# National Grid update – LionLink consultation and Sea Link surveys

National Grid has confirmed that the LionLink statutory consultation will run from Tuesday 13 January to Tuesday 10 March 2026. Further information, including how members of the public can participate, is available on the LionLink website: https://www.nationalgrid.com/ national-grid-ventures/lionlink/ As part of the consultation, public information exhibitions will be held locally. In Saxmundham, one will take place on Saturday 24 January 2026, 11am - 4pm at the Fromus Centre. These events will give residents the opportunity to view the latest proposals and share their views. Details of other events across the area can be found online.

National Grid has also advised that, from early 2026 and subject to approvals, additional ground investigation surveys linked to the Sea Link project will take place on the proposed converter station site south of the B1119. These permitted development surveys (including boreholes, trial pits and soil testing) are not construction works and will support the detailed design. No public rights of way will be closed or diverted. Further information will be published on National Grid's website.

# ALDE VALLEY SUFFOLK FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

# The Hollond family of Great Ashfield House

October's Alde Valley Suffolk Family History Group Talk at the Fromus Centre in Saxmundham was the story of Suffolk's lost palace, Great Ashfield House and the eccentric Hollond family.

Guest speaker Dave Steward provided a packed room on 20th October with an informative history of both house and its inhabitants due to his exclusive access to photographs, scrapbooks, letters and household items which had been left behind by the family. The Hollond family are well-known in the Saxmundham area, they owned Benhall Lodge Estate from 1810, and it is still owned by Hollond descendants today. The Rev. Edmund Hollond's third son Arthur Edward Hollond (1857-1928) married Beatrice Mary Hoare (1866-1959), a minor, in London in December 1883. She was the daughter of Henry Hoare, the Hoare family being owners of the UK's oldest privately-owned bank.

Arthur Hollond bought Ashfield House, situated just a couple of miles from Badwell Ash, in 1881 and for 108 years it belonged to the same family. Dave Steward carefully took us through the history of the house from 1755, and the changes and renovations over the years. He also added a personal touch, his own family's special connection to Ashfield House, that his grandfather was head gardener and his grandmother, the cook!

Dave included a detailed background of both Arthur Hollond and his wife Beatrice before introducing us to their children, sons Henry & Victor, and five daughters Gladys, Phyllis (known as Pansy), Muriel, lvy (known as Iseult) and Elspeth. In the attached image they are shown in the garden with their governess.

He mentioned that animals always featured in the children's lives, in their letters and they were often seen in photographs with cats, chickens, pigs, goats and a donkey called Opal. Pansy also had a buzzard called Willie. They could speak many languages and the girls were gifted artists, they were 'The Cubs' and they called their father 'The Big Brown Bear'. He was often the study for their art.

The girls never married and as each of them passed away only Iseult remained at the house, confining herself to the kitchen with her 25 cats! She moved to Ivy Cottage when she became infirm and died in 1999 aged 101 years. A very interesting talk, well-illustrated with Hollond family images and their paintings which ended with Dave's own ancestral ties to the family.

AVSFHG's Membership Secretary Pat Carter mentioned at the Talk that there were references to a Francis Egbert Hollond in Leiston church – any relation? Subsequent research has found that Francis Egbert Hollond (1860-1953) was the younger brother of Arthur Edward Holland of Ashfield House. The brothers were the youngest sons of the Rev. Edmund Hollond (1801-1884) of Benhall. Both Arthur and Francis' children died without any surviving issue. If anyone has any information, images etc about Francis Egbert Hollond who bought Leiston Old Abbey in 1909, or the Hollond family, then please could they get in touch with Jane Evans email:



## FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR...



Happy New Year, and I hope you manage to keep to at least some of your New Year resolutions!

