A NOTE FROM OUR EDITOR







WOODBRIDGE TOWN COUNCIL

This month our focus is on the work of our Climate and Ecological Emergency Committee, chaired by Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Ellie Beck. Unlike our others, this Committee has voting members that are residents of Woodbridge with 6 Councillors and 6 public members. It is a model that works well.

There are two recent projects of note that have been widely supported by the Town. The first was the response to making Kingston Field more secure against vehicle access. Instead of opting for fencing, the Committee recommended planting a new hedge and some extra trees. The work was done with the support of Botanica in Campsea Ashe and the planting plan is beginning to take great shape. One challenge - we underestimated that at the height of summer it requires 40,000 litres of water a week. So, for next summer we've agreed to install a couple of solar pumps from the stream at the edge of Kingston Field which is fed by a spring in the Nottcutt's area, so the water levels remain constant.

The second project is the new boardwalk in Fen Meadow. We've received many positive comments as it keeps the path open over land that can become very boggy. Furthermore, the Committee has now adopted a set of actions that are aimed at developing the biodiversity of Fen Meadow which will enhance its "wilder" green space. To this end we've had the results of the latest town survey on the Fen Meadow playground, and your consensus is to develop the existing playground on the current site. So, we've listened to you - and we won't be moving it! Another area of focus is water. How do you retain water and tackle surface flooding in Woodbridge? A small factoid that we stumbled across during a flood risk meeting with Suffolk County Council and Anglia Water: the highest rainfall during storm Babet in October 2023 fell two metres to the north of the A12 near Woodbridge. Had it been this side of the A12, the story might have been very different. Other Suffolk towns and villages suffered considerable damage. The other risk is of course storm surges from the river. Your Town Council does not classify either of these risks as red risks, but they are certainly amber, and we do not have the budget to mitigate these risks. However, we are reviewing our emergency arrangements should the flood barrier fail at Whisstocks and examining ways of better capturing rainfall from the Council's properties - something we should all be thinking about.

The Committee is active in other areas and is driven by the belief that at a local level there are things we can do that can add up to something big in the fight to mitigate climate change – tree cover and increasing local production of food to name just two.

WOODBRIDGE CHRISTMAS LIGHTS SWITCH-ON

Woodbridge Festival of Art and Music and Woodbridge Town Council

Geno Washington, the founding father of Brit Soul Music, is returning to Woodbridge, the Suffolk Town he started his career in, to switch on the Town's Christmas lights during celebrations on **Thursday 27 November and Friday 28 November**. Geno will switch-on the town lights on Thursday, alongside the Mayor of Woodbridge and Jenny Riddell-Carpenter MP.

Other events will include the annual lantern parade, led by illuminated stars and the East Angles Brass Band, Christmas carols, accordion chanson by Garance Louis (*Wonderful -* Cerys Mathews, BBC6Music), light and fire displays by Calvin Lok and Audio Visual sets by DJ Ben Osborne and VJ Girl In A T-Shirt.

There will be children's rides, Father Christmas on the Thoroughfare and Make and Do lantern workshops in the Shire Hall (4:30 - 5:30pm). Open air food markets will offer German Sausages, Pretzels, Burgers, Candy Floss, Doughnuts, Korean and Mexican street food, Reuben's, Pizza, horse box bars serving cocktails and Prosecco, Hopsters' craft beer and Mr Bee's real ale and mulled wine and cider stands.

Both nights will see events start from 4:30pm, with lights being switched on at 6pm and street food until 8pm. The lights will be switched on outside the Shire Hall on Thursday 27 November, after which the annual lantern parade will join events on the Thoroughfare. Geno Washington will perform live at Market Hill.

On Friday 28 November and there will be events from 4:30 pm, with the switch-on at 6pm and music, light and community art projections on the Tide Mill and stalls and open air street food in Whisstock's Place until 8pm - followed by an after party at Hopsters.

In the 1960s, legendary soul singer Geno Washington topped bills alongside Jimi Hendrix, Cream and Pink Floyd, scored chart topping LPs and was famously celebrated by Dexy's Midnight Runners in their 1980's hit ,Geno'.

