one resident put it, spending an hour in the car to reach a gym defeats the purpose of reducing stress and improving fitness - not to mention adding petrol costs on top of membership fees. With Sizewell-related traffic expected to increase as worker accommodation comes on stream, the value of facilities you can walk or cycle to becomes even more apparent. Barclays' decision to close its local branches freed up The Studio space, while the GFA space became available when its occupancy agreement ends in July 2026. These spaces combined provide the perfect opportunity to answer the community's call.



VIEW TO THE NORTH

There are still some swallows passing south and a few house martins have been seen with them. I used to see lots when I visited Darsham and it has always been a mystery to me why there are not more in the Southwold area.

I have commented before that one of my favourite birds is the wheatear. I saw none in the spring as they make their way north and it has only been in the last few days that there have been some passing south but they seem to be very low on numbers this year, I am not sure why.

The marsh harriers seem to have disappeared; I assume that their feeding frenzy has diminished after their young have flown the nest.

Although a new owl box has been put up along North Road, the barn owls have also been absent for yet another month. I was lucky with the resident kestrel which posed for me outside the front of the house on the power line, it was certainly giving me the eye. I must have disrupted its quest for prey.

One or two teal have been seen at the model yacht pond, the numbers should grow soon and we will be able to hear their characteristic piping calls. Gadwall and shoveler should also arrive in the coming weeks. A little egret is often by the ponds catching small fish, the 'marigold' fellow feet always make me smile. There are still a few warblers in the reeds next to the ponds, sedge, reed and chiffchaff.

There have been some good days for flying the drone, clear air and light wind. One morning I decided to fly as the mist was lifting and obtained several atmospheric shots.

This time of year, there are often spectacular sun rises; they are particularly photogenic when there are a few clouds in the sky. One morning some dark grey clouds were backlit and provide an unusual backdrop to the beach huts. Next time I write I expect they will have been moved to their winter accommodation in the car park.

As the nights get longer it will be easier to get some shots of galaxies and nebula, I am hoping for some cloud free opportunities. There is a comet within sight, C/2025 A6 Lemmon (no idea how it was named). I did get one image of it using the smart telescope, but I am hoping for better. The problem is that it is most visible in the very early hours.

£7000 RAISED FOR HELP2UKRAINE

Southwold's Erika Clegg DL has completed her 60-mile Sandlings Walk, raising around £7,000 for the charity Help2Ukraine. The money will help send lifesaving ambulances, fully equipped with medical supplies, to the Ukrainian frontline.

Over three days Erika walked from Ipswich to Southwold along the Sandlings Way, joined at different points by her dog, her son and a group of local women. The journey, which was themed 'Peace, Hope and Solidarity', brought changing scenery and some testing weather courtesy of Storm Amy.

Day One, 'Peace', took Erika and her dog Biggles from Ipswich to Butley through the county town outskirts towards fields, woodlands and saltmarsh bursting with autumn wildlife. Day Two, 'Hope', was spent with her son Will crossing forest and heathland towards Thorpeness: the morning was sunny, the afternoon brought the biggest impact from the storm.

The final day, 'Solidarity', brought together women from across Suffolk walking from Thorpeness to Southwold, in step with the women of Ukraine who continue to carry the weight of war and family.

"There were moments when the Ukraine flag that I was carrying wrapped itself round my face or caught in trees," said Erika. "It felt strangely fitting to be struggling against the wind and honoured the Ukrainians' resilience."

As the group reached Southwold, supporters joined the walkers along the prom and a small crowd gathered to welcome them home. "The atmosphere at the finish was extraordinary. Children were running up to their mums, husbands and partners were looking proud, and some generous people handed me an extra cash donation." said Erika. "It was heartwarming to see so many people there to support the cause."

John Nickell-Lean, who leads Help2Ukraine's ambulance initiative, added:

"Erika's walk has been a remarkable act of solidarity. Every pound raised goes directly towards getting another ambulance to the front line, vehicles that make an immediate, tangible difference to saving lives."

Help2Ukraine sources ex-NHS ambulances through a trusted medical network, each one refitted and stocked with around £250,000 of supplies before being driven to the Ukrainian border. Donations remain open and continue to rise.

"This walk was three days out of a busy life but it will help people living through years of hardship," Erika said. "It was an honour to walk in support of Ukraine."

LEISURE FACILITIES - THE FUTURE Green Party

Changes at Leisure Centres

You will be seeing some significant changes at your local leisure centre soon - Green led East Suffolk Council has ambitious plans to upgrade and decarbonise three of the district's leisure centres and has secured £4.8m to do the necessary work.

