

As a final homage to this 80 year anniversary, Aldeburgh Museum's fifth 'People and Place' Christmas exhibition will be 'Aldeburgh at War' 1939-1945.

On display will be photographs and war time artefacts from the Museum's collection as well as some 'on loan'.

Visit and discover what happened in/around Aldeburgh in WW2. The Museum is open weekends and selected days between Christmas and New Year between 1-4pm. See website for details.






Photography has become something more than the act of taking a simple image for Chris Madden and Janice Unitt. Meeting around 5 years ago at their local camera club and unbeknown to them at the time, they were both using photography as a means of healing. Chris's focus was very much on landscape whether locally or further afield, visiting Canada, Iceland, France and Italy to name just a few destinations. Janice's focus was on wildlife and as an exflorist would often be found lying in the wet grass or mud photographing flowers and foliage and on occasions being approached gingerly by complete strangers wanting to know if she was ok or needed help to get up. Our Twinning weekend (25/26 October) was a great success. The Maire, Claude Maquet and his delegation from Doullens in Picardie, France, paid a return visit to Woodbridge to cement the friendship agreement we signed in Doullens in June.

There were many highlights including the launch of the Poppy Day Appeal with the French flag and national anthem in the Thoroughfare and a reception for over hundred people at the Shire Hall. This reception brought together our sporting, cultural and charitable associations. Some good contacts have been made and firm foundations have been laid for the launch of a full twinning agreement by the end of 2026.

Our Twinning Committee is responsible for the efforts to renew our international connections. In time, it is hoped that cultural, educational and sporting exchanges can be followed by a re-connection of our local produce markets with continental Europe.

As **Christmas** nears, the shops in Woodbridge are dressing their windows and putting up Christmas lights.

By the time this goes to print Woodbridge Town Council and Woodbridge Festival of Art and Music will have celebrated Choose Woodbridge's hard work making the town sparkle with not one but two Lights On events – 27 and 28 November.

There will be a street fair run by Choose Woodbridge on Sunday 7 December and, on Wednesday 17 December, there will be the Annual Open-Air Carol Concert with Woodbridge Rotary and a visit from Father Christmas. See our website for more details.

We send our best wishes to all residents and visitors over this Christmas season. And we hope that those needing support during this time, will find it within our community.

Woodbridge Town Council has taken the decision to bring our **gardening staff** back in-house by April 2026.



The contracted out, largely minimum wage model, that has been operated since 2012, has not provided the level of grounds maintenance in Woodbridge that is desired by your Council and by the many residents who have made clear their unhappiness with the state of things. We are currently advertising for two gardeners and at the time of writing we have received over eighty requests for application packs. This is a significant project for your Town Council and we will work assiduously to make a success of it. Once selected, our gardeners will become familiar faces around Woodbridge, so please support them and even help them in areas of the town that are particularly valued by you. And talking of green spaces in Woodbridge, you might have heard of Local Government Reform. Suffolk County and East Suffolk Councils will be replaced by one new Council. Between them, currently, they own over twenty green and built spaces in Woodbridge. We've been looking at each of these spaces and we've been asked to consider whether they should be transferred to Woodbridge Town Council. We will shortly be consulting you to see if you want to give us a mandate to do the necessary work before any decisions are made. Your engagement will lead to better outcomes. A third consultation on Active Travel Woodbridge is being held by Suffolk County Council with the support of Woodbridge Town Council (find it at this link Active Travel Woodbridge - the Thoroughfare and Cumberland Street - Suffolk County Council).





The proposals are designed to protect the historic town centre by reducing traffic flow from the Thoroughfare and Cumberland Street after Quay Street is made one-way. Your views are being sought with a closing date of 12 December.

FARLINGAYE HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Farlingaye High School, in Woodbridge, with their production 'Big Fish' earlier this year, has been shortlisted for The MTI Award for Excellence in Musical Theatre, along with such notable organisations as Disney Theatrical Productions, Buxton Opera House and British Youth Music Theatre.

'Big Fish' is the musical adaptation of the book by Daniel Wallace. It touches on themes of family, reconciliation and bereavement, through fantastical story telling. The school used the performances as an opportunity to invite cancer charities to visit and talk to audience members during the interval and to raise money for them.

As with all of Farlingaye's productions, not only were the students the actors, singers and dancers, they were also the backstage and technical crew and they provided the live music for each show. The school productions are inclusive and a wonderful opportunity for those involved to develop practical skills and grow in confidence.