Washington only started singing after he was posted to Suffolk as the PE instructor for the US Air Force base in Woodbridge. This summer he played his first gig back in Woodbridge since 1965, as part of Woodbridge Festival's well-received Super Fly project. After his show the festival organisers promised the crowd they wouldn't have to wait another 60 years to see him again. Now they've invited him and his band back for the townwide Lights On celebrations.

The Lights On weekend is organised by Woodbridge Festival of Art and Music and Woodbridge Town Council to celebrate the lights put up by Choose Woodbridge on behalf of Woodbridge Town Council.

What's more, since marrying and making a family with Sir Rod Stewart, Penny has embraced every opportunity offered to her.


She's competed on, Strictly Come Dancing, Celebrity MasterChef, Who Wants to be a Millionaire and she is a quest panellist on Loose Women.

WOODBRIDGE TIDE MILL RESTORATION

The Tide Mill restoration fundraiser launched in March this year has reached its target of £60,000!

Work has already started, with scaffolding up for safe access to the Grade 1 listed building. The distinctive shiplap exterior is being prepared before weatherproof paint is applied. The renovation is planned to take about 3 weeks during which time the Mill will be open 11am – 5pm daily. The Mill's riverside boardwalk will be closed but otherwise the Mill will remain fully open. The Woodbridge Tide Mill Trust Trustees, staff and volunteers would like to thank all the donors that made this possible. Announcing the tremendous achievement while 'topping off' the fundraising thermometer, Tide Mill Charitable Trust President, and instigator of the project, John Carrington said "It's so rewarding to the team to see this support for the Mill. Managing this historic local legacy takes a daily effort and periodic fundraising to keep it the only working tide mill in the UK.

"It was heartwarming to see a wide range of donations from local donors including local family trusts, estates and businesses. The fundraiser was topped off by grants from the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Postcode Lottery. The Trustees are extremely grateful to all donors, regardless of amount, and will ensure that 100% of the donations are put to the Mill's restoration for the community."

The Tide Mill will close for the winter, except for pre-booked education and group bookings, on Monday 3 November.

PROJECT UPDATE

NOVEMBER 2025

Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

Sizewell C is now working in multiple areas across East Suffolk whilst we build infrastructure such as park and ride facilities and rail extensions to transport our workers and freight. We are very sorry for the impact this work is having on local journeys. Our teams are working hard to get the new infrastructure built as quickly and safely as possible but we acknowledge that some work, such as the major works to build a new road to by pass two villages on the A12, will take up to two years before it is finished.

As our work ramps up we have introduced a weekly summary of road diversions and closures that can be found on the **Sizewell C Works Tracker** - Track SZC Projects & Get Alerts for New Activities. The update will be added to the Sizewell C social media feeds, our SMS and email alerts.

The traffic lights on the A12 at Marlesford will be lifted and moved off the carriageway by the time of publication. We are reviewing the cones along the A12 and will reduce the number required as much as possible, the lay-by works are due to be completed in early December, however we are making good

progress and hope to complete the work earlier than projected. As we progress the roundabouts at Friday Street and Yoxford, careful traffic management will still be required.

We are working hard to reduce HGV and Sizewell C related traffic, we are reducing the number of office-based workers coming into Leiston as we relocate staff to the Orwell Logistics Park site where 300 desks are available. The office at Orwell will also become the default base for external meetings. We are also opening the Northern Park and Ride in phases with the first partial opening from early November, with a bus service running from the Park and Ride to site. Bus services are also now running from Saxmundham train station as we continue to promote the use of train and public transport.

As part of our commitment to bring 60 per cent of our materials by sea and rail, we are prioritising the construction of the new rail line that will take our materials to our temporary construction area, with the aim to have trains running in the first half of 2026. The works will involve building level crossings across Buckleswood Road and the B1122 (Abbey Road) in Leiston, we have built a temporary diversion road to ensure that traffic disruption is minimised.

MARTLESHAM WILDS



WOODBRIDGE MUSEUM

The Museum continues to receive interesting donations that all add to our knowledge of the local area. We have recently been given a postcard album which was compiled by the late Frank & Christine Knights. In the album there is this photograph of the Zeppelin bomb damage to St John's Hill which members of the Collections Team haven't seen before.