To help residents improve their health and to achieve our goal of becoming carbon neutral by 2030, we are adding £2m to a hard-won government grant of £2.8m for the necessary improvements.

Leisure centres are currently the single largest contributor to the Council's greenhouse gas emissions, accounting for around 42% of the total, so tackling emissions from the buildings is crucial to meeting overall carbon reduction targets. We also want to secure the financial future of leisure centres by reducing their running costs. Put simply, swimming pools are eye wateringly expensive to heat, so good insulation and reduced energy bills are needed to make them financially sustainable. At a time when leisure centres all over the country are being closed due to high maintenance and operating costs, this investment is essential for the planet and residents.

Everyone benefits from physical activity



Upgrades to Leiston, Waterlane in Lowestoft and Deben in Woodbridge will focus on replacing outdated gas boilers with cutting-edge air source heat pump systems for heating and CO2 heat pumps for hot water, significantly cutting energy use and emissions. The Council is also planning solar panel installations at all three sites to help offset increased electricity use from electric-only systems and is exploring a potential project for solar panel car ports at Leiston to further reduce energy bills.

Deben Leisure Centre will benefit from a new roof (the current roof was installed in the 1980s) and ageing equipment due for renewal will also be replaced across all sites.

Work is currently in the planning stage and will begin over the next two years. While there will be some inconvenience, the long-term benefits to the community are huge.

Encouraging Participation

Fewer than two-thirds of adults and less than half of children and young people meet the Chief Medical Officer's guidelines for physical activity (Sport England 2022). Tempting residents into leisure centres with modern facilities and very low cost, or free, opportunities, such as Feel Good Suffolk, The Big Sister Project and swimming lessons, are vital in encouraging the first positive steps towards investing in one's own health and wellbeing. It's not just about mental and physical health, it's also about community cohesion and personal development.

Meeting the Demand for new Leisure Options

The power of leisure activities is huge but planning proposals for new facilities can be contentious. For example, the previous Conservative administration promised a big increase in artificial grass surface ('3G') pitches which are popular with teams who can use them 24/7, but opposition to them can be significant.

If clubs follow planning legislation when applying, we are legally required to approve 3G pitches. However, if local clubs want to receive Council managed grants (mainly the Community Infrastructure Levy) they now have to meet stringent demands on business planning, projected use and capturing micro plastics.

Offering enthusiastic team members a local venue and preventing long and repeated car journeys has to come into the planning equation, as does the value of increasing opportunities for young people to play team sports.

Swimming lessons are vital for children



Access to the outdoors has become so restricted to young people that these new facilities are becoming vitally important in finding rewarding and healthy ways for them to spend their spare time.

A Personal Perspective

Soon after becoming a councillor for East Suffolk I attended a national course for newbies. On the first day the course facilitator (and a council leader) apologised for not being as cheerful as she should be. She fought back the tears as she explained that the previous evening her cabinet had reluctantly decided to close the only remaining public swimming pool in her borough. She described the anger and disappointment of residents because previous administrations had not invested sufficiently in leisure facilities. As a long-term advocate of regular activity to maintain physical and mental health, I vowed not to let that happen in East Suffolk. The plans we are making now will secure the future for our leisure centres for a decade.

PROJECT UPDATE

NOVEMBER 2025

Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

Sizewell C is now working in multiple areas across East Suffolk whilst we build infrastructure such as park and ride facilities and rail extensions to transport our workers and freight. We are very sorry for the impact this work is having on local journeys. Our teams are working hard to get the new infrastructure built as quickly and safely as possible but we acknowledge that some work, such as the major works to build a new road to by pass two villages on the A12, will take up to two years before it is finished.

As our work ramps up we have introduced a weekly summary of road diversions and closures that can be found on the **Sizewell C Works Tracker** - Track SZC Projects & Get Alerts for New Activities. The update will be added to the Sizewell C social media feeds, our SMS and email alerts.

The traffic lights on the A12 at Marlesford will be lifted and moved off the carriageway by the time of publication. We are reviewing the cones along the A12 and will reduce the number required as much as possible, the lay-by works are due to be completed in early December, however we are making good

progress and hope to complete the work earlier than projected. As we progress the roundabouts at Friday Street and Yoxford, careful traffic management will still be required.