I have spent most of the last month and will spend most of this month on finance matters at the County Council, as it is budget-setting time for the 2026-27 budget and the proposals of the Administration have to pass through the questioning of the County's Scrutiny Committee at a day-long meeting. Then, later in the month, it has to be approved by the County Council's Cabinet, before receiving a thorough examination and debate at a meeting of the County Council on 12 February. All these meetings are open to the public to attend and are also live-streamed so, if this process interests you, do come along to the County's HQ in Ipswich or watch on-line.

Financially, times are even more difficult than we have become accustomed to. Our relatively new Government promised to abolish austerity, but I said at the time, and I believe I have been proved correct, that austerity continues as ever, if not under that term then under some other. In 2026/27 the County Council will spend a net £840 million delivering services to you and Suffolk's other citizens. This huge sum has to be raised before it is allocated, and we rely for around 55% of our income from the Council Tax you pay. Another 25% comes from Government grants and the rest from a variety of sources, not least what we can raise from fees and charges, and from reimbursements towards the cost of social care, mostly from elderly people in care homes or who receive care at home. Social care is not a free service, unlike the National Health Service, and has to be paid for according to individual circumstances.

I do not deny £840 million is a very large sum of money. But, alas, it is not enough to deliver all our services in the way we would like. Reactive road repair and maintenance is now very considerably under-resourced, and what we do to keep our highways safe has to be prioritised over what we would like to do to routinely maintain our roads. Choices are difficult and restrained but are a fact of life as we have to remain within our budget, hence why the current process is so important.

There is some good news, which I'm glad to impart. Our performance with those younger people who are assessed as having Special Educational Needs and/ or Disabilities (SEND) and who then need a bespoke Educational Health and Care Plan (EHCP) has improved dramatically during 2025 and our performance has moved into the upper-quartile nationally after a great deal of effort from our staff and the application of extra funding, as well as building up a Government-approved large overdraft.

These vulnerable young people deserve our help and special care. Their numbers have been growing steadily over the last decade, and notably since the end of the Covid crisis. Indeed, applications for an EHCP have risen by over 11% in the last year alone and while we are processing the necessary paperwork much more quickly, this has only been achieved by recruiting 94 extra staff members, and paying expensive fees for the necessary services of educational psychologists who, country-wide, seem as scarce as hen's teeth!

But I am glad that Suffolk is now among the fastest and most efficient Authorities in the country, which is good for these young people and their families too. But the financial expense does not end there. With ever-more children having the enforceable rights given by the awarding of an EHCP (which, incidentally, also has to be thoroughly reviewed each year) their expectations and entitlements rise, not just in the type of schooling they are entitled to, but also in expensive travel costs incurred in getting these pupils to and from the school in which they will flourish.

This is one reason why we have been looking forward with anticipation to the details of the Government's Fairer Funding Review, the details of which are not available as I write this column but will be known as you read my words. Suffolk is seriously underfunded in comparison with many other parts of the country, not least the inner London Boroughs and most of the north of England. We deserve a fairer, higher, settlement, but we are not confident that the Government will deliver that 'fairness' to us. But we will soon know...

Finally, from out-of-the-blue, came the complete surprise from the Government's decision to delay for two years an election for a Mayor of Norfolk and Suffolk. This was due to take place on May 7 but is now delayed until 2028. A great deal of work has been done over a short timescale, by not just Suffolk County Council but by Suffolk's District and Borough Councils alongside equal effort in Norfolk, to ensure a Mayor could assume his or her responsibilities and powers immediately after being elected. Even the appointment of an interim Chief Executive for the Mayoral County Combined Authority was well advanced, with interviews for that post taking place on the very day of the Government's announcement of delay. I try hard not to be party political in this column, but what a way to run a country!

Much is happening in the local government arena, and I will try to keep you informed through this column of progress, or the lack of it, over the next few months.

The important step of agreeing a budget for the next financial year underpins everything we do, and gives certainty for the immediate future, whatever that may bring...

