

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY MARKS MILESTONES FOR SOUTHWOLD

Southwold's Remembrance Sunday on 9th November 2025 proved to be a landmark occasion, bringing moments of reflection and civic pride to the town.

This year's ceremony was the first Civic Event led by newly appointed Southwold Town Mayor, Cllr Paula Goldsmith. For Cllr Goldsmith, the day carried personal as well as official significance. It marked the first Remembrance Parade in 40 years that her mother, Joan Goldsmith, had not been involved in organising the church service - a role she had fulfilled with dedication for decades.

The commemorations were further marked by another poignant milestone: for the first time in 35 years, Serjeant-at-Mace Steve Wright did not perform the Last Post. His long-standing contribution to the ceremony has become a familiar and moving moment for many in the community.

Despite these changes, the parade retained its solemn dignity and strong turnout, with residents, veterans, and civic leaders gathering to honour those who served and sacrificed.

Southwold Town Council would like to thank Rev. Philip Tarris for leading the Remembrance Service and all of those who attended.



SOUTHWOLD & REYDON SOCIETY

At our November Committee meeting we welcomed Laura Cliff to speak to us about the challenges and opportunities facing local businesses. Laura runs Duchies and the Buckenham Wine Bar as well as the Southwold Boating Lake Tea Room.

Despite the challenges of dealing with the multiple regulations involved in running a small business, Laura remains upbeat about the opportunities for her businesses, her team, and for Southwold as a whole. She is seeking to create a stronger dialogue between local businesses through a business WhatsApp group, to publicise the large number of independent traders in Southwold and to address common issues.

For example - during the Latitude Festival, when there was a spike in the number of visitors to the town, the poor Wi-Fi bandwidth made it almost impossible for local traders to take electronic payments. This is the type of problem that they aim to resolve by working together and with other stakeholders such as Southwold Town Council. Laura also spoke eloquently about her ideas for developing the environment and infrastructure around the boating lake.

We look forwards to learning more as her plans develop and are delighted that she has agreed to join our committee.

We have a regular dialogue with the Sole Bay Health Centre and were pleased to hear that with around 5500 patients registered, the Health Centre is fully staffed and has completed its recruitment of three new doctors. The practice staffing has diversified, with patients having direct access to appropriate experts, such as a pharmacist, physiotherapist, Social Prescriber, nurse, or GP. Approximately two thirds of appointments are face to face based on patient demand. The Health Centre holds an 'Outstanding' overall rating from the Care Quality Commission.

An NHS dentist is soon to move on site with good access for the disabled.

We had noticed that a number of council houses in our local area seemed to have been unoccupied for a long time whilst awaiting refurbishment. We raised the issue with East Suffolk Council Housing Department, who treated the question as a Freedom of Information request.

We have just received their response. Of 189 council houses in the IP18 postcode area (Southwold, Reydon and Walberswick) only 12 (6%) are currently unoccupied, with 1 awaiting refurbishment, 8 in the process of being refurbished and 2 ready to be let out, with two properties currently sitting with their investment team.

Whilst the council do not have specific target times to undertake repairs, they say they try to repair such properties in a timely manner, though are aware that some properties in the IP18 postcode have stood empty for longer than they would have liked.

Good news! On the 18th September, the Secretary of State approved the Southwold to Pakefield section of the King Charles III England Coast Path, though it is not yet open to the public. We have been told that work on the route will take place over the winter months, with a view to open the footpath by summer next year.

We note that the election for the first Mayor of Suffolk and Norfolk is due to take place on 7th May next year, though it is as yet unclear how the new Combined County Authority will be structured.

POLICE ENGAGEMENT VISIT

Bringing Policing to the Heart of the Community: Our Engagement Visit to Southwold

On Saturday 8th November 2025 we had the pleasure of visiting North Parade, Southwold with our Suffolk Constabulary, Rural, Wildlife and Heritage Crime Team trailer, a mobile hub designed to bring policing closer to the people we serve. These visits are a vital part of our commitment of making the public aware of our team and the type of work we deal with and strengthening relationships with residents across Suffolk.

The trailer acts as a welcoming space where you can speak directly with officers, ask questions, raise concerns, and learn more about the work we do. Whether it's discussing rural crime, offering crime prevention advice, or simply having a friendly chat, these face-to-face interactions help break down barriers and ensure our policing is truly community-led.