At about 10.30pm on 12th August 1915, one of a group of Zeppelins passed over Woodbridge & Melton and this was met with rifle and machine gun fire from soldiers stationed in the town. The crew responded by dropping more than 20 explosive and incendiary bombs.

One of these fell on St John's Hill killing 6 local people. As you can see from the photograph the damage to the area was extensive. The museum holds many other contemporary photographs which all show the extent of the devastation.

Interestingly the article that Arthur Fairweather, the Editor of the Woodbridge Reporter, wrote was censured by the Press Bureau, presumably because it was thought it would be bad for morale for the loss of life to become more widely known. It was not until the 9th January 1919 that the paper was able to publish an account.

Woodbridge Museum has some of these events on display including the diary written by a young Ruby Hayward, the founder of the museum, detailing her experiences of that terrible night. Do come and have a look.

Winter opening hours 10.30am - 3.30pm. Saturday & Sunday. The next Friends of Woodbridge Museum talk is on 14th November 2.30pm at Woodbridge Community Hall.

This will be presented by Jane Bradburn entitled 'Capture and Escape in WW2' about the men of the 67th (Suffolk) Medium Regiment R.A. who were captured at Tobruk.

LEISURE FACILITIES - THE FUTURE & Green Party

Changes at Leisure Centres

You will be seeing some significant changes at your local leisure centre soon - Green led East Suffolk Council has ambitious plans to upgrade and decarbonise three of the district's leisure centres and has secured £4.8m to do the necessary work.

To help residents improve their health and to achieve our goal of becoming carbon neutral by 2030, we are adding £2m to a hard-won government grant of £2.8m for the necessary improvements.

Leisure centres are currently the single largest contributor to the Council's greenhouse gas emissions, accounting for around 42% of the total, so tackling emissions from the buildings is crucial to meeting overall carbon reduction targets. We also want to secure the financial future of leisure centres by reducing their running costs. Put simply, swimming pools are eye wateringly expensive to heat, so good insulation and reduced energy bills are needed to make them financially sustainable. At a time when leisure centres all over the country are being closed due to high maintenance and operating costs, this investment is essential for the planet and residents.

Everyone benefits from physical activity



Upgrades to Leiston, Waterlane in Lowestoft and Deben in Woodbridge will focus on replacing outdated gas boilers with cutting-edge air source heat pump systems for heating and CO2 heat pumps for hot water, significantly cutting energy use and emissions. The Council is also planning solar panel installations at all three sites to help offset increased electricity use from electric-only systems and is exploring a potential project for solar panel car ports at Leiston to further reduce energy bills.

Deben Leisure Centre will benefit from a new roof (the current roof was installed in the 1980s) and ageing equipment due for renewal will also be replaced across all sites.

Work is currently in the planning stage and will begin over the next two years. While there will be some inconvenience, the long-term benefits to the community are huge.

Encouraging Participation

Fewer than two-thirds of adults and less than half of children and young people meet the Chief Medical Officer's guidelines for physical activity (Sport England 2022). Tempting residents into leisure centres with modern facilities and very low cost, or free, opportunities, such as Feel Good Suffolk, The Big Sister Project and swimming lessons, are vital in encouraging the first positive steps towards investing in one's own health and wellbeing. It's not just about mental and physical health, it's also about community cohesion and personal development.

Meeting the Demand for new Leisure Options

The power of leisure activities is huge but planning proposals for new facilities can be contentious. For example, the previous Conservative administration promised a big increase in artificial grass surface ('3G') pitches which are popular with teams who can use them 24/7, but opposition to them can be significant.

If clubs follow planning legislation when applying, we are legally required to approve 3G pitches. However, if local clubs want to receive Council managed grants (mainly the Community Infrastructure Levy) they now have to meet stringent demands on business planning, projected use and capturing micro plastics.

Offering enthusiastic team members a local venue and preventing long and repeated car journeys has to come into the planning equation, as does the value of increasing opportunities for young people to play team sports.

Swimming lessons are vital for children



Access to the outdoors has become so restricted to young people that these new facilities are becoming vitally important in finding rewarding and healthy ways for them to spend their spare time.