# PROJECT UPDATE

## **JANUARY 2026**

# Welcome to the latest round up of construction activity at Sizewell C.

Sizewell C has reached key milestones as we work to improve the local road infrastructure and build our park and rides in 2025.

In 2026, we will continue to work at pace to deliver the improvements. Unfortunately, this will lead to disruption, specifically during the first quarter of 2026 with several weekend closures along the A12, B1122 and B1125 as we aim to get works achieved ahead of the busy summer period for visitors to the county. This year, we look forward to the Friday Street and Yoxford roundabouts being connected to the A12 and opened to traffic. During the first quarter of 2026 there will be weekend road closures as we construct and connect the new roundabouts to the A12 and neighbouring roads. We will advertise the closures and diversions well in advance.

We issue weekly traffic management and short time road closures every Friday for the week ahead, and we add this to our social media channels. The Sizewell C Works Tracker and One Network Causeway one.network are guides to works in the area, and the new subscription service through our Works Tracker will also help with transport plans around the county.



# SAXMUNDHAM HISTORY SOCIETY

In November we welcomed Christopher Turland who gave us an extremely interesting and most informative talk about ROMAN SUFFOLK. After an earlier small invasion, the Romans invaded in AD 64, meeting with the Iceni and the Trinovantes. The Iceni tribe were Celtics living in, now, Norfolk, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire. The Trinovantes were a Celtic tribe living in an area, now, Essex, Hertfordshire and Suffolk.

Ipswich was an important port. At that time the sea level would have been much higher, allowing the Roman ships to travel inland. Chris had maps to show where the Roman roads were placed, both in Ipswich and in the eastern area. Many artifacts have been found over time and ground penetrating radar has revealed the position of many Roman buildings and settlements.

Chris mentioned several Roman hoards which have been found and showed us some pictures of the beautifully decorated items, including chariot decorations, gold torques and various domestic items. A very local find was the "head" of Claudius which was found in the river at Rendham by a local boy. In Hoxne some beautifully ornate, gold pepper pots were found among many other artefacts, including gold and silver coins.

In Dalinghoo a hoard of late Iron age gold "staters" were found in a field.

Our next meeting will be on Thursday 26th February when we have a visit from Christopher Pratt who will tell us about GHQ Auxiliary Units.

At our December meeting, Chairman Richard Crisp welcomed our speaker Andy Malcolm, representing The Fisherman's Mission, a national charity which supports fishermen and their families. Fishermen who go out to sea to catch the fish for our fish and chips and other dishes. Andy spoke about "the real cost" of our fish and chips. The Fisherman's Mission began 144 years ago. In October 1881 it was Black Friday in Eyemouth, when 189 fishermen died, swept away by a sudden violent storm, watched by their families and Ebenezer Mather, a Christian from the Thames Church Mission, Ebenezer set up the 'National Mission to the Deep Sea Fishermen', providing ministry and helping to improve fishermen's health and giving practical and emotional support.

The Mission provided a vessel, the Ensign, to help the fishermen, who stayed out at sea for months, in their open boats. By 1911 there were 6 vessels and 60 staff.

The vessels were cruising hospitals, a place of worship, a tobacco shop, a free library, a clothing store, hotel and recreation ground.

In the 1950s the last Mission ship was decommissioned and in 2006 the name of the charity was changed to 'The Fishermen's Mission'. The Mission now offers 24/7 care with mini Mission centres where fishermen can have showers, hot drinks, and laundry facilities and hostels at the docks, such as in Lowestoft. Today there are small offices - no boats but the staff go out to families and money is raised to help families and fishermen financially.

Andy told us the story of several examples of the Mission's work and he told us that it is thought that the first fish and chip shop began in London in the 1860s. Andy gave us these statistics: 382 million portions of fish and chips are served each year and there are chip shops all over the world. Every 60 days a fisherman dies, every 40 days a fishing boat is sunk and every 10 days fishing livelihoods are lost.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 26th February 2026, where we will hear about the GHQ Auxiliary.