It was an unseasonably mild day for November with people swimming in the sea near to the pier first thing as we were setting up. We had a steady stream of people visit us during the day and we were thrilled by the turnout and the warm reception. Children were given Rural Crime Team stickers and could see our array of exhibits within the trailer display cabinet. These visits also allow us to showcase our specialist roles and help demystify aspects of policing that the public rarely gets to see.

The team consists of Sgt Chris Green, Pc Colin Taylor, Pc Kevin Stollery and Pc Sophie Buckle. Our team covers the whole of Suffolk and oversees offences including farming, livestock, poaching, hunting, wildlife, and heritage crime. We work closely with partner agencies such as Natural England, Historic England, Environment Agency, National Wildlife Crime Unit, RSPB, RSPCA, and IFCA

THE ART OF CELEBRATING CHRISTMAS

VIEW TO THE NORTH

In my last month's article, I mentioned that I would like to have some clear skies at night so that I could do some astrophotography. In particular, I wanted to capture a comet, C/2025 A6 Lemmon. It is now moving away from us and will not reappear for 1160 years' time. I cannot imagine what the Earth will be like then. At its closest it was 55 million miles from us (about half the distance from us to the sun). I was fortunate to get this image one night. The 'smart 'scope' collected sequential 10 second images for 3 minutes and stacked them to produce the final result.



Overall, the weather has been a mixed bag; there have been sunny spells, heavy rain and very high winds. The wind has fortunately been predominantly from the southwest.

There have been high tides with a metre surge, this coupled with an easterly would have been very damaging. The waves have been pounding the promenade with some spectacular results; no damage was done to the beach huts. The ones immediately south of the pier and those north of the pier have now been safely moved on to the car park for winter storage.



I have a monitor in the garden which records bird song, identifies them and produces daily statistics. I was looking at the current results when it recognised that there were some goldcrests about.



I grabbed a camera and managed to take some photos of them flitting about in the tree. They are not easy subjects as they are so small (smaller than a wren), and they move rapidly from branch to branch catching bugs. The detector has also shown the presence of the winter visitors, redwing and fieldfare, but I have yet to see them. Armies of long tailed tits have landed in the tree but they rarely stay for more than a few minutes.

They have several colloquial names including mumruffin, bumbarrel, jackin-a-bottle, and hedge jug! They are delightful to watch.

Despite the prolonged periods of high wind there have been periods of calm, and I have flown the drone on a number of occasions. A dawn flight gave me some interesting shots including this one of sunrise.

It shows the boating lakes and pier. Just visible on the horizon to the left of the sun is a container vessel, 'One Inspiration', which was at anchor for several days, 8 nautical miles away, waiting to sail into Rotterdam.

I wish you a very successful 'Festive Season', my next article should appear January 2026

THE MILLENNIUM FIRING OF THE SOUTHWOLD CANNONS

On the night of 31st December 1999, as the world stood on the edge of a new millennium, I had the honour of organising and leading a small team of volunteers tasked with firing the cannons.

The town of Southwold had gathered on Gun Hill for a grand celebration to welcome the year 2000. Spirits were high, the sea breeze carried laughter and music, and the hill was alive with families and friends enjoying picnics, parties, and dancing. On behalf of Southwold Town Council, I coordinated a large fireworks display, the lighting of the Beacon and the preparation of the cannons. Everything was carefully arranged throughout the day. We tested the charges without issue and set them inside the barrels, ready for the stroke of midnight.

Yet, when the moment came and the countdown reached its end, disaster seemed to strike—nothing happened. The charges refused to ignite.

In the hush that followed, I realised the culprit: the dampness of the evening air had seeped into the powder. Fortunately, quick thinking saved the night. One of our volunteers, Doug Pope, had parked his car nearby, and my steadfast son-in-law swiftly removed the car battery. In a flurry of teamwork and determination, we wired the battery down the barrel of each cannon to a central firing console. Then, with the fireworks blazing across the sky and the new millennium officially begun, I had the privilege of firing each cannon in succession. One by one, they roared across the night - echoing over the sea, rolling through the crowd, and marking the dawn of the year 2000 with the thunder of history itself.

It was a proud and unforgettable moment for all of us who took part, and for the town that gathered to witness it.