Head of Drama, Pippa Parks, said, "After quite a few years of directing shows that centred on fairy tales, we wanted to really challenge and push ourselves, and our students, to tackle some more mature and complex themes and stories. 'Big Fish' did just that and encouraged our students to step out of their comfort zones and tackle a nonlinear storyline that deals with very adult emotions, while still having fun and entertaining an audience.

Our students rose to this challenge and the level of professionalism, dedication and talent from these young people was outstanding. It also shows the volume of talent and appreciation of the Arts we have here at Farlingaye. Not many schools can boast of having almost 100 students involved in their cast, band and crew, as well as giving as many students as possible the opportunity to shine no matter their circumstances.

"But what really set this show apart from our previous shows was the way we tackled the adult and emotional themes. Cancer is a huge part of this play and, sadly, is a huge part of a lot of our staff, students and communities' lives. We didn't want to shy away from this theme and instead decided to turn this into an educational, positive and supportive opportunity.



Not only did we donate all of our programme and refreshment sales to varies cancer charities (over £800!), we also invited various cancer organizations to attend every show to support audience, cast and staff with the storyline. We also directly worked with Daniel Wallace, the author, with a live Q&A from New York to give our students even more understanding of the story and characters and the importance that theatre can have to tell such an important story to our community."

Pete Smith, Headteacher, added, "We're incredibly proud of this nomination, which reflects the commitment, creativity and passion of our amazing Creative Arts team. Their work in music and drama continues to inspire our students, giving them extraordinary opportunities to express themselves and achieve at the very highest level"

OPERA FOR WOODBRIDGE

Opera for Woodbridge entertained a completely full Community Hall with a performance of the charming fairy tale opera Hansel and Gretel, complete with fairies, trees and forest birds, a giant spider, a gingerbread house, a huge oven and of course a scary witch, who delights in cooking and eating children, but ends up being cooked herself!

This is the sixth year in a row that we have presented an opera free to our audience, thanks to generous support from private individuals, Town, District and County Councils, and the Suffolk Charity Foundation, plus the generous assistance and support of the Woodbridge Rotary Club.

As in previous years, we engaged professional soloists from all over the country, including two Suffolk residents, with an orchestra of local professional and semi-professional players led by well-known local conductor and pianist Andrew Leach, working with two local young soloists, and a chorus of local performers, both children and adults.

We performed the opera in an English translation and adapted it to our needs, including inserting some text from Shakespeare's Macbeth for the young performers to recite. Our aim is to make opera available and entertaining to all performers and audience, whatever age or background, whether first timers or seasoned opera goers.

As you can see there are many elaborate costumes and no doubt the staff had great fun making them. I doubt there were fancy dress hire shops in those days and certainly no online shopping so making costumes was probably the only option.

REPORT FROM THE CEEC

(Climate & Ecological Emergency Committee)

The last report I wrote was for July and this one is for December. In that report, I spoke about the Council's biodiversity plans and the measures we are taking to ensure that the trees planted last winter survive the summer. I predicted heatwaves. Three heatwaves later - another climate record broken for the UK - I'm happy to report that the vast majority of the trees survived. It is doubtful that they would have done so without human assistance. The team involved in the watering has also done some invaluable research into automated watering possibilities for Kingston Field and hence for other areas in the Council estate as we move forward into our very uncertain future. Strangely, near certainty, is that our climate will become more and more unusual. Weather events associated with the consequences of ongoing global warming will become harder and harder to predict. I am writing in the early part of November at the time of the annual COP gathering. COP30 will likely again be a demonstration of the lack of collective will to make and keep to effective commitments towards ameliorating our accelerating global demise. Events like this, hosted and steered by the fossil fuel industries, are unlikely to support anything that takes us too far away from the business-as-usual model. Locally, however, we can take heart - as we have been doing by creating and sustaining measures to improve the living environment for we humans and our other-than-human cousins who share this delightful place we call home.

At our last meeting, the Committee approved funding for the Estates Officer and other colleagues who have been working alongside him. A budget was agreed for him and the team to continue their research and development into capturing water from the Kingston stream via a solar pump to ensure we can keep our beautiful organic carbon capture devices functioning well into the future, whilst providing shade and habitat for our cousins.

Over on Broomheath, funding has been agreed to continue a systematic fencing off of certain areas to protect them from the over-enthusiastic efforts of the huge rabbit warren whose overconsumption is mirroring, on a much smaller scale, the plight of we human beings, rendering Broomheath unliveable for many other possible plant and animal species.



With careful human management and steerage in this way, we can systematically bring life and soil structure back to this beautiful, but somewhat stark, denatured area of the council estate.

Funding has also been approved for further tree-planting in Elmhurst Park, and more funding for the Bee Cafe project, itself now transformed into a community interest company.

