

Meanwhile, the Town Council is proud to support Net Zero Leiston's 'Pedal to Zero' initiative - a cycle hire scheme helping residents and visitors travel sustainably around the town. The onset of winter can be challenging for many people; it's not just the long dark hours and the cold and damp. We need to use more energy with heating and lighting our homes and then Christmas looms with more demands on your purse.

The Live Well Hub Leiston offers a wide range of services to help and support you; perhaps you are struggling with some practical issues like housing, finance or family? The Social Prescribers from Connect4Health can offer a wide range of support – come into the Live Well Hub and we can do a referral for you.

You might want to join one of the seated exercise or yoga classes and stay for tea and biscuits afterwards, the ideal combination of flexibility and sociability!

Do you or someone in your family have disabilities? Advisors from the Disability Advice Service have a drop-in session once a month.

Want to stop smoking? Visit a Counsellor from Feel Good Suffolk, who can help you find the best way to cut down or stop smoking and provide on-going support. Inspire, the Youth Employment Service, offer courses in developing self-confidence, team building, volunteering as well as help in CV writing and job interviews.

The service is free and available to anyone between 16 and 25 years old. Calling all veterans, (partners and families): On the third Friday of each month Combat2Coffee hold a coffee morning at the Live Well Hub. You can just sit and chat with other Veterans or find out what support is available.

Domestic abuse can take many forms; physical, emotional or psychological and it can happen to anyone. Anglia Care Trust is here to help you.

At The Live Well Hub we can also signpost to local and national organisations that can offer support for a wide variety of issues from bereavement, illness, mental health, well-being and much more.

You are always welcome to come in, have a cuppa and see what is on offer. We open Monday to Friday, from 9am to 4pm and you can follow us on Facebook for updates and information.

Beat the scammers and have a Happy Christmas!

Christmas is coming and the geese are getting fat and so, too, are the scammers and fraudsters who prey on online shoppers.

As a basic rule NEVER fall for an offer which is "too good to be true". If it is, it isn't! For example, a holiday that is much cheaper than you would expect. And use a credit card when shopping online, it gives added protection.

If you are contacted unexpectedly, then be wary. It might be a scam. If you suspect you are not dealing with a real company, then check it out. Real companies will offer a postal address. Don't click any links – search for the company on another website and check the phone number. If you're about to spend a lot of money, it's best to use the Companies House website to be sure the company you're buying from is real and still trading.

Always be suspicious if you are asked to transfer money quickly, such as being pressed to act now because the offer will only be open for a short time, or items are limited in number. Being asked to pay in an unusual way is another warning sign – for example by iTunes vouchers or through a money transfer service like MoneyGram, Western Union or with a crypto currency such as Bitcoin. If in any doubt, do not buy.

If you are asked to give personal information such as passwords or PINs you should back away. Reputable companies and businesses do not ask for these.

And if you are called by someone suggesting you should apply for a grant or benefit, such as a Warm Home Discount or Winter Fuel Payment, hang up. These benefits are automatically credited to the accounts of those who qualify.

All too often people purchase something or sign up for something and almost immediately realise that they may well have fallen for a scam. Do not be embarrassed. Scamming is a modern crime and there is no shame in falling victim to it. But do take immediate action.

If you have lost money, contact the police on 101 and contact your bank immediately. If for any reason you think your account may be vulnerable, contact your bank. If you fear your computer has been compromised change your passwords, contact your bank and update your anti-virus software. It is better to be safe than sorry. If you are contacted by the scammer ignore them, but keep a record of what has happened, Citizens Advice has online advice on how to stop nuisance calls and texts. Citizens Advice offers advice and help in spotting and dealing with scams online, by phone, by email and at its offices and outreach sessions.

Blues winger scores international goal on debut

Blues flying winger, Joao Rangel, has enjoyed a whirlwind start to his time with Leiston. The 24-year-old Timor-Leste international hit the ground running at the Flannery Stadium, notching goals and adding assists for the Blues. And then captured his first international goal for his country in an Asia Cup qualifier against the Philippines recently.

Lots happening then in his world. Joao admits he's loving it. It's given him a taste for more. "I'm happy with how it's gone so far, I've got goals, assists and now one international goal, so it's been a very positive start," he said.

"But I'm aiming for more. I want to keep improving and hopefully finish the season with strong numbers to help the team push higher up the table.

"Of course, my first goal for Timor-Leste was a massive moment for me and my family, something I'll never forget. It was a good test for me as the players I was up against were playing professionally in top divisions in Europe. For me to perform well and grab a goal in that environment is something I'm proud of.

"It's definitely motivated me to keep pushing and improving, and to bring that same level and mindset into my performances here at Leiston."

So, what does he feel Leiston can achieve this campaign? Joao says he's confident the Blues can finish in a strong position.

"We've got the quality in the squad to push for something this season, I'm sure of that," he said. "If we stay consistent and keep believing, there's no reason why we can't be right up there challenging for the play-offs, most definitely."

100 up for blues players

It's been a flurry of 100-up appearances for Blues players in recent months. It was Adam Mills who was the first to achieve this feat back at the start of the campaign.

Heading into the new season on 99 appearances for the Blues, he was quick to notch 100 on the opening day against Halesowen Town. After Adam, it was Wyatt Hill's turn. The Blues defender was next to clock up his century, before up popped Ryan Jarvis with his 100th game for Leiston just a few games later. Hot-shot marksman Ben Fowkes was next - all this happening in the first two months of the new campaign, as he completed 100 appearances for Leiston. And finally, not to be left out, it was Eddie Jackson's turn to grab a century of appearances. Eddie, the latest entrant to the '100 Club', gained his honour in the 1-1 draw at Stourbridge back in October. However, all the current Blues squad still have a long way to go to catch the skipper, Seb Dunbar. Seb is heading towards a staggering 450 appearances for the Blues - quite some feat. He made his debut for Leiston back in August 2012 and has been part of all the big moments at Victory Road in the last 13 years or so.