Overwhelming Response to Old Hospital Community Gym Survey

At the end of October, the Old Hospital's Management Team announced plans to create a community gym in the Old Hospital on Field Stile Road. They issued an online survey to obtain the community's views on the benefits of the gym, both for respondents personally and for the community and also to learn the type of gym offer that the community wanted. The survey ran for 10 days and elicited 305 responses, mostly from people living full time in Reydon and Southwold. Over three-quarters of the respondents said they were likely or very likely to join the gym - and that having a community gym on their doorstep was likely to make them more active. Over a half respondents said it would improve their mental health. Over 90% said having a nearby gym was important because it would improve the physical and mental wellbeing of the wider community. A gym would also help to reduce social isolation and bring the community together.

As for what local residents and workers want from a job, the message was clear - good quality equipment in a well maintained space, 7 day a week access, extended hours for working people, a secure, supportive, welcoming environment, and affordable prices.

There appears to be so much pentup demand for a gym that the survey generated an explosion of interest from all quarters. The Old Hospital has had many expressions of interest in instructing and providing workshops, along with requests for specific types of workshops. For example, an elderly Southwold resident touchingly wrote about the onset of Parkinsons, noting how many other elderly people suffered from this debilitating disease and asked whether The Old Hospital gym might be able to put together an exercise programme to help improve their quality of life. This is part of the community gym's vision - to provide individualised care, for unmet needs, that can be delivered within the community. A young woman with a professional background as a physio in the NHS wrote,

"I'm super excited for the community and anything that gets people exercising, stronger and fitter. If I can help bridge the gap between health care and exercise then I'd love to. If there's a need for back pain classes, post-natal rehab, elderly rehab, cardiac rehab, falls prevention, these are all things I'd absolutely love to be involved in."

The gym, as the Old Hospital Team sees it evolving, will be for everyone and perhaps, especially, it is for our overlooked young workers.

Southwold is an employment centre with many young people working in small retail, leisure and hospitality businesses, who do not get a chance to connect with other young people or develop the kind of lifestyle habits that will keep them healthy and happy throughout their lifetime. There is so much media coverage today of the rise of mental unwellness in young people. The solution is often not more pills but connectedness, exercise and having a purpose. Wouldn't it be great if the community gym could be a place for young employees in Southwold and Reydon to connect and try new things like, perish the thought, cold-water swimming, which enthusiasts swear is the best 'high'?

The Old Hospital Team is now hard at work finalising the business plan which it will use to apply for grants to raise the capital costs of creating the gym. We hope to hear the answer to initial funding requests in January. WHAT WOULD WE DO WITHOUT WASPS?

The Blyth Valley and Southwold group of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust welcomed the entomologist Dr Ian Bedford to our November meeting to talk about wasps. These insects aren't usually met with much sympathy, but Ian's talk showed us how to view wasps in a different light.

There are an astonishing nine thousand different species of wasp in the UK. All are excellent pollinators, a great help with pest control, and an essential part of the eco system. The great majority are solitary wasps, which are generally no trouble to us. They may live underground, or in nooks and crannies in trees, bushes, or sheds. Gall wasps create odd little growths on leaves, branches, or acorns to harbour their young. Other wasps are parasitic, using caterpillars and grubs as hosts for their eggs. Some, like the bee wolf, hunt a single species to feed their offspring.


Only about 1% of wasps are social, living in large colonies, and we have eight native species. The yearly cycle begins when a mated queen wakes from hibernation, begins to build her nest, and to lay eggs. The workers, infertile females, then labour to build, protect, feed, and repair the nest. Their lives are short, two to three weeks. Male drones hatch later, and once mated with a new queen, they too die. By late summer, the wasps' need for sugar makes them uninvited guests at outdoor meals, but Ian suggests we resist the urge to swat them. They sting if provoked, and an alarm pheromone in the venom will attract other angry wasps. There are kinder, more effective ways to deal with the issue. They dislike certain smells, so have clovesstudded lemons, peppermint tea, or thyme on the table. A false wasps' nest hanging nearby has been shown to be effective, as wasps are territorial creatures. Their value in our gardens is significant, and where possible, they are best left alone. Wasps may even help humans medically, as their complex venom is being studied for new ways to fight bacteria.

It was a fascinating talk that made us look at these useful insects in a much more positive way.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, January 8th, 7.30pm, at Southwold Arts Centre. Local naturalist Tony Brown will talk about 'The Fascination of Fungi'. Admission is £5, to include refreshments, free for under 25s. All are welcome.



CHRISTMAS 1943 AT HALESWORTH AIRFIELD

As the horrors of war continued to be played out all over Europe, the men of the USAAF 56th Fighter Group, stationed at Halesworth Airfield, prepared to mark a very different Christmas in December 1943.