A Personal Perspective

Soon after becoming a councillor for East Suffolk I attended a national course for newbies. On the first day the course facilitator (and a council leader) apologised for not being as cheerful as she should be. She fought back the tears as she explained that the previous evening her cabinet had reluctantly decided to close the only remaining public swimming pool in her borough. She described the anger and disappointment of residents because previous administrations had not invested sufficiently in leisure facilities. As a long-term advocate of regular activity to maintain physical and mental health, I vowed not to let that happen in East Suffolk. The plans we are making now will secure the future for our leisure centres for a decade.

WICKHAM MARKET CELEBRATES

Wickham Market celebrated the official launch of The George Community Pub in September. This 500-year-old Grade II listed building was saved from certain demolition after a devastating fire in 2013.

In the early 20th century, the village was served by seven pubs but by 1999, only The George remained at the heart of the village's conservation area.

The fire left The George badly damaged and three years later, the people of Wickham Market got together and began the long process of fundraising to restore the pub. Alongside The National Lottery Heritage funding of £1.8m and grants from other local and national organisations, 470 shareholders have contributed over £400,000 – a testament to the passionate support for the project in Wickham Market and beyond.

Rachel Macfarlane, Senior Engagement Manager at The National Lottery Heritage Fund said,

"It is a pleasure to see The George reopen, as we mark investing a total of £2bn of National Lottery and other funding in heritage projects across the midlands and east of England.

"Congratulations to The George team for all their hard work, supported with £1.8million thanks to National Lottery players. We're proud that this work has saved an historic building, transforming it into an inclusive community space that provides 12 new jobs in the village."

As well as reopening as a bar and restaurant, the building has been transformed into a centre for social, educational and cultural activities, with flexible community spaces on the first floor. A part-time Community Engagement Coordinator leads a programme of activities promoting wellbeing and combating loneliness.

The historic structure of the pub has been fully restored with the addition of a newly built extension. Improvements have been made to the building's accessibility and new research into the pub's long history will be proudly displayed throughout. Committee member, George Hering, says "It was all down to the support of our community and to a very strong, dedicated and hard-working team, that after 10 years of toil and trouble, and in the face of innumerable challenges with the odds stacked against us, we did it – we saved The George"

Volunteer & Job opportunities with CAES

Are you a student wanting to build your CV? Or leaving college or uni' and looking for a job? If the answer is 'yes' we need you, and we think we have a lot to offer too.

One staff member, now 24, agrees: "I wasn't sure what I wanted to do after uni'. I knew Citizens Advice was well respected, so I applied to train as a volunteer adviser. This was March 2023. My trainee cohort were friendly and welcoming. When we went to the office the advisers and supervisors were welcoming too - how they dealt with client issues was impressive. I also met several of the managers early on and I remember thinking how closely their values matched my own.

"Quite soon after qualifying as a volunteer adviser I was told of job opportunities. I applied and was successful. My first role involved working with the Probation Service providing support and guidance to vulnerable people on probation.

It taught me a lot about the justice system but also about the incredibly tough lives many people have and the range of issues they need help with. I also worked on a housing research project for CA's Research and Campaigns team. Again, I learned a lot about housing but also about how to run a campaign. Over the last two years I've had a chance to work on many other projects. I've also developed the skills to support and supervise volunteers.

"What can Citizens Advice offer people my age? Well, based on my experience, it gives you the skills needed for any public facing job. Teaching for example, or the health service, counselling, charity work, law, politics, journalism. Time spent as a volunteer adviser is therefore great for a CV.

"There are also opportunities for paid work in CA itself. You train as a volunteer, do some general advising and then, if you like the fast pace and want the challenge, you can apply for a paid job when opportunities arise. Some jobs allow you to specialise, others give you supervisory and management skills.

CA is a great organisation for giving young people responsibilities early on. "Does CA need more young people as volunteers and staff? Yes, I think it does, for several reasons. People in their late teens or twenties don't tend to come to CA for advice, not because they haven't got problems, just because they don't think it's for them. We need ways to reach that group. Having more young people as face-to-face advisers would show we're here for them.

"CA needs more young people for other things too. Take social media – we use it and understand it. And we're not fazed by rapid changes in technology or digital systems. We grew up with them. Teams work best when with a range of skills and perspectives – we have skills that weren't needed in the past but are now."