Led by a Singing for Health specialist, each workshop will include breathing exercises, gentle vocal warm-ups and a range of songs, old and new. The first phase of the new sessions run every Wednesday morning from 10.30am to 12noon until 17 December with sessions then returning in January following the festive break. You don't have to be an experienced singer and can choose which songs to join in with. All activities are optional and it's fine to join in as much or as little as you want to. Guide dogs and companions are welcome to come along too. More than 35 people from the Leiston area took part in the weekly seated singing sessions at the start of the year. Feedback from the sessions shows that participants reported a 9% improvement in self-perceived health and wellbeing, citing positive impacts in physical health, mood, feelings of connection and accomplishment.

Mrs M lost her husband and had been feeling low and isolated. A regular volunteer in the Leiston community previously, she had not been feeling able to engage with volunteering activities since the bereavement. Having sung in her school and church choirs as a young person, she was interested in trying out the Tonic sessions. She told us that attending Tonic has improved her mood dramatically:

"It has just made me feel happier, the physical act of singing and being part of that soaring noise. The laughing when we pull funny faces. Two weeks ago, [Francis] got us sticking our tongues out and putting them in different places, like the dentist asks us to do, and there was a lot of laughter. He's brilliant."

Tonic: Singing for Health is made possible with support from Suffolk's advice, guidance and emotional support service (SAGES) and funding from Sizewell C Community Fund. The previous sessions were funded by Suffolk's advice, guidance and emotional support service (SAGES) and the Community Partnership, East Suffolk Council.

Chrissie Meikle, Suffolk Community Libraries Senior Creative Health Producer, said:

"We are delighted we can relaunch these sessions at Leiston Library. We had some wonderful feedback from pilot projects earlier this year, so it's great to be back!"

LEISTON ALLOTMENT HOLDERS & GARDENERS ASSOCIATION - DECEMBER

Garden work can be difficult this month, although cold spells which begin early in the month usually only last no more than a couple of weeks. If not done already, plan your seed order from a new catalogue. Continue with your digging and if possible complete the digging of your beds and borders. Keep collecting all fallen leaves and compost them.

Fruit: Spray your fruit trees and bushes with a winter tar oil. Prune new fruit bushes. Feed all trees with sulphate of potash.

Shrubs: Prune winter flowering shrubs once their blooms are over, mulch and feed with general fertilizer. Protect autumn planted evergreen shrubs against easterly winds.

Flowers: Check gladioli stored corms for disease and discard any that are not looking healthy.

Lawns: In dry spells lightly rake and remove any dead leaves, applying a moss killer if necessary. Clean and overhaul mowers and other lawn equipment and put them away, well-oiled, in a dry place until next spring.

Greenhouse: Vent on sunny days. Wash pots and seed trays but watch out for slugs, control them with pellets if necessary. Take cuttings of fuchsias and pelargoniums, as well as many other plants. Bring primulas inside if not already done. Take care and eliminate draughts.

Allotment Association members - please be advised: The shop in Valley Road will close from Saturday 13 December at 12noon and will re-open on Saturday 17 January 2026 at 10am. This short break will give the Shop Manager and his loyal volunteers a welcome break!

Note: There will be no garden notes for January 2026. Gardens need a break – as well as gardeners! Hopefully February news as usual.

RNLI ALDEBURGH 2025 ROUND UP



After 2024's intense training to transition successfully to the Atlantic 85 lifeboat, this year was a year of consolidation, bringing crew members up to the required seamanship standards for their roles on both our lifeboats - Ralph our Atlantic 85 and Susan Scott our D class.

To date our Atlantic 85 lifeboat, Ralph has launched 44 times on exercise and 10 times on Service Calls (shouts), assisted 12 people and saved one life. We have 16 Boat Crew for Ralph, four Helms, 10 crew trained to Tier 2 level and two trainees. This year, we lost two crew members - one who moved away and the other is on maternity leave. A new crew member has recently joined, and, at the time of writing, we are awaiting paperwork for two more crew to start their training.

Our D-class lifeboat, Susan Scott, has launched 19 times on exercise, three times on Service Calls and aided three people. For our inshore D-class lifeboat, Susan Scott, we have 11 Boat Crew - three helms, five qualified to Tier 2 level and three trainees.

We were tasked on one additional occasion, but the 'shout' was cancelled before launch. Our 'shouts' have been a mixture of motor and sailing vessels, swimmers, a kayak and a kite surfer.

We have 20 Shore Crew, six of who qualified this year. This includes six drivers for the Talus amphibious tractor, to launch and recover our Atlantic 85; and nine drivers of our smaller tracked Bobcat to launch and recover our D-class lifeboat, and regular grading of the beach.

Some of our tractor drivers also drive our L200 pickup to take Susan Scott to Aldeburgh Yacht Club where we launch and recover for exercises and service calls in the Rivers Alde and Ore. We have five Head Launchers, two of which qualified this year. We have seven Launch Authorities – one who has just qualified and is the first female LA at Aldeburgh. Many of our crew have more than one role, giving us more flexibility to meet our operational needs. We train at least once a week and the RNLI requirement is that lifeboats go afloat at least twice in a calendar month.

This year, our visits and water safety team have interacted with 4,000 people at events, youth groups, and lifeboat station tours. We are recruiting people across a range of roles, who ideally live and work locally, so please get in touch.

We would like to take the opportunity to thank you all for your ongoing support and look forward to meeting you on the heach!