Far from home, their families and friends, in an unfamiliar country, crews risked their lives every day flying into battle, never knowing if they would return.

Glimpses of their celebrations have been gleaned from the 1943 daily diary archive held at Halesworth Airfield Museum.

Throughout the month, entertainment included films such as A Night to Remember, Reveille with Beverley, Honeymoon Lodge and The Ghost of Frankenstein.

Live entertainment was provided by ENSA (Entertainments National Service Association), performing Come Out and Play and The Patsy. The USO (United Service Organization) stage show, USA Calling, took place on the 17th.

The festivities began on December 18th when officers of the 62nd Squadron "entertained various young ladies at a dance on the station."

It was deemed a "huge success" although several of the guests "were adversely affected by drinking punch on empty stomachs."

On December 21st, a dance and Christmas party was held in the evening. Approximately, 200 WRNS (Women's Royal Navy Service), WAAFS (Women's Auxiliary Air Force) and WLA (Women's Land Army) girls attended.

Jivin' Yanks and The Blue Chasers provided the music and "there was food for all."

Unfortunately, on December 22nd, the children's party was cancelled "due to the unavailability of a proper film and adequate transportation. The candy donated by the enlisted men was sent to the schoolmaster at Halesworth, who distributed it to the school children."

Religious services were held on 24th including a Christmas Eve Candle Light Service in St Peter's Church, Holton and a high Mass at midnight in the Station theatre followed by refreshments.

On Christmas Day, it was work as usual with "skeleton crews in most of the departments" while "most of the officers and enlisted men were sleeping off a too merry Christmas Eve."

The Christmas Turkey Dinner "was highly successful, however, all the turkey you could eat and how we did eat." Each man was given candy and a pack of cigarettes and "a plate so full he could hardly carry it."

On 30th December, the enlisted men held a dance. "There were about 40 girls including WAAFS, WRNS and WLA. Refreshments were served and a good time was had by all."

While the pilots had gone out on a long mission in afternoon, the officers were busy on the 31st, preparing for the New Year's Eve party. "Those of the pilots that did return were almost too tired to enjoy the party and went to bed early."

Women guests staying overnight were given rooms at Holton Hall.

"The officers residing there went elsewhere to bunk for the night. All in all, it was a very successful party and the officers are looking forward to another in the future."

This daily diary gives a fascinating insight to wartime life on the base. The wider archive provides a unique resource for research.

The volunteers at Halesworth Airfield Museum wish everyone a safe and peaceful Christmas.

CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

Beat the scammers and have a Happy Christmas!

Christmas is coming and the geese are getting fat and so, too, are the scammers and fraudsters who prey on online shoppers.

As a basic rule NEVER fall for an offer which is "too good to be true". If it is, it isn't! For example, a holiday that is much cheaper than you would expect. And use a credit card when shopping online, it gives added protection.

If you are contacted unexpectedly, then be wary. It might be a scam. If you suspect you are not dealing with a real company, then check it out. Real companies will offer a postal address. Don't click any links – search for the company on another website and check the phone number. If you're about to spend a lot of money, it's best to use the Companies House website to be sure the company you're buying from is real and still trading.

Always be suspicious if you are asked to transfer money quickly, such as being pressed to act now because the offer will only be open for a short time, or items are limited in number. Being asked to pay in an unusual way is another warning sign – for example by iTunes vouchers or through a money transfer service like MoneyGram, Western Union or with a crypto currency such as Bitcoin. If in any doubt, do not buy.

If you are asked to give personal information such as passwords or PINs you should back away. Reputable companies and businesses do not ask for these.

And if you are called by someone suggesting you should apply for a grant or benefit, such as a Warm Home Discount or Winter Fuel Payment, hang up. These benefits are automatically credited to the accounts of those who qualify.

All too often people purchase something or sign up for something and almost immediately realise that they may well have fallen for a scam. Do not be embarrassed. Scamming is a modern crime and there is no shame in falling victim to it. But do take immediate action.

If you have lost money, contact the police on 101 and contact your bank immediately.

If for any reason you think your account may be vulnerable, contact your bank. If you fear your computer has been compromised change your passwords, contact your bank and update your antivirus software. It is better to be safe than sorry.

If you are contacted by the scammer ignore them, but keep a record of what has happened, Citizens Advice has online advice on how to stop nuisance calls and texts.

Citizens Advice offers advice and help in spotting and dealing with scams online, by phone, by email and at its offices and outreach sessions.