Anticipating projects for the future, we spoke yet again of our intentions: to install solar panels on all council-owned buildings and of rainwater capture / harvesting systems.

We also considered the single vacancy we have on the committee for another civilian member. Our Committee is distinct in that when it was set up, its membership included six civilian non-councillors with the intention of townsfolk bringing their own individual knowledge and expertise to contribute to our work. So yes, there is a vacancy. If you or anyone you know might like to take up this valuable opportunity to contribute to our mission, please let us know. There has been another vacancy open for quite some time, that of the Woodbridge Tree Warden. This is a delightful role, independent from the Town Council, but an opportunity to work in close collaboration, particularly with our committee, and on behalf and supported by the Suffolk Tree Warden Network. This is a role I vacated two or three years ago, and I would be happy to mentor anyone who chooses to take on the role, and to reassure them that in their efforts to improve tree cover for Woodbridge, they would be pushing against a wide open door when it came to bringing projects to the Climate and Ecological Emergency Committee.

So, to conclude, the way forward here in Woodbridge is local, not global. By the time you read this, I expect you would have already forgotten, if you had indeed heard, any significant outcomes from COP30. And I would be delighted if I was wrong. So, we are probably best taking our futures into our own hands as best we can, leaving the global tragedy to play out and become better prepared, locally, to manage our own resources.

There is a staggeringly huge demand for this help and advice and Nicky is striving to link more services together and forge new partnerships with relevant bodies to ensure that this invaluable service will continue to meet the ever-increasing needs

Members are looking forward to the 'Orange the World' campaign walk from the Longshed to Notcutts (for refreshments and fun), wearing as much orange possible! Orange the world is a global initiative aiming to raise awareness and take action against

violence towards women and girls.





CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

Christmas is coming and the geese are getting fat and so, too, are the scammers and fraudsters who prey on online shoppers. As a basic rule NEVER fall for an offer which is "too good to be true". If it is, it isn't! For example, a holiday that is much cheaper than you would expect. And use a credit card when shopping online, it gives added protection. If you are contacted unexpectedly, then be wary. It might be a scam. If you suspect you are not dealing with a real company, then check it out. Real companies will offer a postal address. Don't click any links – search for the company on another website and check the phone number. If you're about to spend a lot of money, it's best to use the Companies House website to be sure the company you're buying from is real and still trading. Always be suspicious if you are asked to transfer money quickly.

Being asked to pay in an unusual way is another warning sign – for example by iTunes vouchers or through a money transfer service like MoneyGram, Western Union or with a crypto currency such as Bitcoin. If in any doubt, do not buy. If you are asked to give personal information such as passwords or PINs you should back away. Reputable companies and businesses do not ask for these. And if you are called by someone suggesting you should apply for a grant or benefit, such as a Warm Home Discount or Winter Fuel Payment, hang up. These benefits are automatically credited to the accounts of those who qualify.

All too often people purchase something or sign up for something and almost immediately realise that they may well have fallen for a scam.

Do not be embarrassed, there is no shame in falling victim to it. But do take immediate action. If you have lost money, contact the police on 101 and contact your bank immediately. If for any reason you think your account may be vulnerable, contact your bank. If you fear your computer has been compromised change your passwords, contact your bank and update your anti-virus software. It is better to be safe than sorry. If you are contacted by the scammer ignore them, but keep a record of what has happened, Citizens Advice has online advice on how to stop nuisance calls and texts.

Folks, living in Woodbridge this Christmas, 2025 might like to know what Christmas 1944 was like during the last war.

We lived in Castle Street, a two up two down mid terrace with a toilet bucket in the small back yard - emptied duringb the dark hours by what were then called 'The night soil Men'.

The house had no central heating, just a scarce bucket of coal, thrown on the grate, like Mr Scrooge. A young Cockerel was kept penned up during the summer to become our fattened yard chicken for Christmas dinner. We all missed his morning crows, two days before Christmas.

We made our own-coloured paper chains, stuck together with flour and water; along with a tad of fear, for invasion was still a possibility. Grown ups buried their troubled waters huddled together in the many town pubs – The Kings Head, The Cross to mention just a couple.

The American air crews, so, so far from home sort of kept the town smiling with their Glen Miller music and gum chum, along with their brave, hopeful outlook. "Put those Lights Out!!" shouted street wardens, as folks drew their blackout curtains, on a world at war.

My sister married a member of one of the America air crews from Debach airfield. She gave birth to her baby whilst living in Castle Street Woodbridge. On the photo she is holdinmy mother and baby Billy.

Years later baby Billy became the Senator of Oklahoma.