Do you find January hard? You may be aware of 'Blue Monday,' the supposed most depressing day of the year (there is debate as to whether it is true or not, the idea was funded by a travel company after all...). Even if you don't buy into the idea of Blue Monday January can be hard on our mental health. In any given week 1 in 5 people report experiencing a common mental health problem like anxiety or depression (statistic from Mind). Things like food insecurity, struggling to pay bills, struggling to heat your home, and the general darkness can all compound and impact mental health further. # BAWDSEY HAVEN YACHT CLUB

Massive erosion of shingle is endangering public footpath access to Bawdsey beach.

If you are a beach user at Bawdsey you will have noticed that the beach has rapidly been getting narrower for the last few months and there has been very fast and massive shingle loss. In the summer over 500 people access the beach in any one day, while locals including dog walkers and sea anglers use the beach year round.

Bawdsey Haven Yacht Club (BHYC) had to act quickly to maintain access to its boat park which at the same time protects the public footpath. If the public footpath becomes unusable, the only access to Bawdsey beach by the public will be via the riverbed which will be dangerous on a rising tide. The authorities would have to close the beach completely because of public safety issues.

Volunteers from BHYC have put up some temporary wooden structures and made urgent repairs to one groyne to try and slow down the erosion. In mid-November the club will totally renovate one of the main groynes next to the boat yard entrance. To ensure a life of over 50 years the club obtained green oak from A. C. Timber Solutions. This sustainable certified wood was sourced from their French supplier at short notice. The renovation means replacing 10 groyne posts and subsequently bolting on 240 square feet of 75 mm thick planks. It also means moving over 4 tons of wood by hand!

BHYC volunteers have already done a lot, but much more needs to be done. The Council and Environment Agency

have been contacted for assistance and funding but, as yet, no definite help has been forthcoming. The club has already spent £5,500 on this work but the total cost could eventually be as high as 35K. BHYC has therefore started a fundraising drive (see https://gofund.me/8c35bdbd1 or scan the QR code).





Please help them to protect the path, they want to rebuild more of the old groynes which previously protected this section and ideally get a permanent barrier built by the path using metal piles or hard wood.



#### CITIZENS ADVICE EAST

Good news for private tenants: The proposed changes to private tenancies that we wrote about last year have now become law. On 1st May 2026 most of the new rules about tenancies will come into force.

The Renters' Rights Act 2025: We know from our clients that whilst most landlords provide a good service, the private rented sector can be the most expensive, poorest quality and most insecure type of housing. The aim of the new Act is to give tenants more security and enable them to challenge bad practice without fear of eviction. Benefits for landlords include more straightforward regulation and clearer and expanded grounds for possession.

We list here some of the main changes.

On 1st May the Act will immediately:

End all section 21 'no fault' evictions. Landlords will have to prove that the tenancy agreement has been broken or that they need the property for themselves to live in or to sell.

Limit rent in advance when you start a tenancy to one month's rent. At present there is no limit to rent in advance.

Give tenants two months' notice of a rent increase and only allow one rent increase in any year. The new rent is only allowed to rise to the market rate for the area.

Give tenants the right to appeal against excessive rent increases.

Strengthen tenants' rights to keep a pet in their property.

Abolish fixed-term assured tenancies and replace them with tenancies that can be ended at any time after notice has been served by the landlord or tenant.

Enable tenants to move out after giving two months' notice. They will not have to wait until the end of a fixed term.

The Act also providessafeguards for landlords:

Gives landlords robust grounds for possession where the tenant is at fault

(e.g. has significant arrears, damages the property).

Landlords can give notice using the relevant grounds at any point in the tenancy.

Allows landlords to take a property back if they want to move into it themselves or sell it. But they must give tenants four months' notice to move out, and they cannot re-let it for 12 months.

There are some other changes in the Act that will be introduced by the government at a later date.