We are working hard to reduce HGV and Sizewell C related traffic, we are reducing the number of office-based workers coming into Leiston as we relocate staff to the Orwell Logistics Park site where 300 desks are available. The office at Orwell will also become the default base for external meetings. We are also opening the Northern Park and Ride in phases with the first partial opening from early November, with a bus service running from the Park and Ride to site. Bus services are also now running from Saxmundham train station as we continue to promote the use of train and public transport.

As part of our commitment to bring 60 per cent of our materials by sea and rail, we are prioritising the construction of the new rail line that will take our materials to our temporary construction area, with the aim to have trains running in the first half of 2026. The works will involve building level crossings across Buckleswood Road and the B1122 (Abbey Road) in Leiston, we have built a temporary diversion road to ensure that traffic disruption is minimised.

WORLINGHAM AND CARLTON MARSHES

The Blyth Valley and Southwold SWT Wildlife group welcomed Vicky Eyles, the Suffolk Wildlife Trust Wilder Community Officer, who gave us an update on Worlingham and Carlton Marshes. Many of you may have visited Carlton Marshes, now such a successful reserve, with its varied fen, marsh, tree and wetland areas, and its good access, play and café facilities.

The land was in agricultural use until the 1970s, so there was much to do to restore it to a more natural state. The Trust has continued to buy areas of land there, when possible, with the aim of creating a wildlife corridor along the River Waveney, making links with Castle and Worlingham Marshes, allowing the flora and fauna to move and flourish more easily.

Peto's Marsh was a recent major purchase, with match funding from the Heritage Fund, and it is now a magnet for overwintering wildfowl, and a spring breeding ground for diverse species. Other smaller areas continue to be added to the reserve.

Worlingham Marsh is very different. It has always been a wild area, and so the Trust has been able to enhance what is already there.

There is limited public access to the Marsh while improvements to habitat are carried out but greater access will be possible in the future. We watched and enjoyed some fascinating footage from trail cams, a taste of what we will find there.

Vicky also spoke about the wide range of Outreach work she is involved in, from visiting schools, to setting up volunteer work teams, surveys, local events, community wildlife gardens, and discovery walks.

Local farmers are often interested in, and support, Trust initiatives, and she offers guidance and resources, such as relevant books, and the loan of trail cams. These can give wonderful footage of fox or badger families, for example, which can encourage landowners to enjoy what their land supports.

It was fascinating to learn so much about two of our nearest reserves, and we left with the feeling that we will visit more often and explore further.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, November 13th, at 7.30 at the Southwold Arts Centre, IP18 6JP. Ian Bedford will talk about 'The Trouble Without Wasps'.

The cost is £5 to include refreshments. Under 25s are free and all are welcome.



Volunteer & Job opportunities with CAES

Are you a student wanting to build your CV? Or leaving college or uni' and looking for a job? If the answer is 'yes' we need you, and we think we have a lot to offer too. One staff member, now 24, agrees: "I wasn't sure what I wanted to do after uni'. I knew Citizens Advice was well respected, so I applied to train as a volunteer adviser. This was March 2023. My trainee cohort were friendly and welcoming. When we went to the office the advisers and supervisors were welcoming too - how they dealt with client issues was impressive. I also met several of the managers early on and I remember thinking how closely their values matched my own.

"Quite soon after qualifying as a volunteer adviser I was told of job opportunities. I applied and was successful. My first role involved working with the Probation Service providing support and guidance to vulnerable people on probation."

"It taught me a lot about the justice system but also about the incredibly tough lives many people have and the range of issues they need help with. I also worked on a housing research project for CA's Research and Campaigns team. Again, I learned a lot about housing but also about how to run a campaign. Over the last two years I've had a chance to work on many other projects. I've also developed the skills to support and supervise volunteers.

"What can Citizens Advice offer people my age? Well, based on my experience, it gives you the skills needed for any public facing job. Teaching for example, or the health service, counselling, charity work, law, politics, journalism. Time spent as a volunteer adviser is therefore great for a CV.

"There are also opportunities for paid work in CA itself. You train as a volunteer, do some general advising and then, if you like the fast pace and want the challenge, you can apply for a paid job when opportunities arise.

"CA is a great organisation for giving young people responsibilities early on.

"Does CA need more young people as volunteers and staff? Yes, I think it does, for several reasons. People in their late teens or twenties don't tend to come to CA for advice, not because they haven't got problems, just because they don't think it's for them. We need ways to reach that group. Having more young people as face-to-face advisers would show we're here for them.

"CA needs more young people for other things too. Take social media – we use it and understand it. And we're not fazed by rapid changes in technology or digital systems. We grew up with them. Teams work best when with a range of skills and perspectives – we have skills that weren't needed in the past but are now."


